Anthrax is a highly infectious disease of livestock and man and is extremely fatal. It has been takis extremely fatal. It has been tak-ing a heavy toll of livestock in east and south Texas this year and three cases have been reported in Eastland County. Not only is it transmissable from one animal to another, but it may spread rapidly to all species of livestock and even

The spread of anthrax may be brough about by contamination of the soil, drinking water, and pasture and hay plants with the excreta and discharges of diseased animals. Dogs, coyotes, files, mosquitoes, and particularly buzzards are potential spreaders of anthrax from one area to another.

Periods of rainy weather followed by extremely hot days appear to favor the occurance of the disease. Heavy losses often followin the wake of floods and periodic inundations of low-lying land. Anthrax outbreaks are also frequent The spread of anthrax may be

thrax outbreaks are also frequent thrax outbreaks are also frequent in hot dry years when there is very little growth of the pasture grasses and when the livestock have to graze close to the soil. During these dry seasons, swamps, ponds, marshes, and bottom lands dry up and become available for pasture. In close grazing, roots, in many instances with infected soil clinging to them, are consumed by the animals along with the vegetation.

vegetation.

Anthrax germs could spread from one place to another through the movement of hides, hair, wool, bonemeal, fertilizer, forage, and other materiels associated with the animals. Streams contaminated with the surface drainase from the anthrax soil could carry the infection to many places.

Anthrax germs may lay dormant in the soil for many years until

the soil for many years until e right conditions occur that ake them grow and become ac-

den, the finding of a dead animal commonly being the first sign of the presence of the disease. In all cases of sudden death not precases of sudden death not pre-ceded by symptoms of illness, an-thrax should be suspected and the carcass handled with extreme cau-tion until the death can be at-tributed to some other cause. An-thrax may occur in man as a di-rect result of handling the di-seased animal or being in contact seased animal or being in contact with discharges from the animal. If anthrax is suspected, the stock-man should consult a veterinarian at once rather than open a car-cass for the purpose of making a definite diagnosis.

a definite diagnosis.

The usual picture associated with anthrax is one of sudden death. There may be sudden staggering, collapse, a few convulsive movements, and death. A blood stained discharge from the mouth, nose and anus may be observed.

discharge from the moute, nose, and anus may be observed.

In the acute form the disease usually shows that there is an early period of excitement which is soon followed by depression, stupor, spaams, evidence of respiratory or heart distress, staggering and death. The animal usually dies in two or three days and during this time it may show a temperature of 107 degrees, pregnaft animals may abort, and in milking cows the secretions are materially lessened. Bloody discharges from the natural openings are common, and soft swellings that may pit on pressure may develop in different parts of the bedy.

#### Soil Conservation District News

Seeding time of fall cover crops, especially vetch and rye, is generally as important as how the seeding is done. Of course, weather conditions make all thumb rules variable, but most of the time early seeding, from the middle of September until the middle of October allows enough growth to be made to give a good protection to the soil. These early plants are large enough to withstand 'the cold weather much better and in turn or vigorous enough to begin their main growth earlier in the spring. Buying the seed early and making Buying the seed early and making other necessary arrangements such as securing drills and fertilizer asas securing drills and fertilizer as-sures seeding when the peanuts are plowed up rather than delay while looking for seed and drills. Late harvest of peanuts and feed or cotton prohibits early seeding, but it doesn't prohibit eventual seeding. Successful plantings have been made.

Vetch and rye has proven itself to many people in this area as a cover crop and for soil improving on deep sands and mixed or medium textured sands; but there are also some that have tred vetch and rye in regular width rows on heavy land and have liked the way it improved the friability of the tight land, as well as its stimulating effect on following crops.


