Any high school student unable to register on the designated date should advise prior to that time and make arrangements accordingly.

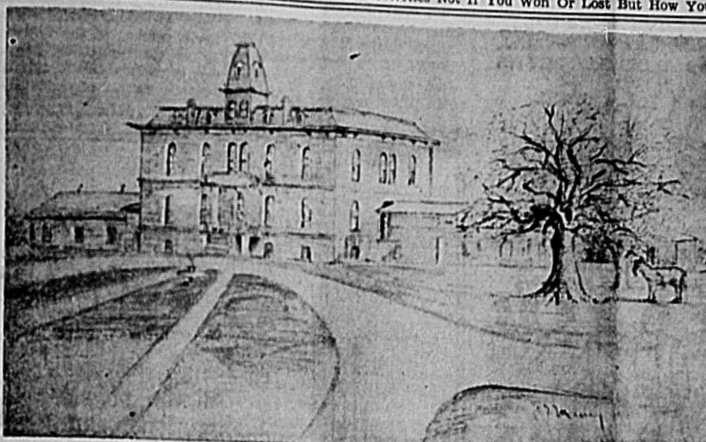
All bus drivers are to meet in the high school building on Monday morning, August 28, at nine o'clock.

New Plant Program Launched By A&M Extension Service

COLLEGE STATION—The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has launched a "new plants" program and already more than 2,000 foreign introductions and collections from the wild flora are now included in the program.

Plants have been collected from practically all corners of the earth, except Russia and her satellites. Many have come from Central and South America, Africa, India, Turkey and the Philippines.

The purpose of the program is to find out if the crops under investigation can be grown commercially in Texas or if they can be used in the plant breeding work being done by the Station. Many of these plants may be resistant to diseases and the plants breeder will try to breed this resistance into new or improved varieties of our basic crops.

The program is being handled by a committee composed of Dr. R. G. Reeves, professor of agronomy and genetics, who is chairman; Dr. R. C. Potts, department of agronomy; Dr. O. E. Sperry, department of range and forestry; E. Mortensen, horticulturist, Winter Garden Experiment Station and Dr. H. T. Blackhurst, department of horticulture.

Substations and field laboratories of the Texas Station are studying each crop that the specialists feel may be adapted to the area in which the substation is located.

At Texas A. & M. College, the departments of agronomy, horticulture, range and forestry and floriculture and landscape architecture all have work underway under the program. Field units at Chillicothe, Sonora, Weslaco, Winter Haven, Stephenville, Montague and Yoakum are conducting investigations with crops that may be adapted to those areas.

Under study are many species of oilseed crops that have not previously been produced commercially in Texas. Among the horticultural crops are new peaches, cucumbers, cantaloupes, avocados and other tropical and sub-tropical fruits. Many of the introduced plants consist of new types of old crops while others are either uncommon in Texas or entirely new. Some are obviously not adapted to Texas agriculture, but are being studied because they may have characteristics that will prove valuable to the plant breeders.

This new crops research program in the United States is organized on a national, regional and state basis and Texas was the first state in the Southern region to get its project going.

Director R. D. Lewis of the Texas Station, is the administrative adviser for the Southern region.

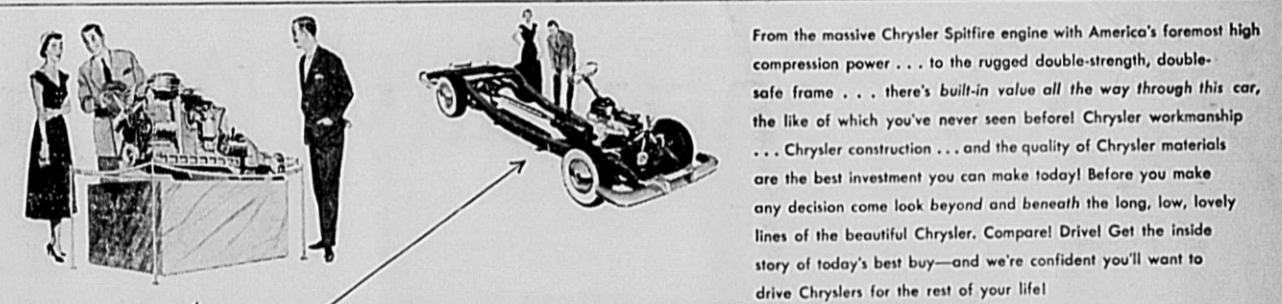

When polio is around, these precautions are recommended: Keep children with their own friends and away from people they have not been with right along. Don't become exhausted through work or hard play. Don't stay in cold water too long or sit around in wet clothes. Avoid becoming chilled. Always wash hands before eating.

Letter To Cross Plains Man In 1879 Told Of Hardships During Civil War

Among the earlier settlers in the Cross Plains area was the late J. P. Brightwell, father of W. P. Brightwell, Mrs. Hattie Spencer and Mrs. George Baum, present residents of this locality.

Mrs. Baum last week provided the Review with an old letter received by her father some time after he settled 10 miles west of Cross Plains in 1876. Because of the unusual interest the old piece of correspondence contains, the letter is reproduced hereunder: Cousin Joe:

We often think of you, and I shall ever remember the evening you and cousin Bettie came over to see us a short time after the surrender. (General Lee's surrender to Grant at Appomattox Court House, ending the Civil War). You know the Yankees had taken all we had, and left us in despair. Your uncle Ben was never going to work or plant again. You told

him you had planed some corn and was going to plant all you could. You infused into him new life and energy to his despairing mind. He went to work and made a fine crop.

I think Providence must have sent you that evening to bind up the broken hearted. Solomon says: "A word fitly spoken is like apples of gold in pictures of silver."

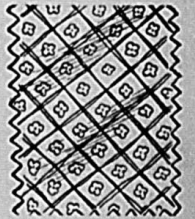

Cross Plains high school band for the highway convention here next Thursday; all scheduled concerts, a parade and appearance within the next seven days.

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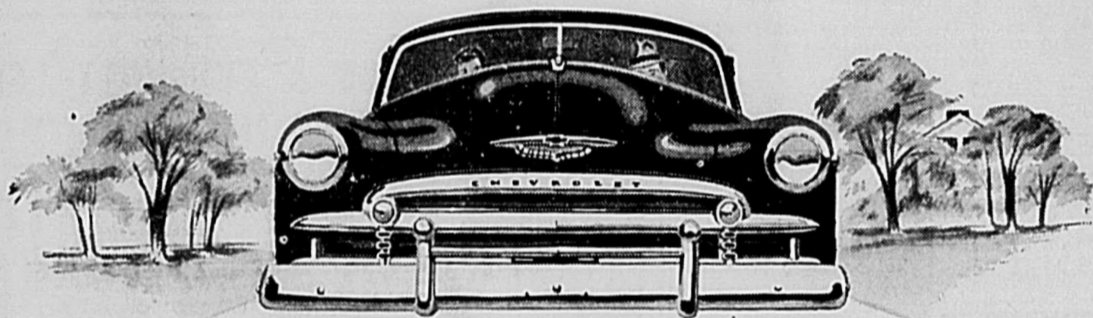
