In a special called meeting on Monday, July 7, at 7 p.m. the Baird City Council voted to let the voters of the City decide what to do with the City's power plant.

Three bids have been proposed to the council for the system. One bid was received for the equipment alone for \$40,500.00 from Coastal Maintenance and Engineering Inc., out of Pasadena, Texas, and two were received from West Texas Utilities Co., one for the distribution system and power plant for \$248,224.00 and another for the distribution system only for \$145,724.00.

Baird has been receiving all of its power from WTU for about two months, but has held its right to distribute the power. The council has now set an August 9th referendum date to decide if the City should

sell its generating plant to WTU. Council members passed that vote by a 3-2 margin. Voting in favor were council members, Scotty Mitchell, Lee Roy Brooker and Robert Martin, against were Virginia Shanks and Gilmer Hughes.

Those in favor of selling the plant say that there is no way the system can be maintained without the cost being carried by the citizens since Baird has no reserve money for the system up-keep.

The proponents claim that WTU's price is too low and that revenue loss from the plant will have to be made up in increased taxes.

Should the referendum pass on August 9, the citizens will be buying all of their power directly from WTU.

Elmdale School Plans Reunion

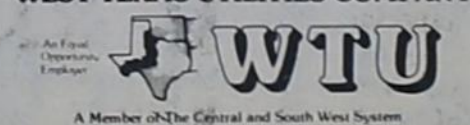
