their discharges and may star sime complete their training later than other veterans. Veterans may apply for guaran-teed or insured GI loans for the use of buying or building homes, farms or business up until July

There are a number of important deadline dates on GI Bill benefits which World War II veterans should keep in mind. Veterans who were discharged on veterans administration officials point out.

GI education and training benefits have two deadlines, one to enter training and another to complete training. Education or training must be started within four years after discharge or by July 25, 1951, whichever is later.

As a general rule, education or training must be completed not later than July 25, 1956. The ex-





Proper Ventilation **Necessary In Winter**

With the advent of cold weather each year in this State, several deaths are usually reported, result-ing from asphyxiation by gas fumes in improperly ventilated homes or sleeping quarters. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a warning in

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a warning in this respect, emphasizing that it is never safe to sleep in a tightly closed room with a gas fire burning. Even if there are no gas leaks, the air soon becomes vitiated and unfit to breathe.

"When occupying a room in which gas is burning, be sure always to have a least one window

which gas is burning, be sure always to have a least one window or door open, to admit fresh air", Dr. Cox said. "If the weather is too cold to permit leaving an open window in the room occupied, then play safe by opening a door into an adjoining room, where a window can be opened."

Dr. Cox said he was prompted to issue this warning early in the season because of the fact that thousands of new residents in the State come from districts where they have been burning coal, wood or oil, and they do not know the dangers of gas fumes in improperly ventilated hcmes.

"It is better not to risk it even one time. Always be sure that your room has nienty of fresh that your room has plenty of fresh air, but make doubly sure when you have a gas fire burning.




