Garland Smith, former Fireman First Class in the Navy, was released from duty April 8 at Houston. He arrived here Thursday of last week for a visit with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Smith.

In the service more than two years, Garland spent 17 months overseas on the light cruiser U. S. S. St. Louis during which time he travelled more than 240,000 miles on secret missions.

His awards include the American Theatre Ribbon, Asiatic-Pacific Theatre Ribbon with three battle stars, Philippines Liberation Ribbon with one battle star, European Theatre Ribbon, Victory Medal and citations for the invasion of Okinawa, air strike off Japan, and engagements in the Sea of Japan.

Before entering the Navy in 1943 he was a student at JTM in Stephenville and NTS in Denton and was employed one year with Texasco. Co. in Ft. Worth and one year with the same company in Port Arthur. He is also a graduate of Cross Plains high school.

Omar Burleson Enters Race For 17th Congressional Seat

Omar Burleson of Anson launched his campaign for Congress, 17th District of Texas, this week by authorizing this newspaper to make his announcement.

Born in 1906, Burleson has spent his entire life in West Texas with the exception of two years in Washington, D. C., and his three years in the Navy. After receiving his law degree in 1929, he married Ruth DeWesse, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. R. D. DeWesse, Rev. DeWesse was pastor of the First Baptist Church at Anson in the early 1920's.

Burleson's political career began at 23 years of age when he was elected County Attorney of Jones County. After two terms, he was elected County Judge of his home county and served for three terms unopposed. He became widely known in West Texas for his leadership in governmental, educational and civic affairs. As president of the West Texas County Judges and Commissioners Ass'n., he championed causes for the improvement of county government. His interest in civic and educational affairs was evinced by his selection as District Governor of Lion's Club, chairman of the Texas Welfare Association, member of the Freight Rate Equality Federation, member of his local school board of trustees, and presently a member of the Board of Trustees of Abilene Christian College.

Until he became Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Burleson was active in church, fraternal, and civic affairs in his own community and of the entire State of Texas. Resigning from the FBI, he spent approximately one year as Secretary to the Hon. Sam Russell, present Congressman, and later became General Counsel for the National Capitol Housing Authority, Washington, D. C. As a Congressman's secretary and as head of the Legal Department of the Nation's Capitol Housing Authority, Burleson had opportunity to observe and work with our National Congress. He was in daily contact with Congressional operation, and as legal counsel he appeared before numerous committees on official matters. The experience thus gained undoubtedly adds to his other qualifications for the office he seeks. His own statements indicate he was at that time studying Congressional procedures and routine with a view of seeking a seat in that body.

After approximately two years in Washington, Judge Burleson waited his exemptions and joined the U. S. Navy and served three years. He returned to the States from Okinawa in December 1945 to end service in the Pacific which took him from New Guinea to Japan. In the earlier days of the war he was in the North Atlantic and later saw service in the Aleutian Islands area. At the war's end he was in the East China Sea in Mine Operational Intelligence.

Burleson advises that his platform will be submitted to the public through the columns of this paper within the next few days.

The board of trustees of the Cross Plains Independent School District met in regular session Monday night, April 15, for the purpose of re-organizing after the recent election and to employ teachers for the 1946-47 term. A. J. McCuin, superintendent, was awarded a one year extension of his present contract, and sixteen other teachers were re-elected to the faculty.

Ben Atwood was elected president of the board, M. E. Howell was elected vice-president, Frank Taylor was elected secretary, L. I. Montgomery, assistant secretary. Other members of the board are F. A. Oglesby, Vernon Spencer and W. H. Neeh.

Immediately following organization the board took up selection of a faculty for the 1946-47 term. Supt. McCuin, whose contract would have expired at the end of the coming term, was selected superintendent for the 1947-48 term. In the high school, re-elected faculty members were: L. E. Lusk, Mrs. Freda Glenn, Mrs. Dave Lee, Miss Billy Ruth Loving and Mrs. Maxine Placker. Mrs. Patti Sue Dolinger was offered her post for the coming year but has not definitely decided to accept. O. B. Edmondson, agriculture instructor, had been previously chosen.

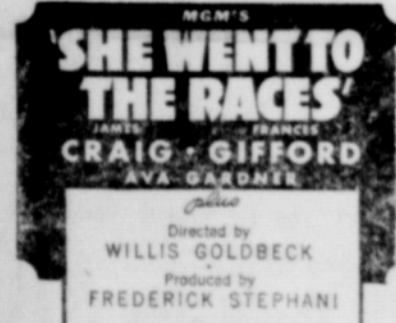

Texas In Grip of Crime Wave, I Garrison Declares

AUSTIN - Texas is in the grip of a crime wave, declared Hon. Homer Garrison of the Department of Public Safety recently. The crime rate in Texas and towns, Garrison said, is 18 per cent in 1945 - a decrease was superimposed substantial increase in 1944. Forty-six police departments representing 1,873,000 people last year reported a total of 1,000 major offenses to the Department of Public Safety. That total included 28,000 burglaries, a gain of 9.65 per cent; 18,000 auto thefts, a gain of 6.48 per cent; 12,000 robberies, a gain of 23.10 per cent; 10,000 larcenies, a gain of 22.5 per cent; 5,000 thefts, a gain of 15.93 per cent; and 6,000 auto accidents, a gain of 20.11 per cent. The increase in rural crime has been greater than in the Garrison said.
