County Elections Produce New Faces

COUNTY—Saturday, April 2, was election day in Callahan County and several new faces were elected to city council and school board positions.

In the Baird City Council race there were 199 total votes cast. Incumbents, Jon Hardwick and Edwin G. Hart, were re-elected and newcomer Robert Martin was elected to fill the third vacant spot. Hardwick received 161 votes, Hart, 150, & Martin, 158. John Mendez received 61 votes and B.P. Stephenson and Larry Hargrove each received one write-in vote.

One hundred and nine total votes were cast in the Clyde City Council and mayor election. C. Lee Smith, mayor incumbent, received 100 votes and city councilmen, Don Gordon had 105 votes and Paul Dugan had 108 votes. There was no opposition in either race.

O.B. Edmondson was elected mayor in the Cross Plains city election and five councilmen were elected. Alvin Hutchinson, incumbent, Frank Roberts, Raymond Franke, Bob Lane and T.T. Nickels, incumbent, were all elected to the Cross Plains City Council.

One incumbent was defeated and two re-elected to the Eula School Board. The top three vote getters in the election were W.P. Stephenson, incumbent; 243; Byron Miller, 229, and Winford Gardner, incumbent, 207.

W.C. McCoy, incumbent, was defeated with 130 votes. Also getting votes

were Bryan Caton, 88; Lloyd Barr, 140; & Wayne Taylor, 34.

Five persons were elected to the Cross Plains School Board with three being elected to three year terms and two persons elected to one year terms.

John Montgomery received 351 votes, Robert Conlee, 244, and Randy Foster, 291, to be named to three year terms.

Don Harris received 271 votes and Dwayne Wilson, incumbent, received 281 votes to be elected to one year terms.

Other persons who ran for the school board were Claude Lawson, 240 votes; Balus Pope, 233 votes; Marilyn Franke, 84 votes; Kay Haran 35 votes; Danny Hutton, 194 votes & Harold Strahan, 43 votes.

Two persons were elected to the Clyde School Board. Marvin W. Sapaugh received 187 votes and Jim G. Taylor received 113 votes.

Others who ran for the school board were: Bob Koonce, 89 votes; Jack Frazier, 51 votes; Billy Joe Hawk, 75 votes; Davis H. Lin, 95 votes and Jackie T. Jenkins, 20 votes. Jack Landers received 12 write-in votes. There was a total of 334 votes cast in the Clyde school board election.

In the Baird School Board race two positions were filled. Robert Park, incumbent, received 115 votes and Pat McKennon received 114 votes. They were unopposed. A total of 126 votes were cast.

County Grand Jury Indicts Twelve March 31

Baird—A 42nd District Court grand jury for Callahan County returned 12 felony indictments, one of them sealed, Thursday, March 31.

Grand jurors investigated the circumstances of a fatal car wreck near Clyde on Dec. 10 and decided that no charges should be filed. The two-car accident occurred on an IH-20 service road just east of Clyde and took the life of Winifred Robinson Chunn of Mineral Wells, a passenger in one of the vehicles.

Williams Ronald McMulland, 28, a former Taylor County man now in custody in Florida, was indicted for armed robbery in connection with the Oct. 14 stick-up and abduction of the female attendant of a Clyde convenience store.

Texas authorities are having to wait their turn to try McMulland, who is wanted in several other states. Since being charged with the armed robbery here and one in Abilene, he has been convicted of a rape-murder in Florida, for which he received two life prison terms.

Paige Meyers of Rt. 1, Clyde, was indicted for possession of cocaine and marijuana in connection with a Feb. 3 raid of his home by Callahan County Sheriff's deputies, Clyde police and narcotics agents from Abilene.

Charlie E. Smith was indicted for escaping from the Callahan County Jail on Nov. 4, while he was being held for burglary. He was later arrested and is

back in custody.

Two burglary indictments were returned against two Mesa, Ariz., men in connection with the Feb. 25 break-in of the White's Auto Store and G&G Gift and Hobby Shop in Baird. The two, Robert Paul Hayes, 18, and Russell Wade Bearden, 17, are among a group charged in Taylor County in connection with the recovery of 66 weapons and more than \$20,000 worth of other loot taken in several area burglaries.

Craig Winters, 17, of Rt. 1, Clyde, was indicted for burglary in connection with the Dec. 20 break-in of the Cris Kramer home north of Clyde.

Kenneth Ray Taylor of Clyde was indicted for car burglary. The indictment alleges the Dec. 9 theft of a CB radio from a Joe South Trucking Co. truck.

Indicted for driving while intoxicated (DWI), second offense, were Donald Gene Robers, 39, of Rt. 1, Cross Plains, and Willie Fred Harris, 59, of Baird.

Pre-Registration For Kindergarten Set

BAIRD — Students who will be enrolled in kindergarten in the Baird school next year will pre-register on Wednesday, May 4, from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m. The pre-registration will be held in the School cafeteria.

One parent should accompany the child and bring a copy of the child's birth certificate and immunizations. The birth certificate must be an official certificate—not a hospital record.

The parents of children who are entering school for the first time this fall should be aware of the state school law which requires that all children have certain immunizations before entering school.

These immunizations are a series of 3 diphtheria-whooping cough-tetanus (DPT) shots with a booster after age 4; three doses

of oral polio vaccine with a booster after age 4; measles vaccine (Or a history of measles illness) and Rubella vaccine.

The Texas Department of Health and the Education Agency are now recommending that a measles vaccine booster may be needed if a child received the measles vaccine before the first birthday. The family doctor can be contacted to determine if a booster is needed. The school is required to have a record of dates of each of these inoculations, therefore parents are asked to bring records with dates, so a copy can be made for school records.

A free immunization clinic will be held during the pre-registration, but parents are urged to have their children's immunizations up-to-date before that time if possible.

One of the phenomena which characterizes the modern world is the rapid

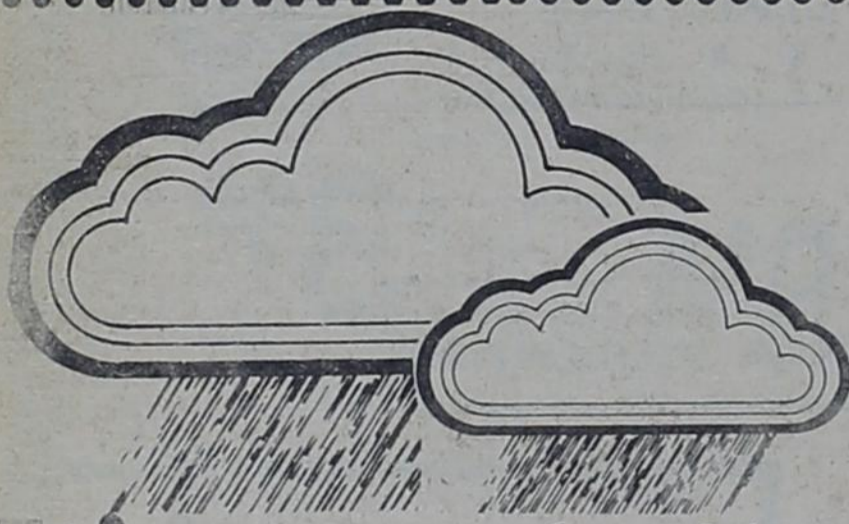

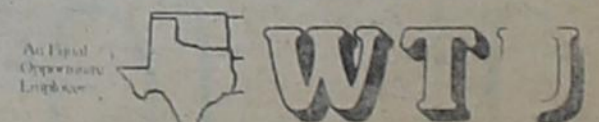

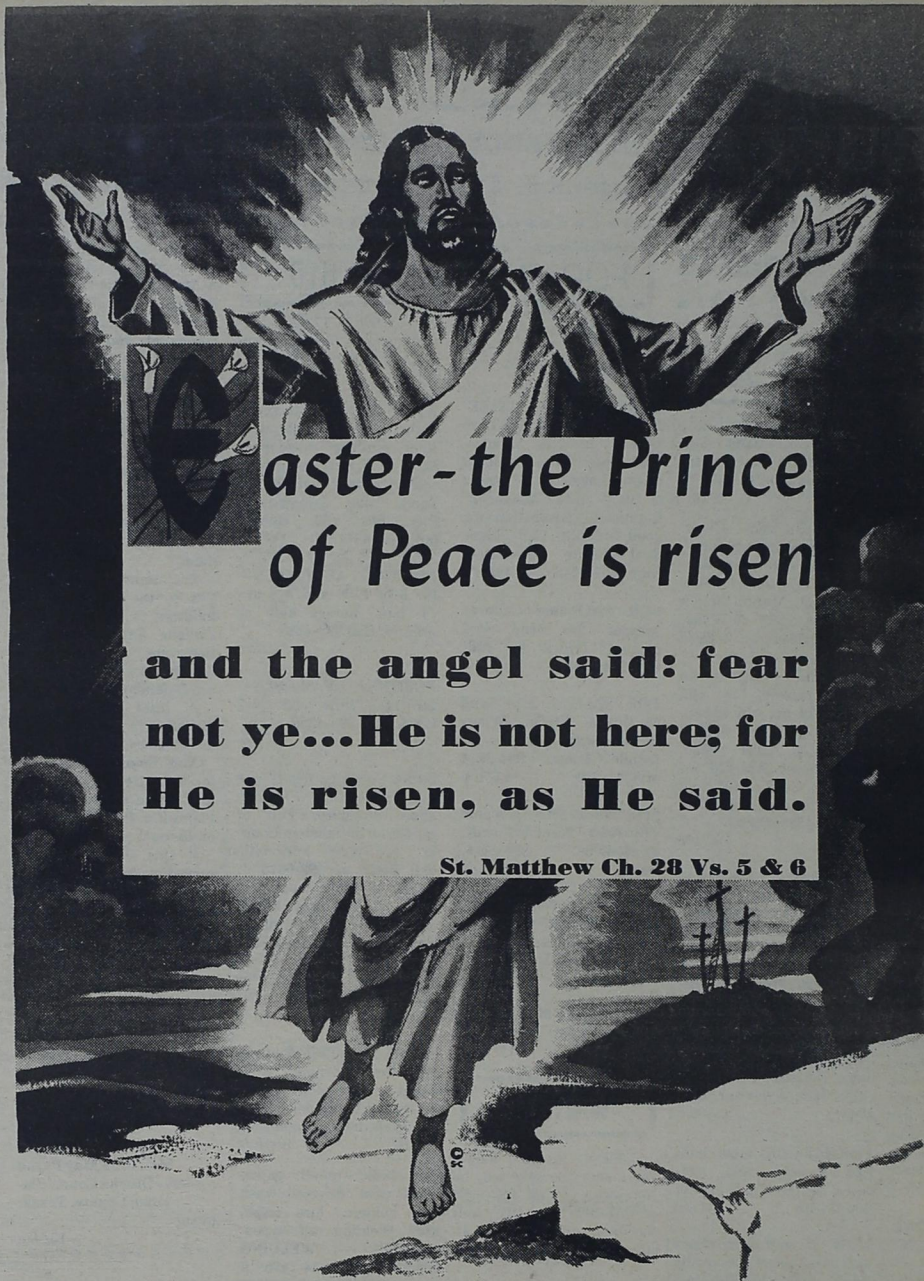
