

### Bees Valuable Although Not

COLLEGE STATION.-The total value of honey and other products produced by bees in Texas is small compared with other agricultural products. Nevertheless, bees are worth 15 to 20 times more for their pollination service than for the honey and wax they produce.

Legumes such as clovers, alfalfa,

Legumes such as clovers, alfalfa and vetch play an important part in the progress of soil improvement and soil building programs. Seed production in these crops requires insect pollination. Without these insects, such plants or crops will mot set seed or fruit no matter how well cultivated, fertilized and protected they may be from insects and diseases.

When beekeeping is mentioned, the general reference is to honey production. Alex points out. But wherever plants or crops requires insects for pollination purposes, honey bees are vital and often the very basis of agricultural proseperity. Texas has between 25 and 30 such crops.

## Atomic Energy Is Aiding Scientists In Research Work

Atomic energy is providing science with clues "potentially of immeasureable economic signifi-cance, to the age old mystery food.

This was discosed in a 201 page report by the atomic energy com-mission on the use of radioisoto-pes in scientific, industrial, medi-cal and agricultural research.

In the one research field of photosynthesis—the process by which green plants convert sun-light and carbon dioxide from the air into food science has made important strides toward a better world, the AEC reported.

This research, the commission said, is "potentially of immeasureable economic significance ac-counts one way or another "for production of all good."

The rules say the institutions using U. S. isotopes must share world and submit to inspection by any visiting scientists.
