

BISHOP ALEXANDER C. GARRETT DIES

Dallas, Texas,-The Rt. Rev. Alexander C. Garrett, bi-hop of the Episcopal Diocess of Dalias and presiding hishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church in America, died very suddeny Monday night at his cottage at St. Mary's College, which he found-The Episcopallan prelate, who last November celebrated his ninetyfirst birthday, was apparently in the best of bealth until early Monday morning, when shortly before daybreak Miss Kathleen Lawrence, his secretary, was awakened and found nim suffering from a pain in his chest. Physicians were called, but his illness seemed of slight significauce and it was said that he would recover quickly.

He was visited by a number of friends. With him at the time of his denth were Miss Lawrence, who has been his constant companion since he became blind more than live years ago, Mr. and Mrs. Will J. Lawther, Mr. and Mrs. James E. Forrest and Dr. Samuel Milliken, his physician. It was said that the aged prelate attempted to riso up in his hed, but crompled over after calling to those about him. 
