

New Plant Program Launched By A&M **Extension Service**

COLLEGE STATION-The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has launched a "new planta" pro-gram and already more than 2,000 foreign introductions and collec-tions from the wild flora are now included in the control of the collecincluded in the program.

Plants have been collected from practically all corners of the earth, except Russia and her satellites. Many have come from Central and South America, Africa, India, Tur-key and the Philippines.

The purpose of the program is to find out if the crops under investigation can be grown commercially in Texas or if they can be used in the plant breeding work being done by the Station. Many of these plants may be resistant to disease, and the plants breeder try to breed this resistance new or improved varieties of

by a committee composed of Dr R. G. Reeves, professor of agronoand genetics, who is chairman Dr. R. C. Potts, department of agronomy; Dr. O. E. Sperry, de-partment of range and forestry; E. Mortensen, horticulturist, Winter Oarden Experiment Station and Dr. H. T. Blackhurst, department of horticulture.

Substations and field laboratories of the Texas Station are study-ing each crop that the specialists feel may be adapted to the area in which the substation is located tecture all have work underway under the program. Field units at Chillicothe, Sonora, Weslaco, Win-ter Haven, Stephenville, Montague and Yoakum are conducting in-vestigations with crops that may

adapted to those areas. e adapted to those areas.
Under study are many species of
iliseed crops that have not preiously been produced commercialy in Texas. Among the horticulural crops are new peaches, cutumbers, cantaloupes, avacados and other tropical and sub-tropical fruits. Many of the introduced plants consist of new types of old crops while others are either unme are obviously not adapted to

Some are obviously not adapted to Texas agriculture, but are being studied because they may have characteristics that will prove valu-able to the plant breeders. This new crops research program in the United States is organized on a national, regional and state basis and Texas was the first state in the Southern region to set basis and Texas was the first state in the Southern region to get



INSECTICIDES FOR
COTTON INSECTS

Cotton fields are full of insects and many farmers are finding it hard to find the recommended type of poisons to kill the insects. If sprays are used the recommended materials to use is the Toxaphene or the 2-1 mixture of Toxaphene and DDT. Both of these spray concentrates are getting scarce. If you are using dusting equipment the thing to get is a 20 per cent toxaphene and 40 per cent sulphur mixture or a 3-5-40 mixture. The 3-5-40 means three per cent gamma benzene hexachloride, five per cent DDT and 40 per cent sulphur. Calcium arsenate is also recommended as the rate of 10 to 15 pounds per acre. These dusts are also getting scarce.

These latter recommendations should be used only as emergencies and should not be used if the recommended materials can be se-




