Cross Plains, Cottonwood and Atwell voters approved by an over-whelming majority Saturday the issuance of \$75,000 worth of bonds for the improvement of lateral roads in Commissioners precinct four. The vote was:

The pavement to Cottonwood is to be done through cooperation with the state highway department which is to provide all engineering without cost, pay 25 percent of construction expense and permanently maintain the road. Estimates are that the road to Cottonwood will cost \$8,000 per mile or a total of \$56,000. Of this amount the state has agreed to pay \$14,000. leaving has agreed to pay \$14,000, leaving the precinct's part around \$42,000. Remainder of the \$75,000 will be made available to the County Com-

made available to the County Com-missioner for graveling all school bus and mail routes, and possibly the rebuilding of a number of bridges and culverts.





A non-political organization, the Texas Committee For Redistricting was established to enlist popular support for passage of Amendment Two on the general election ballot in the November 2 election.

"Amendment Two is one of the most important amendments ever most important amendments ever to come before the voters of Texas."

most important amendments ever to come before the voters of Texas," Shepperd stated, "It will end the undemocratic situation whereby many counties are today denied fair representation in the state Legislature."

Legislature."

Amendment Two provides for a board of five to redistrict Texas according to population after each Pederal census if the legislature fails to do so as directed by the state constitution.

Texas has not been redistricted in 27 years Shepperd pointed out. In that time many counties have grown tremendously in population but have never received a corresponding increase in representation in the legislature.

Regular redistricting is the best method of assuring fair representation for all counties Shepperd declared in urging passage of Amendment Two.



Another good controller of the peach tree borer is jaradichlorobenzene chrystals. Just break the soil crust from 15 to 18 inches around the tree and clear out the grass and weeds. Then sprinkle the chrystals in a circle around the tree about two inches from the base. One ounce is enough for mature trees, but sometimes one and a half ounces is needed for the extra large trees. For trees 3 to 5 years old use three-fourths of an ounce, and for younger trees, sprinkle around about one half ounce.

Cover the chrystals over with soil as soon as they have been sprink-led around, and pack the dirt with a shovel. The best time of year to apply these chrystals is between October20 and November 15.

After about six weeks, tear down ound of earth and remove he crystals.

Ethylene dichloride or the para-dichlorobenzene crystals either will give a good control of the peach tree borer. This borer is sometimes called the base borer and attacks

Lesser Peach Boret

Lesser Peach Borer—
The lesser peach borer confines its attack mostly above ground to the trunk and limbs of the trees. As in the case of the shot hole borer, only injured or diseased trees are attacked.
