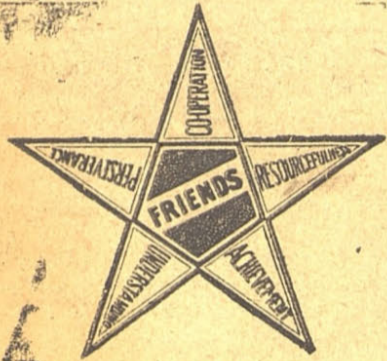

The Cross Cut Section continues active with more good producers. J. S. Costen got well on east Westerman No. 1 for 250 barrels natural. He shot his Arledge No. 2 and made a three hundred barrel well. He has four new locations on these leases, and Curry and Moore on D. C. Woodriddle No. 8 have a two hundred barrel well. No. 9 was finished for 150 barrels and No. 10 is drilling in. State Oil Co. and McLester on Josie Woodriddle No. 11, brought in a 50 barrel well. Derbandt & Hazelwood on Calvin No. 1 West of Burkett are setting casing at 325 feet. Cranfill-Reynolds missed pay on the Bond estate on No. 15, and 16. P. O. & G. got small well on Derrington No. 3. They are also near pay on Webb Wildcat west of town. Wilham Oil Corp. spudding on John Barr No. 1 west of town. No reports from other wells.

W. T. U. PLANS BIG IMPROVEMENTS HERE

The West Texas Utilities Co. has purchased a new site just east of Putnam Supply Co. and will build new Substation, having outgrown the present one. The new Station when completed will more than double the size of the station now in use and will be as large and perhaps larger than the Cisco Station, the Review is informed by Mr. Little the local manager.

The new distributing station here will have switch tower from which the different points served will have special independent kick back switches, and with the emergency line referred to, when there is trouble from main supply point it may be had from the reserve in short order which will assure us the best of electrical service.

Several cars of material have arrived and work on the new plant is expected to start soon. A Warehouse and residence will be included in the improvement.

This will be the central distributing point for this territory. Separate lines with independent switches which will supply Cross Cut Pioneer, Rising Star, and Burkett. Plans also call for a high line leading to Santa Anna, making connection with main line there, which will serve as an emergency line for this division and also for the division with which Santa is now being served.

TAKE NOTICE that an election be held on the 11th day of December, 1926, within the said district, in accordance with an order duly entered by the Board of Trustees on the 15th day of November, 1926, which is as follows: On this the 15th day of November, 1926, the Board of Trustees of the Cross Plains Independent School District met in special session with the following members present: S. P. Collins, J. A. Atwood, W. A. Dams, Martin Neeb, F. M. Gwin, President Jeff Clark, Secretary Mrs. R. Wagner.

There came on to be considered the petition of T. R. Haggard and 104 other persons asking that an election

be ordered on the question of issuing bonds of said school district for the purpose of constructing and equipping public free school buildings of brick and stone material in said district.

It appearing to the satisfaction of the Board of Trustees that the petition is signed by at least twenty resident qualified property tax paying voters of the district, and is otherwise in conformity with the law, the Board is of the opinion that the said petition should be granted, and the said election as prayed for should be ordered:

THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED By the Board of Trustees of the Cross Plains Independent School District:

THAT an election be held in the said Cross Plains Independent School District on the 11th day of December, 1926, which is less than thirty days from the date of this order at which election, in accordance with said petition, the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified resident property taxpaying voters of said

school district for their action thereupon:

PROPOSITION

Shall the Board of Trustees of the Cross Plains Independent School District be authorized to issue bonds of said district to the amount of SIXTY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$65,000), to become due and payable serially as follows: \$1,000 in the year 1931, \$3,000 in the year 1936, \$5,000 in the year 1941, \$7,000 in the year 1946, \$9,000 in the year 1951, \$11,000 in the year 1956, \$13,000 in the year 1961, and \$16,000 in the year 1966, and bearing interest at a rate not to exceed six per cent per annum payable semi-annually for the purpose of constructing and equipping public free school buildings of brick and stone material in said district and purchasing a site therefor and that thereafter there shall be annually levied and collected on all taxable property in said school district for the current year annually thereafter while said bonds or any of them are outstanding, a tax sufficient to pay the current interest on the said bonds and pay the principal thereof as the same becomes due.

The said election to be held at the Orrell-Dodson Chevrolet Co. Building in the said Cross Plains Independent School District, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of said election:

S. C. Barr Clerk of election.
T. R. Haggard Judge of election.
T. W. Brabham Clerk of Election

The ballots for the said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

FOR THE ISSUANCE OF THE BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF THE BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF.

Each voter shall mark out in black ink or with a pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving other as an indication of his choice. None but qualified resident property taxpaying voters of the said Cross Plains Independent School District shall be allowed to vote at said election.

The secretary of this Board shall forthwith issue a notice of said election, stating in substance the contents of this election order and the time and place of said election, and said secretary shall post a copy of such notice at three different places within the boundaries of the said Cross Plains Independent School District which posting shall be done not less than three weeks prior to the date fixed for said election.

Immediately after the said election has been held, the officers holding same shall make returns of the results thereof to the Board of Trustees of said School District and return the ballot box to the secretary of the said school district for safekeeping.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed as near as may be by the general laws of this state except as modified in Chapter Twenty-four of the General Laws passed by the Thirty-Seventh Legislature at the regular session in 1921, and this Board shall see that all necessary ballots and all other necessary supplies be provided for the said election.

FOUR ISSUES CONSTITUTE A MONTH

CROSS PLAINS, TEXAS
THAT SCHOOL BOND

Saturday Dec. 11, this school district will vote on a 65,000 bond issue for new and adequate school buildings. This is the most important issue brought before the citizenship of this country for years, and it is generally believed that the issue will carry by substantial majority. It would indeed be a regrettable affair if it failed to go over, as it is impossible for us to have a school that meets the demand and requirements under present conditions.

We now have over six hundred students enrolled and the class rooms are in such a congested condition that the situation is deplorable. The faculty can not possibly do the work that is expected of them, altho they are doing the best with the handicap under which they labor.

The condition of our school building is well known—it is no secret. Facts are facts. We now have the chance to do the thing that we will be proud of and for which our children will thank us and on the other hand, if we fail, we will live to regret it, if we place any value on educational advantages for our children and they must shoulder the loss of our failure.

We have good friends who will oppose this bond issue, and we wish we could say something that would cause them to support the issue. Much is at stake. We must go forward or backward, a town cannot out grow it's sch-

ools and maintain that growth. We are not anxious to pay more taxes, but we are most anxious, to have the best schooling possible for our children and our neighbors children. We want them to be better prepared for the problems of life than we were. They must carry on after we have crossed over the silent river.

The proposed new school building with modern facilities and equipment is indeed worth while—an achievement that would be a credit to our town and community. We can't afford to let the opportunity pass. Let us consider—we are able to do it—and there are things in life that money can't buy. We may lose our money. An education means more today than ever before. We got by without it easier than our children will. Let's have better schools. Your vote, your influence means much.

That sand storm on Thanksgiving day was a corker—but it was not compared to some the editor and others in this community have seen years ago in the west. The sand storms there would drive fear into the hearts of new comers. They were terrible. We had milder storms of course but when a big dark reddish bank began to roll up from the northwest, we got inside, while we could see. Then we would light the lamps as the sun would be hidden from view by a cloud of sand, and it would be dark regardless of the hour. Sometimes we would not dare to light a lamp, only in the storm cellar—but those were great days after all. When the rain came and vegetation covered the plains, it was inspiring. You could see so far—herds of cattle grazing on distant pastures and field crops growing profusely.

But the west today is not like it was 25 years ago. They have more rain and less sand storms.

Our relations with Mexico seemingly are approaching the point where diplomatic relations may be severed. The situation is becoming more acute because of hatred in the heart of Mexicans of all ranks for Americans, which is being tactfully cultivated and propagated. The property rights of Americans in Mexico have been violated by that Government—a repetition of the past. We have a chronic trouble which has given our State Department much concern for many years—and probably will for many more unless force is exercised to make her respect the rights of our people within her borders and that may ultimately be necessary but this country would deplore such action as a last resort—Yet with the heart of Mexico stirred with hatred for our government we cannot safely predict but only hope that matters may be adjusted in satisfactory manner. This nation will go a long ways for harmony, not because of fear, but because of her love for peace. It seems that Mexico does not comprehend the attitude of our state department in her endeavor to maintain relations and at the same time have the property rights of her citizens respected in that country.

The situation has also been aggravated by Mexico's claim that certain nationals in this country had met foul play while in the hands of civil authorities. That of course is possible but not likely. Such accusations against Mexico would be understood of course.

The main trouble with Mexico it seems, is that she must be educated to some things this country has acted as a big brother toward her, but she resents it, failing to understand our attitude or failing to appreciate it, one or the other. If it becomes necessary we can spank her, but it is hoped she will meet the condition, that, friendly relations may be maintained.

QUEER QUIRKS IN HUMAN DESTINY

A Madman on a Throne

THE momentary elevation of a madman to a throne in 1762 saved the budding empire of the Hohenzollerns and prevented the breaking of a link in the chain of events that was to lead to the great World War of 1914.

The opening of the Seven Years' war in 1756 found Austria and France in arms against Prussia and England. King Frederick, by his gifts as a warrior and diplomat, had raised Prussia from a third rate kingdom to a rival of the Great Powers. He lost no time in seizing Saxony at the outbreak of war, then crossed the mountains to Bohemia. Austrian forces drove him back into his own domain. Then the powers fell upon him. Russia invaded East Prussia, the Swedes entered Brandenburg from the north, the Austrians pressed into Silesia and the French attacked from the west.

Frederick now earned a place among the greatest generals of history. Hemmed in by superior forces, he first drove furiously at the French at Rosbach and beat them badly. Dashing against the Austrians in Silesia, he captured a third of their army and put the rest to flight. Greatly weakened, however, by incessant fighting, he was forced to adopt defensive tactics. The Russians captured Berlin, and Spain entered the war against him. Despite his heroic exploits, King Frederick was facing inevitable ruin.

Then the Tsarina Elizabeth died and was succeeded on the Russian throne by Peter III, a dangerous madman. Peter was an admirer of Frederick. He immediately transferred his effective army from the alliance with Austria to the side of Prussia. Frederick was saved. The mad Peter was deposed and Catherine II, his successor, promptly withdrew from the war, but Frederick's triumph was already achieved. By the treaty of Hubertusburg (1763) his claim to Silesia was allowed and his right to a place among the powers was established. The might of the Hohenzollerns had arisen, not to fall until the late Kaiser Wilhelm II lost his "place in the sun."

Garlic Stew Beat Napoleon

A COOK who spoiled the broth contributed to the wrecking of Napoleon's brilliant prospects after his victory in the battle of Dresden in the campaign of 1813-1814.

At grips with nearly all of Europe and closely pressed by the armies of Russia, Prussia and Austria, Napoleon turned defeat into victory at Dresden by a swift movement that brought him and his guard overland from Silesia to succor St. Cyr and twenty thousand troops, beleaguered in Dresden. The magic of the great warrior's presence infused new enthusiasm in the worn-out troops. "There he is! There he is!" was shouted on all sides as the emperor crept through a murderous Austrian fire to enter the city.

The following day Napoleon laid a concentrated artillery fire on the allied center, and sent Ney against the right and Murat against the left. The allies broke and retreated leaving twenty thousand prisoners. Throughout this day Napoleon rode about his lines, his clothing soaked and that night he suffered a slight chill. His spirits had risen, however, and he believed that the tide at last had turned in his favor. General Vandamme, in the enemy's rear, was expected to complete the annihilation of the retreating Russians and Prussians. He failed, partly through his own weak tactics and partly through Napoleon's failure to pursue his advantage. The latter was laid low by an attack of illness, which some attributed to exposure and exhaustion, but which the emperor, himself, said was "nothing but an attack of indigestion caused by a wretched stew seasoned with garlic, which I cannot endure."

The Napoleonic army was cut to pieces in its subsequent retreat and from that time, August, 1813, misfortune dogged the steps of the emperor of the French.

Bee Kept Fairly Busy

The bee often works both day and night, gathering the pollen and nectar during the daytime and helping to fan the nectar with its wings during the night, to make the sweet fluid thicker by evaporation. One good authority says that it takes twenty thousand bees to make a single pound of honey. It also takes five pounds of the sweet and precious nectar from the flowers to make one pound of honey. So, although the bee does not always work, in accordance with the latest scientific investigations, the phrase "busy as a bee" still retains its full significance.—Our Dumb Animals.

Perfect Miniature Railroad

As a reward for diligence and high standing in his school work, Abel I. Smith, Jr., is having a miniature railroad constructed for him on his father's property in Norfolk, Conn. The tracks will extend 960 feet, and the rails will be three feet apart. The train is a small reproduction of the Twentieth Century Limited, and is composed, besides the small but powerful engine, of five cars, each large enough to hold one person.

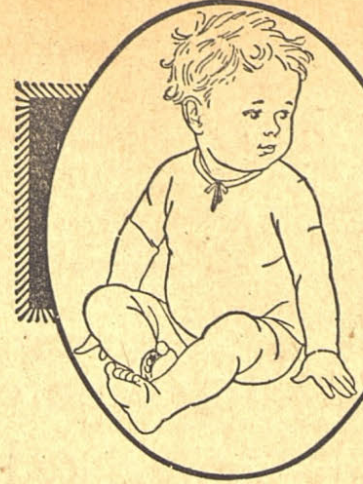
is posed a short jacket of black-and-white-spotted calfskin. Ultra-smartness is the word for this combination.

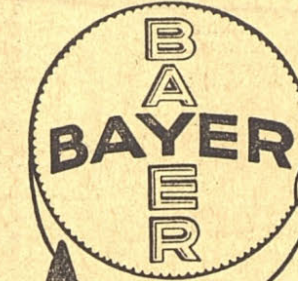

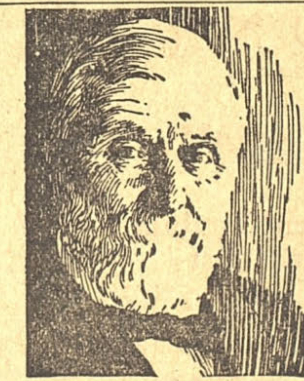

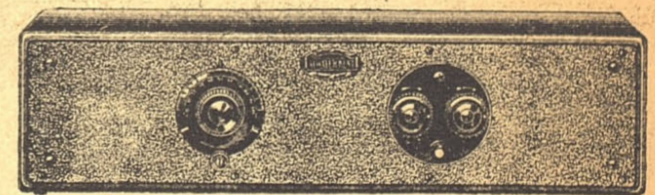
