They were taken by Navy pilots in actual storms during the war and have never before been shown to the public. To further insure complete accuracy Captain Howard T. Orville, head of the Navy Aero-logical Service in Washington, D. C., acted as technical advisor to Director Andre de Toth. He is the man who provided the weather information used for the Tokyo raid of April 18, 1942.

Giant "8" Twisters

Reconnaissance techin-que, developed over a period of verals, has the pilots whas ample time to chart the position, the direction and speed of the storm. These readings are radioed to land stations and storm warnings are flashed to the danger areas. CATTLE FEEDING TEST COMPLETED

The results of recently complet-ed cattle feeding experiments at the Big Spring Field Station should be of interest to cattle feeders in

The results of recently completed catche feeding experfements at the Big Spring Field Station should be of interest to cattle feeders in West Texas. This experiment was a study of the influence of mineral supplements in grain sorghum rations for fattening steer calves. Six lots of steers, with six steers to the lot, were used in the experiments and were fed similar rations for 182 days. Lot one received no mineral supplement and was the check or control group and the other five groups received varying amounts of mineral supplements—bone meal and limestone flour.

The best performing group was the one that received 200 grams of bone meal per head per day as a supplement to their ration of ground threshed milo, cotonseed meal, sumac sorgo slage and salt. This was the same ration that was fed to all lots. This lot had the highest daily gain, the lowest feed cost per hundred pounds gain and the best net return per head when they were sold.

J. M. Jones, Animal Husbandman with the Texas Experiment Stations, says that feeding test at Big Springs over a period of years indicate that the feeding of 200 grams of bone meal per head per day is a good practice for the feeders to follow. HOG CARE

Texas Health Week

Governor Allan Shivers, by of-ficial proclamation, has designated the week between December 4-11 as Better Health For Texans Week, emphasizing veneral diseases.

The purpose of the week-long drive, according to State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox, is to "acquaint all segments of the population with true facts concerning this most serious group of illnesses, thus providing a weapon of knowledge which all persons can use in their own protection."

Cox indicated that the health department informational campaign would be a year to year project from now on, with a different phase of public health being the subject each year.

Highlights of this year's drive will be a state-wide radio address by Governor Shivers, and a short motion picture trailer featuring the Governor and the State Health Officer. Informational packets have been prepared for distribution throughout the state by city and county health units.
