



Announcement has been made by Attorney General Walter A. Keeling that he is having the record perfected whereby the State of Texas will probably be reimbursed \$250,000 or more, from the United States Government for amounts spent in aiding the national Government in the war with Germany.

ward, atorneys for George E. B. Peddy, in the case contesting the seat of United States Senator Earle B. Mayfield, have been in Austin obtaining more evidence to be submitted to the Washington commit-Texas senatorial election of 1922.

Comptroller Smith's monthly financial report for November shows general receipts of \$1,137,919 and disbursements of \$1,183. The net deficit as of Dec. 1, is given at \$2,381,-075. With four counties missing the total assessed valuation for this year is reported at \$3,419,091,314, a decrease under the whole 1923 total of \$50,314,829, but this is more than offset because the four counties had a combined valuation last year of \$73,261,105.

State Pasteur Institute, reports that there is an epidemic of rables in Texas and advises that persons should tie up their dogs. Thus far the institute has received 150 dog heads for examination last month with reports of many others not sent here. The percentage of hydrophobia infection was very heavy, having exceeded 40 per cent in the heads examined.



When the World war began, the reigning khedive, Abbas Hilmi, long restive under English control, threw in his lot with the Turks (who had never relinquished their claim to sovereignty over Egypt), and a Turkish army moved down to Gaza to drive the English out. But England, regarding the Suez canal as the jugular vein of her empire, could not then risk losing her foothold on the Nile. So, on December 18, 1914, Egypt was openly declared a British protectorate.

Hardly were the guns of Europe silent before Egypt began her daring drive for independence. It astounded even the East-this sudden, sensational leaping to life of a race so long bent to alien vokes. Dramatic as the story is, however, it need only be said here that in 1922 the British relinquished their protectorate, and acknowledged Ahmed Fuad as king of Egypt.

Tourists know superficial Egyptthe donkey boys, the beggars whining for bakshish, the smirking guides; they have seen the tawdry cafe chantant, and Shepheard's, and have been photographed astride a blase, flea-bitten old camel standing on the sands before the

But what do any Westerners really know of the Egyptians?

These strange people, isolated here for ages, have developed and maintained certain distinct physical and racial characteristics. When you see the modern fellah at work with mallet and chisel, or scratching the sunbaked plain with his crude hoe, or dipping his clumsy fish-net into the Nile, he is, in face and physique, startlingly like the pictured Egyptians of the

Since prehistoric days this race, a vast farming colony, has lived along the Nile and in that great delta which ages of floods have built out into the Mediterranean. Though the Persian conquest, about 521 B. C., ended the period of native rule, the mental and physical aspects of the modern fellah are, so far as we can judge, exactly like those of his early ancestors who sweated under the Pharaohs-and this notwithstanding centuries of submission to Persian, Macedonian, Roman, Arab, Mameluke, Turk, and Britton. Four-fifth's of all Egypt's population, or something near nine millions, be-

long to this ancient race. Life of the Fellaheen.

Culturally, the fellah has been Arabized; he speaks a form of Arabic and turns to Mecca in his prayers. Otherwise he is the same silent, melancholy, inscrutable person who doggedly dragged granite blocks for hundreds of miles to build the pyramids, who blindly bent to the big sweeps of the early Egyptian galleys, or who conceived and began to dig the Suez canal centuries before De Lesseps was born.

Hard work is his lot from the cradle to the grave. Riding through the great delta region, you will see a boy or girl of eight leading the ox in the fields, while the father holds the rude plow. The children herd goats, too, and aid in cotton picking.

In the daily home life of the country fellaheen, the influence of Arab culture is uppermost. "Marry what you like of women, by twos and fours, says the Koran; so polygamy exists; but it is too expensive for the average

Every village has its coffee shop, where water pipes are for rent. Here, too, is the ever-present professional story teller, the letter writer, the snake charmer, the fakir, and the dancing girl. From our viewpoint such a life

is hopelessly dull. Plainly, a new era has been dawning in Egypt. It is admitted through all the East that far-reaching economic and/cultural changes have been sweeping the country. But it probably will take many years of progress to transform the slow-moving, fatalistic fellah Ali, and his successors held of the lower rural class. #### Lesson for January 11 THE JUDGMENT OF THE NATIONS

LESSON TEXT-Matt. 25:31-46. GOLDEN TEXT-"Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto Me."—Matt. 25:40.

PRIMARY TOPIC—Kindness Pleases.
JUNIOR TOPIC—Christ's Picture of

INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR
TOPIC—Christ's Picture of Judgment.
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC -Practical Christianity.

The subject selected by the lesson committee is "The Last Judgment," but this is an error. According to legitimate textual and contextual signification it is the judgment of the living nations which still lies in the future (v. 32). The idea of a general judgment which is of such frequent occurrence in religious literature and teaching is a fundamental error. It is not once found in the Bible, neither the idea which it is intended to convey. Doctor Pentecost most truthfully says, "It is a mischievous habit that has led the Christian world to speak of the judgment as being one great event taking place at the end of the world when all human beings, saints and sinners, Jews and Gentiles, the living and the dead, shall stand up before the great white throne and there be judged. Nothing can be more wide of the Scriptures." The Bible speaks of several judgments, different in respect to the subjects to be judged, the place of judgment, the time of judgment and the result of judgment.

I. The Judge (v. 31). It is the Son of God who came and died to redeem the human race. He is now seen clothed with majesty and power sitting upon His throne acting as Judge. Those who accept Jesus Christ now as their Savior shall not come into judgment (John 5:24).

II. The Time (v. 31). This judgment will take place when

the Lord comes in His glory accompanied with a retinue of glorious angels. This will take place after He has gathered the elect remnant of Israel. There will be no resurrection in connection with this judgment. III. The Place (v. 31).

The prophecy of Joel, the third chapter, and Zechariah 14:1-5, show that It is to be in or near Jerusalem. The angel said to Mary, "Thou shalt call His name Jesus. He shall be great and shall be called the Son of the Highest: and the Lord God shall give unto Him the throne of His father David. And he shall reign over the house of Jacob forever; and of His kingdom there shall be no end." (Luke 1:31-33). As David was a literal king and reigned in a literal place, there shall be a literal judge occupying a literal place of judgment. IV. The People Judged (vv. 32-45).

These will be the living nations upon earth after the church has been translated (I Thess. 4:16, 17). These are nations to whom the gospel of the Kingdom shall be preached just prior to the coming of the end. "And this gospel of the Kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come." (Matt. 24:14). This gospel is distinct from the grace of God, which is now being preached. The preachers of this gospel will be the Jews (see Revelation 7 and Romans 11). These are the brethren of the Lord in the flesh who move among the nations of the world with the startling message of the news of the Lord's approaching kingdom. Some of the nations will gladly receive the message and kindly receive the kingdom messengers, giving them clothing, food, shelter, etc. Others will persecute them, thrusting them into prison. Here the first will visit the messengers of the King and provide for their wants. At this time the Judge will separate the nations, placing the sheep on the right and the goats on the left hand. The sheep are those who have given proper treatment to Christ's brethren. The goats are those who rejected and mistreated his brethren. If these three classes, the sheep, the

goats and the brethren be kept separate, all confusion will be avoided. V. The Issue of the Judgment (v. 46; Cf. vv. 34-41). 1. The Sheep Entering into the Inheritance of a Prepared Kingdom.



Governor Neff Names General Henry Hutchings to Fill Office.

Austin, Texas.-Secretary of State Jeff J. Strickland has tendered his resignation to Gov. Neff, effective immediately.

"Important business matters in Mexico demand my immediate attention and make it impossible for me to perform my duties as Secretary of State, between now and the time my term expires," Mr. Strickland stated in his letter of resignation.

Mr. Strickland was appointed Secretary of State several months ago to fill the vacancy caused by the appointment of S. L. Staples as State Treasurer.

Gov. Neff appointed Gen. Henry Hutchings to fill the vacancy. Hutchings at present is chief clerk of the State Department. He was Adjutant General during the Ferguson Administration.

## WOULD EXTEND

Mexicans to the Number of 83,000 Entered the Country During the Last Fiscal Year.

Washington. - Legislation that would apply the immigration quota law of 2 per cent to the Western Hemisphere including the adjacent islands has been offered in the House of Representatives by John C. Box of Texas, member of the House Immigration Committee. Under the present quota law no countries of North or South America are included and adoption of Mr. Box's bill would make the restriction apply to all countries of the world. The bill is in line with similar measures offered by the Texas member in two prior Congresses.

The bill is so framed as to operate with the existing law in 1927 when there is to be a readjustment of the allotments allowed each country based upon their racial stock shown to be in the United States by the census of 1920. The 2 per cent law is based upon the census of 1890, however, with the immigration admissions based on the racial stocks, the maximum total from all countries to be admitted will be 150,000.

The 2 per cent law would admit about 1,500 from Mexico since the foreign Mexican population in the United States in 1890 was small. From Canada, however, the admissions would be nearly 20,000 annually. From Cuba and other West Indes,

the possible admission would be letween 400 and 500 annually. The only restriction to immigration from North and South America under the present law is found in the regulations in force for ; ears such as the head tax, literacy test,

### BETTER PRACTICE TEACHING BEING URGED

Says State Fails to Provide Adequate Fecilities in Teachers' Colleges.

Austin. Texas.-The educational survey staff, in connection with its report on higher education, point out the failure of the State to provide adequate facilities for practice teaching in connection with most of the teachers' colleges. The survey staff regards the practice school as the very heart of a teacher training institution. In spite of this, in most of the teachers' colleges the State has failed to provide adequate quarters for the training schools and in some instances the school are understaff-

The situation is further complicated by the location of the majority of the institutions in small towns. In several instances the teachers' colleges should have use of the entire local school system if properly organized practice schools are to be way should be cleared for such an arrangement wherever it is needed.

The survey staff does not give detailed consideration to the building needs in connection with all of the teachers' colleges. It names specific needs existing at certain institutions and recommends that a complete study of the needs of this group of institutions should be made. is pointed out that, with the possible exception of the University, the teachers' colleges as a group are more inadequately housed than any

other institutions of higher learning. The survey staff recognizes the existence in the State of some opposition to the building of dormitories at public expense. It does not believe this to be well founded. Especially does it lack basis when consideration is given to the fact that many of the institutions are located in places so small that sufficient home facilities are not available. To this must be added the consideration that dormitories make it more readily possible for the school authorities to regulate properly the lives of the students. The need for dormitories in connection with the teachers' colleges is most pronounced.

Ranches Need Rain.

Midland, Texas.-Cattle ranches at Midland are badly in need of rain. Cotton is practically all out. Weeds are still living but are growing to no advantage due to the protracted dry weather.

The weight struck the boy and crushed his chest.
