HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Section 61, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, constables, deputy constables, and precinct law enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis in all of the counties in this State beginning January 1, 1949; providing for submission of this Amendment to the vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof.

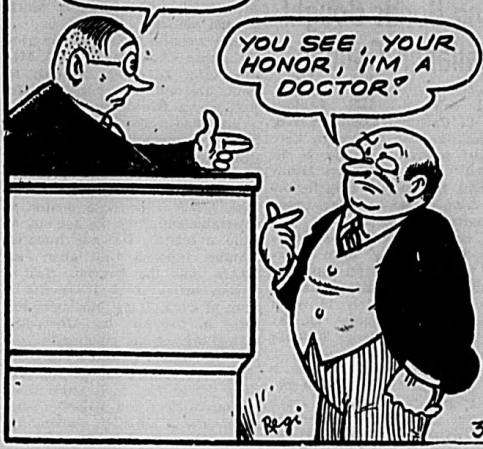
Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all constables and deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000) according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriff, deputy sheriff, county law enforcement officers including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949.

H. J. R. No. 39 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto to be known as Section 1-a, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of Appellate Courts and Judges of District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age or disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed.

Section 1-a. The Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of the District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age or disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed.

Appendicitis Deaths Still On The Increase

Sixty Texans died as the result of appendicitis during the first five months of 1948, according to figures released by the Texas State Department of Health. "This figure does not appear large when compared to the deaths from cancer, tuberculosis and heart disease," Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer said, "but with the knowledge that these sixty Texans died needlessly, the figure is tragically high."

More than anything else, Dr. Cox said he would attribute fatality in appendicitis to the complacent attitude of the people concerning the disease. It is not put in its "proper perspective," too often, the Health Officer said, people have the vain hope that the prolonged pain in their stomach will "wear off". He cautioned that the stomach ache which lasts more than three or four hours should be considered a serious matter.

Appendicitis killed 60,000 people in the United States and Canada last year, Dr. Cox said. He warned that young adults are especially susceptible to attacks, and that death among children and adolescents.

George Bernard Shaw, English playwright and author, celebrated his 92nd birthday last week by working in his garden a part of the day, and all visitors and reporters were not to be admitted to his home - strict orders from Mr. Shaw - his housekeeper said.

From now on Mr. Shaw says he will content himself by keeping close to home, writing, working in his garden, taking short walks, and occasionally a drive in his Rolls Royce car.

Body Of Former Cross Cut Boy Coming Home For Reburial At Angelo

Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Pentecost, formerly of Cross Cut and who now reside in San Angelo, have been notified that the body of their son, Corporal James F. Pentecost, is enroute from the Pacific for reburial in San Angelo cemetery. Corporal Pentecost was killed in action June 15, 1945. He was 23 years old and a member of the 24th Field Artillery. He had been in the service 27 months. The body is being returned from Mindanao, Southernmost island of the Philippine chain.

In addition to his parents, Corporal Pentecost is survived by three sisters, Mrs. William Castleberry, Mrs. Howard McCullough and Mrs. Loma Preslar, and two brothers Nolan and Bill Pentecost.

Social Security Law Passed 13 Years Ago

Thirteen is indeed a lucky number for over six million Americans who are receiving cash payments under the several provisions of the Social Security Act. For it was just 13 years ago, on August 10, 1935, that the Social Security Act became law.

This law, which was designed to provide a measure of financial security to the people of the nation, was considered by President Roosevelt as one of the outstanding achievements of his administration. Improvements and extensions were made by amendments in 1939 and again in 1946. Further improvements have been considered by each succeeding session of Congress.

This law consists of four main parts: 1. A Federal system of retirement and survivors insurance for workers and their families—based on employer-employee contribu-

tions. 2. A Federal-State plan for payments to the needy aged, needy blind, and dependent children. 3. A Federal-State plan providing for the payment of unemployment benefits to unemployed workers who lose their jobs through no fault of their own. 4. Federal aid to the States for maternal and child health, public health, and vocational rehabilitation.

POLL TAX INFORMATION FOR 1948

Since there is no poll tax assessed for the year 1948 it will not show on the roll for that year, but it will be necessary for anyone wishing to vote to pay poll tax when other taxes are paid.

Exemptions must be secured for a person becoming twenty-one after January 1, 1948.

A person becoming twenty-one years of age after January 1, of the year for which the poll tax was levied does not need to have an exemption.

All persons who become sixty years of age after January 1, 1948, can vote without a poll tax and do not need to have an exemption.

Total sales of U.S. Savings Bonds in Callahan County during the Security Loan Campaign were \$59,574.00 according to Mr. B. H. Freeland, County Savings Bonds Chairman. He received sales figures today from state savings bonds headquarters in Dallas.

Portrait of A Pastor

Some thirty five years ago Groom, Texas was not a county, a city or even much of a town; a railroad passed through it, about one hundred families lived there and it was surrounded by ranches. When a visiting preacher came to Groom he used the school house in which to hold services.

Such was the place and the people among whom Pastor J. U. McAfee came as a boy preacher to work, live and serve his God. His first job at Groom was to change a dispirited collection of families into a community of men and women, with their center the Methodist church. The preacher began with the young people, singings, games and other modes of entertainment. Next, he set out to build a church, the one hundred families supplied the labor and McAfee was the foreman. Said a Groom man, "That feller did a heap of work, I saw him astandin' there in the sun day after day, taking holt of the building."

By the time the church was completed the citizens of Groom and their pastor had built more than a church, they had welded themselves into a christian community. Since then Brother McAfee has built many peoples into strong communities. The last was at Fort Worth where he did not make a building but did make a community. His technique has always been out there in the sun day after day, practical action rather than philosophical reasoning. Man cannot live by bread alone, the pastor maintains, but before the average man can have that which is beyond bread, he must have bread and helping him secure this is the preacher's religious vocation. He interviews the person seeking help. Rev. McAfee is a short stoop-shouldered humble man whose bushy white brows knot together behind glasses when he thinks hard; he is a great spiritual preacher and his church attendance is large.
