Damages Awarded In Suit For Baird Child

Evidence showed that injuries sustained by twelve year old, Jackie Williams, were severe according to Don Wilson, "there was no physical damage but the child's ability to learn and retain was severely damaged," stated Wilson, Callahan County Attorney.

There was a compromise settlement reached on behalf of the child. The suit filed for \$2.7 million damages was settled with compromise of \$500 a month for Jackie George Williams for the rest of his life. If Jackie should live for 58 more years the settlement would total \$398,000.

The judgement by the 42nd District Court, Judge Don Lane presiding, specifies that monthly payments be made for at least 20 years. In the event of the youth's death before that time, the payments should go to his father, Lawson Williams, as beneficiary.

Jackie George Williams received permanent brain injuries in a car-truck accident in Taylor County. Defendants are C&W Transport and Billie Wade of Breckenridge. The accident occurred on U.S. Highway 80 on November 14, 1975. The suit alleged that truck driver was negligent in changing lanes when it was unsafe to change lanes.

Evidence showed that the brain damage sustained upon the accident was permanent, dropping the child's IQ and necessitating 'supervised living' for his lifetime.

Under the terms of the settlement agreement, Wilson was awarded \$8,000 to pay medical bills, as guardian, Chapell, the attorney who filed the suit, received

\$40,000 and the father received \$2,000. The parties agreed that payment of the funds not constitute an admission of liability.

Chappel originally sought damages totaling \$2,761,767, including \$7,847 medical expenses, \$924,000 to \$1,188,000 for supervised living services, \$516,000 for expected lifetime earning ability, \$1,024,920 for mental anguish and physical disfigurement and \$25,000 for pain and suffering.

Attorney Roger Glandon of Abilene represented the defendants C&W Transport and Bobbie Ivie Wade of Breckenridge.

year period.

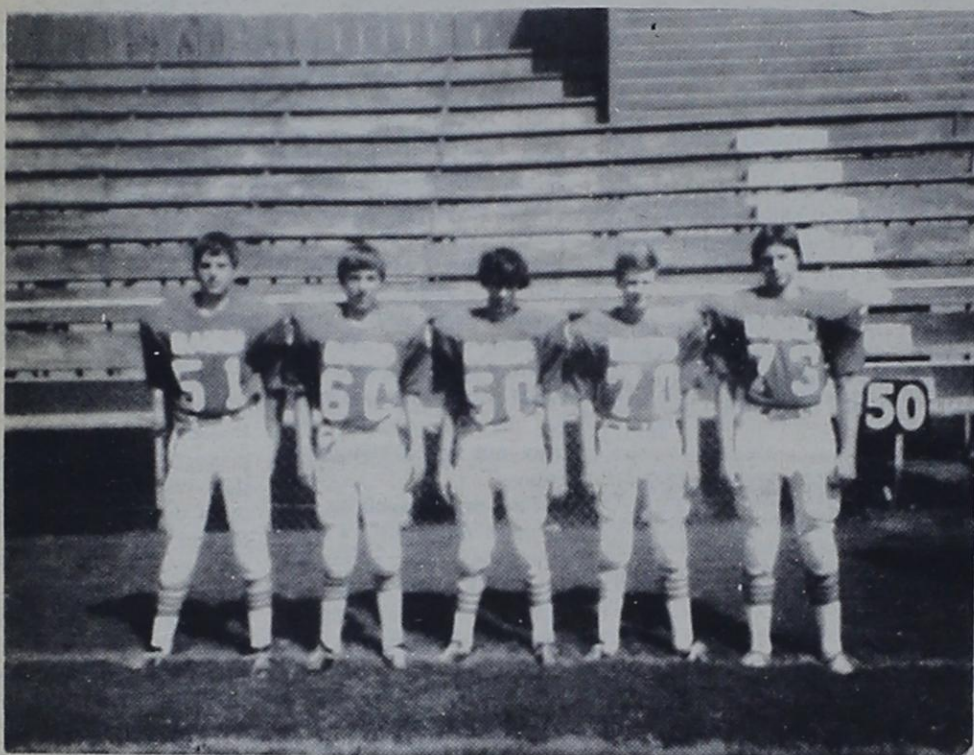
