OLD SETTLERS REUNION TODAY

96 Golfers To Compete At Philpeco

KENDRICK PARK TO BE SITE FOR THIS YEAR'S FESTIVITIES

Old settlers of Callahan county will gather at Kendrick park, near the Denton store on the West side of the county, today for their annual reunion. Arrangements have been made to accommodate between 4,000 and 6,000 people, according to Miss Eliza Gilliland, secretary of the organization.

Registration of old timers will get underway at nine o'clock, with badges going to all who came to this county by or before 1890.

Start Program At 10

The morning's program will be officially opened at 10 o'clock with a song-fest, led by W. W. Everett, of Putnam, and Bailey Johnson, of Enla. Following the song-fest introduction of old timers will be made by Jack Scott, of Cross Plains. Pioneer settlers will be called to the rostrum for a few brief reminiscences of the early days in this section.

Luncheon will be spread in picnic style at noon. Pit barbecue will be available to those who desire it for a very small charge.

The afternoon program will be resumed at 1:30 with further introduction of old timers. Other afternoon features will include old fiddlers contest, square dance, election of officers and a baseball game between teams from the East and West sides of the county. East sides will be managed by Norman Coffey, of Cottonwood, and the West sides will be managed by Bailey Johnson.

Everything Ready

Fred Hevser, of Putnam, chairman of the committee in charge of concessions, told the Review yesterday that all arrangements for the celebration had been completed and that everything now stands in readiness for what is believed will be the most successful reunion in history of the organization.

Officers of the association are: Jess Hart, Callahan county's oldest citizen from the standpoint of residence, president; E. L. Russell, veteran Baird attorney, vice-president; Mrs. L. A. Blackburn, prominent Baird lady, vice-president and historian; Miss Eliza Gilliland, editor of the Baird Star, secretary and treasurer.

In view of the fact that the reunion has been held at a different place each year, it is expected that an invitation will be proffered the group to hold next year's affair in Cross Plains. All other sections of the county will have been visited once each by the celebration.

SECOND INSPECTION TRIP TO D'LEON TO BE MADE NEXT WEEK

A second trip to DeLeon to inspect watermelon production and marketing will be made by a number of local businessmen and farmers Tuesday afternoon. 48 from Cross Plains visited DeLeon last Thursday and returned highly enthusiastic over the possibilities of commercial watermelon production.

Clyde D. Sims, president of the local chamber of commerce, announces that cars have been provided to convey a second delegation to DeLeon Tuesday afternoon. The hour of departure is set for 12:30.

"We are especially anxious for as many farmers as possible to make the trip and see what is being done by one of our neighboring towns", Sims said.

If interest warrants, the local chamber of commerce will try to promote the planting of several hundred acres to watermelons next year, and then adequately advertise Cross Plains as a place where melons will be available 24 hours daily during the season.

After the second trip to DeLeon, a mass meeting of businessmen and farmers will probably be called to discuss possibilities of the proposition and a definite program laid out for next year.

Indian Director Under Fire



John Collier, veteran United States commissioner of Indian affairs will be criticized by his charges Friday, August 19 when the fifth national assembly of the American Indian Federation opens at Tulsa, Okla. Joe Bruner, Creek tribal leader and head of the federation, said he would seek Collier's removal from office. Other aims of the group are (1) Indian approval of national Indian legislation and (2) closer relations between Indians.

HOWELL OIL TEST 3,585 FEET DEEP

The J. V. Howell deep test on the E. J. Vesal farm, two miles north of town, was drilling ahead Thursday morning at a depth of 3,585 feet. Progress has been extremely slow the past few days. Three bits were run in the last 15 feet. The formation is said to be a hard sand. Jimmy Howell told the Review Wednesday night that he expected to go into a softer formation immediately and that drilling should then be much easier until the Ellenberger is topped.

Plans call for the drilling to a 4,000 foot horizon or to pay, which is expected in the Ellenberger lime, from which a well on the same tract produced thousands of barrels nearly 20 years ago, before going to the bad.

Good progress is being made on the Phillips deep test near Opalin. Exact depth of the hole was not known yesterday, however, it was believed to be in the neighborhood of 2,000 feet.

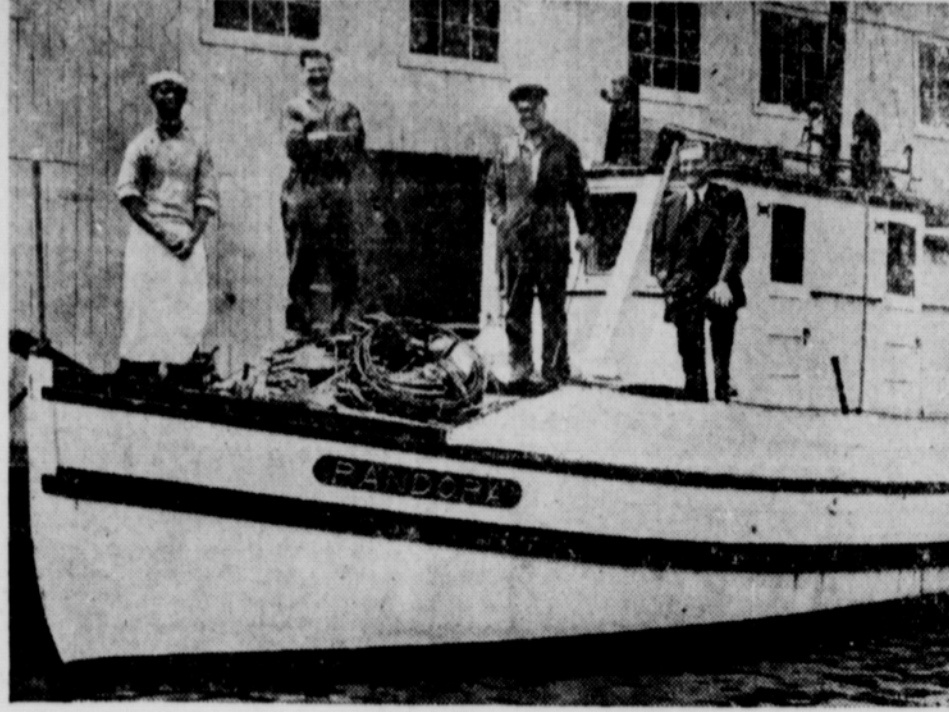

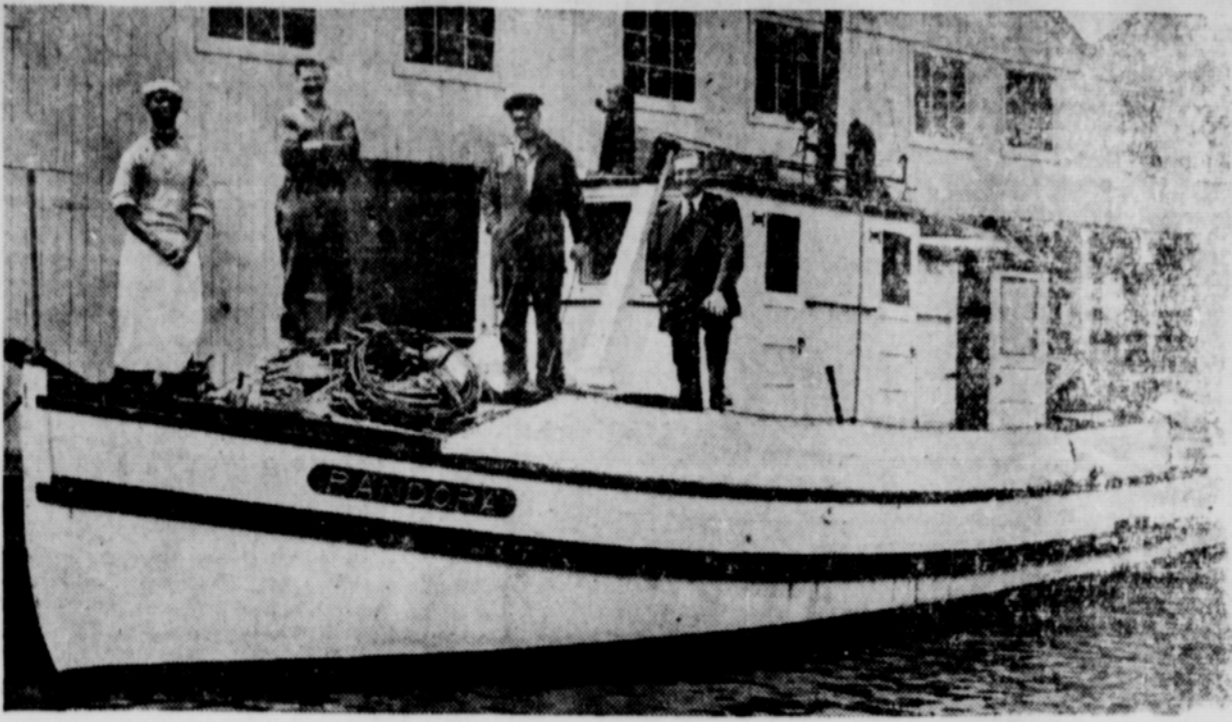

H. J. R. No. 20 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas; changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas; providing for an election upon such Constitutional Amendment, and making appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows: "Article XVI, Section 1. Official Oath. Members of the Legislature, and all officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation: "I, _____, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly or indirectly, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, or promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected. So help me God."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State, qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1938, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words: "FOR the Amendment of Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against said proposed Amendment.

Section 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election in conformity herewith to determine whether or not the proposed Constitutional Amendment set forth herein shall be adopted, and the Governor shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election. The above is a true and correct copy. EDWARD CLARK Secretary of State.
