

No News From Negotiations

Austin was about as quiet as the eye of a storm on Grusendorf, R - Arlington. Monday. The House and Senate committees redistricting

Republican leaders had plan out of public view. What they are considering now are two vastly different House, and one by the Senate.

All the Democrats and a few Republicans do not like either one of those maps... But the matter is now in the hands of the Committee, and Governor Rick Perry has set Wednesday as his preferred deadline for decisions.

After the Committee map, it will be brought back to the House and Senate for a final vote.

> Somewhere in the middle is the general public. Of special local concern is the redrawing of the 17th Congressional District. Most people in this area say they prefer to leave boundaries as they are.

If they could make the choice, they would prefer the Senate map to the House proposal, which would split Erath County and the whole 17th District. But actually most are tired of the whole process. And any talk of "compromise" sure makes them uneasy.

Congressman Charles Stenholm, who represented the 17th District since 1978, predicts that the redistricting matter could end up in court.

That appears likely.

In a conversation with this newspaper on Tuesday morning, Senator Troy Fraser said that there was lots of discussion going on in the redistricting committees, but he knew of nothing new to report at this moment.

Several maps had been looked at, he said.

He added that the goal of the committee is to make a decision today or tomorrow.

Stenholm Expresses Disappointment With Vote On Rural Health Care

Vows to continue the fight for rural health care

Congressman Charlie Stenholm (TX-17) expressed his disappointment that the House of Representatives yesterday narrowly voted against his motion to instruct negotiators working out the differences in Medicare prescription drug legislation between the House and the Senate to agree to provisions important for rural health care. Stenholm vowed to continue his effort to fight for Medicare legislation that meets the health care needs of rural America.

"Rural America has been shortchanged by Medicare for too long. Congress cannot afford to pass a Medicare bill that ignores the health care needs of rural America," Stenholm said. "That is why I offered this motion insisting that seniors and health care providers in rural. American are treated fairly by the current Medicare system and the new prescription drug benefit."

Stenholm offered the motion as a means show support for a Medicare reform bill that will benefit seniors and health care providers in rural. Although the motion was narrowly defeated by a vote of 202-213, Stenholm noted that the vote indicated that negotiators cannot afford to ignore the health care needs of rural America.

Stenholm's motion called on negotiators to accept the following priorities for rural health care:

1) Guaranteed prescription drug coverage through a fallback option through Medicare in areas where private drug plans are not available;

2) The best provisions improving Medicare payments to health care providers in rural areas that were included in the Senate or House bill (S. 1/H.R. 1);

3) Reject the cut in payments to hospitals in the House bill which will adversely affect hospitals in rural areas and undercut the benefits of the rural health care improvements. The American Hospital Association estimated that the provision in the House passed bill reducing hospital payments would cost the 27 hospitals in the 17th District of Texas \$24,188,539.

"Congress has a responsibility to the American people—and the nine million Medicare beneficiaries—to pass a bill that will meet their specific health care needs," Stenholm said. "I will continue to speak out on behalf of rural health care and build bipartisan support for legislation that will provide this critical health care assistance to rural communities."







What Are You Going To Do To Make **Domestic Violence Your Business?**

October Domestic Violence Awareness Month

By Angela Norman, Crime Victim Assistance Center and Judy Yupcavage

Each year, since 1987, October is proclaimed as National Domestic Violence Awareness Month. Some people wonder why- after all these years- we still need to raise awareness about a crime so prevalent and notorious; its aftermath so unavoidable.

Yes, for the month part, we sanction offenders. all seem to know that violence is occurring behind closed doors of homes in every corner of our communities and our country. Where we falter, and often fail, is in knowing what we can do personally and collectively to help those families living with the violence and dying at the hands of those they once loved and trusted.

While its true-domestic violence is a complex problem with no simple solutions - the fact is there are countless steps we can take in our daily lives to stop a batterer...to support a victim...to save a life.

First though, let's be clear about what not to do ...

.DON'T ASSUME that domestic violence is a gender-neutral crime- it's not- or that women are as violent as men are- they're not. In the overwhelming majority of cases, men batter, women are battered; men kill; women are killed. Consider these chilling statistics:

Bases on the Texas Council of Family Violence reports, 898,508 women were battered in 2002

Based on Pennsylvania newspaper reports, men perpetrated 90 percent of the state's domestic violence homicides during 2000

·Intimate violence is primarily a crime against women. In 1998, females accounted for 75 percent of the victims of intimate murders and about 85 percent of victims of non-lethal intimate violence.

.DON'T ASSUME that someone else is helping a battered woman and her children. Chances are, no one is. Even if someone is, keep in mind there's strength in num-

.DON'T ASSUME that just because a battered woman doesn't ask for help, she doesn't want nor need help. Sometimes in a home where threats and violence are a way of life, fear can ripple and paralyze. She may not be able to reach out for help.

•DON'T ASSUME that safety and justice for a battered woman could ever be possible unless and until we all become a part of the coordinated community effort to end domestic violence.

If you or someone you know need help, please contact the Crime Victim Assistance Center at 888-686-3223. Help is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Don't Wait To Act

It shouldn't take the deaths of an entire family as the result of a domestic homicide/ suicide before a neighborhood stops turning a deaf ear

to the sounds of violence on safety plans. their street.

It shouldn't take a woman being gunned down by her abusive husband on the steps of the church, before a congregation reaches out to those who are battered and rebukes those who batter.

It shouldn't take the murder of a woman denied a protective order before a judge recognizes the lethality of domestic violence and enforces the laws that are in place to protect victims and

It shouldn't take a battered woman being pronounced DOA at the hospital before healthcare practitioners stop sending patients home without questioning the origin of bruises and injuries or inquiring about their safety.

And it shouldn't take the stalking and shooting of a

battered woman at her job site before employers implement workplace violence

Every day, in some way, make it your business to play an active role in your community to end domestic violence. And what better time to begin than now, during National Domestic Violence Awareness Month.

If you suspect family members or friend are being battered...

·ASK if they're safe at home...in need of help

•TELL them about the free and confidential counseling, support and shelter referra services that are available from your local domestic violence program.

•SUPPORT them by offering a ride to the domestic violence program (which can help with children) while they're accessing help.

•CALL the police if you hear or witness an assault in

progress.

•CONTACT your local domestic violence program to find out more about what you can do to stop domestic vio-

If you suspect family members or friends are batterers...

·ASK if they know domestic violence is a crime and that they could lose their children, friends, homes and jobs if it doesn't stop.




