## Black Pavement Is Blamed In Wrecks At Highway Y Here

Black pavement was blamed for the wrecks which occurred at the highway Y, one mile west of Cross Plains, this week. The first happened late Monday and the other Tuesday morning. E. Mitchell, 53, of Cisco, was in the back and shoulders of his car overturned Monday afternoon. A passenger, whom he was giving a ride to Coleman, was injured. Mitchell was placed in a local ambulance and rushed to a Cisco hospital. He said that the wreck occurred after a front wheel slipped off the pavement to a soft shoulder, causing the car to crash into a fence. The automobile was severely damaged. The second wreck happened early Tuesday morning in a similar manner. A large oil field truck, owned by Halliburton, overturned on the Y, however, the driver received only minor bruises and was immediately hospitalized.

## Killing Frost Due Here November 10

Although no records are available for a long period of time, S. Bond advises that average date for the first killing frost in the Cross Plains area is about November 10. ## 3,355,000 CUBIC FEET GAS BOUGHT BY LOCAL SYSTEM DURING AUGUST

Mrs. Ava Childers, city secretary, told the Review Monday that the city of Cross Plains purchased for its municipal gas system during the month of August 3,355,000 cubic feet of gas at 18 cents per thousand cubic feet, making the total bill \$60,390. It was believed that this exceeded the consumption during August and that line loss was responsible for the total figure being as high as it was. The city system sells the first 100 thousand cubic feet at 60 cents per thousand, a minimum of \$1.20 thereafter drop to 45 and 30 cents per thousand.

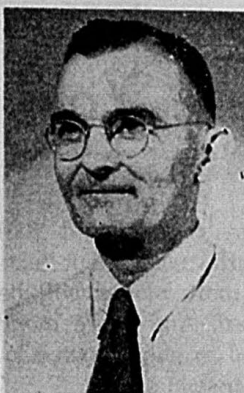

## Bayou Buildings Bring \$3,176.00 In Sale Saturday

The Bayou school building and a two room teacherage were sold through sealed bids Saturday, bringing a total of \$3,176.00. Bids were opened Saturday morning at 10 in the office of County Superintendent B. C. Chrisman and the sales announced shortly thereafter.

The brick school building was sold to W. D. Pierce, Jr., of Owens, Texas, for \$2,826.00. The two room teacherage was bought by G. E. (Edd) Morgan, of Cross Plains, for \$350. The eight acres of land is yet unsold.

It was understood here that Pierce plans to wreck the brick building and salvage materials to be used in erecting a dwelling near his home community of Owens.

Of the \$3,176.00, the Baird school district will get 55.8 per cent, or \$1,772.21. The Cross Plains district gets 44.2 per cent, or \$1,403.79. The Bayou district was consolidated with Cross Plains and Baird several weeks ago and its tax evaluation and bonded indebtedness assumed in proportions to the cash divided after Saturday's sale.

Another teacherage, formerly located on the Bayou school campus, was moved to a site just west of the Rowden store and will serve as a community center. The building was partially equipped and will provide people of that locality a place for holding elections and community get-togethers. A board of three trustees was appointed to look after the property.

Public sale of the eight acres of land will probably be held in the near future and the proceeds split between the Baird and Cross Plains districts.

## Cross Plains To Meet De Leon Here Friday

An improved De Leon high school football team, plagued by a series of defeats, will invade Cross Plains Friday night determined to break into the victory column for the first time since 1947.

Although upset in their first two games by Grandview and Lakeview, the Bearcats are reported to be

much stronger than last season, when they were overwhelmed by the Cross Plains athletes to the tune of 33 to nothing. Smarting under the humiliation of that score and dedicated to handing coach Tom Bishop his first triumph at the De Leon school, the Bearcats will field a strong, experienced

team here Friday night.

Against Grandview, the Bearcats scored touchdowns, losing 25 to 12. The De Leon squad also scored against the strong Lakeview school before going down 21 to 7.

Coach Frank Rundell's boys came out of the Aspermont game last Friday night with no injuries more serious than minor bruises and scratches, and their full strength is expected to be required in the Friday night game, first of the season before a home audience. Most lopsided defeat ever handed a Cross Plains team was by De Leon in 1926, when the Comanche countians rolled up a score of 103 to nothing against the Buffaloes, who were then in their second season of play.

Coaches Tom Bishop and Lloyd Jean will bring a squad of 18 players here for the Friday night non-conference clash. The backs and their weights are: R. Irby 128, C. Crosby 172, R. Eads 142, D. Stacy 153 and T. Weaver 155. The line is much heavier with: V. Moore 205, H. Johnson 226, L. Solly 170, S. Hampton 176, J. Moore 155, R. Goates 175, E. Palmac 165, J. Simpson 141, J. Bush 143, J. Hodges 140, S. Broughton 145, J. Eads 126, R. Whitehead 145, and V. Evans 130.

Although the De Leon team has not scored a victory since 1947, when Gorman was defeated 21 to 7, the team this year is reported to be composed of virtually all seniors and to be far more potent than anything the Bearcats have fielded in the past three years. The Buffaloes may expect to encounter an inspired opponent too, Friday night, for the De Leon youths have reportedly dedicated themselves to avenging the 33 to nothing lacing at the hands of Cross Plains early last season.

## Collis Eager Sells First 1950 Peanuts

First load of new crop peanuts was sold in Cross Plains Friday by Collis Eager. The peanuts were bought by W. T. Cox and the load which weighed 13,022 pounds brought \$1,336.77. The nuts tested 69.

## Burkett Has Proof Small School Can Be Successful

While many schools are curtailing their curriculums and others are being absorbed by consolidation, there is one small West Texas institution which continues to function in smooth accord. It is at Burkett, where W. R. Chambers, veteran school master, keeps everything moving like clockwork.

Many patrons feared that the Glimmer-Aiken law would sound the death knell for schools like Burkett, and in some cases their fears were well founded. But in the case of the Burkett school in particular the outlook is bright.

Burkett's enrollment this year is a few more than last, a faculty of seven qualified teachers registered 108 students the first day of school early this month, and the number is expected to reach 120.

Students graduating from Burkett school have made excellent records at colleges and universities. A Review reporter who recently visited the school noticed a letter of commendation on the school bulletin board, praising Mr. Chambers and members of the Burkett faculty on the college work being done by one of their former students. "It reflects genuine credit upon this young man's high school preparation,"

the letter from a college dean said. Questioning revealed that the young man who was doing so well in college was no better than an average student while at Burkett, indicating the high standard being maintained.

Lessons come first at Burkett, and there is no exception to this rule, but Superintendent Chambers finds time to coach a boys basketball team which annually piles up an impressive record of victories, competing against schools several times the size of Burkett. Although all but one member of last year's boys basketball team graduated at Burkett, fans are expecting another successful season. This, despite the fact that there are only 10 boys in high school eligible for competition.

Of last year's graduating class of six, three are now enrolled in college. One other accepted a position at the Citizens State Bank in Cross Plains, another is farming, and the sixth is yet at Burkett.

With 21 units of affiliation, a tax valuation of near \$700,000.00 and a citizenship almost 100 per cent behind the educational program, outlook for Burkett's school is bright, and Prof. Chambers and his staff are expected to be doing business at the same old stand for many years to come.

## Senior Class Has Been Saving 3 Years For Trip It Hopes To Make Next June

Looking forward to a grand tour they hope to make upon graduating from high school, members of the class of '50, are now attempting to successfully complete a financial drive begun when they were sophomores.

Although the class has not yet decided where they will go, among the places mentioned are: Florida, Mexico City and the Grand Canyon. Their objective is to make \$1,000, during their high school career to finance the tour. At present the seniors have in their treasury \$217. This

money was raised operating cold drink concessions at the last two Cross Plains picnics, producing a class play, operating stands at Halloween carnivals and other similar endeavors.

It is pointed out that the class coffers would have contained much more money had it not been for functions given last year to compliment graduates of 1949. For instance the class staged a very unusual banquet for last year's graduates, entailing expenses, all of which were paid from the treasury. In addition last year's graduates were given a picnic

and outing at Cisco lake and several other social functions. "We spent rather generously," says Russell Wright, class president, "but after all we hoped to set an inspiring example for the class to follow us."

Parents and friends who have watched the students ambitious attempt to earn funds for their grand tour have become intensely concerned in their success and will watch the final result with keen interest.

# Cross Plains Ties Aspermont 6 to 6

Cross Plains high school Buffaloes came from behind and scored in the fading minutes of the season's first football game at Aspermont Friday night to deadlock the contest at six all.

Aspermont scored early in the first quarter, taking the initial kick-off and driving straight down the field 64 yards to cross the double stripe. An attempted conversion from placement was blocked by the center section of the

Cross Plains line.

Coach Frank Rundell's boys rebounded from the set-back to take command of the situation, holding the fleet Hornet backs to negligible gains, however, it was late in the last quarter before they were able to push over from the one yard stripe with quarterback Bobby Cearley carrying. With the score tied at six all, the Cross Plains team elected to plunge through center for the much needed extra point. The effort was so

close that a full minute elapsed after the play before officials were able to announce the unsuccessful result.

Statistically speaking the Buffaloes scored a moral victory, rolling up eight first downs to the Hornet's six. Cross Plains had a net gain of 162 yards from scrimmage to 70 for Aspermont. The Buffaloes attempted two passes completing both for a total of 14 yards. The Hornets took to the air 12 times, connecting only twice for an aggregate of 12 yards, while two were intercepted.

Penalties and fumbles bogged down offensive threats for both teams, however, Cross Plains suffered more from the miscues than did the opposition. Seven times the herd drew penalties, for a total of 75 yards. Aspermont was set-back by officials five times for a total of 55 yards. Several penalties were inflicted at significant points in the game erasing large gains. In the matter of fumbles, both sides displayed loose ball handling. Cross Plains lost possession twice and Aspermont once, but the defense was aided on numerous other occasions where ownership of the pigskin did not change. Many plays failed to function as a result of backfield juggling, giving linemen time to sift through and stack ball carriers for losses.

The large crowd which accompanied the Cross Plains team to Aspermont for the game seemed agreed that the Buffaloes will develop into a potent aggregation, needing only additional time to polish teamwork.

### LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING SPEED LIMITS IN SCHOOL ZONES, HOSPITAL ZONES, CHURCH ZONES AND ANY OTHER ZONE WHICH MAY HEREAFTER BE DECLARED HAZARDOUS TO PEDESTRIANS; PROVIDING FOR SUFFICIENT WARNING SIGNS; AND PROVIDING PENALTIES NOT TO EXCEED \$200.00 FOR VIOLATING THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CROSS PLAINS, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Hereafter it shall be unlawful for a driver of any vehicle to exceed the speed limit as designed by warning signs posted at the beginning of any zone ap-

proaching a school, hospital, church or any other zone which has been plainly marked by warning signs and declared by the City Council as hazardous to pedestrians. Provided that such zones shall be established by resolution or resolutions adopted by the City Council as authorized by Section 8 of Article 827a, Penal Code of the State of Texas.

SECTION 2. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200.00) and each violation thereof shall be and is hereby declared to be a distinct and separate offence and punishable as such.

SECTION 3. The fact that traffic on the streets of the City of Cross Plains has greatly increased with the growth of the City's population, and the fact that existing ordinance of said City do not afford an adequate and comprehensive regulation and control of the traffic in zones where schools, etc. may be located, create the necessity for this ordinance to be passed and become effective upon its first reading and publication as provided by the general laws of Texas, and it is so ordained.

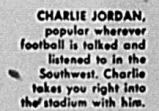

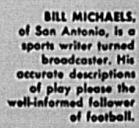

with the help of qualified persons or agencies to plan to insure pure water; safeguard waste disposal; assure clean foods, insect and rodent control, and control of communicable diseases; promote health examinations and dental care; and obtain doctors, nursing and laboratory examination and hospital care for the ill.

She states that every family in the community can be a part of

this action program for promoting an awareness of the need for good health instead of merely being "ill-health conscious".

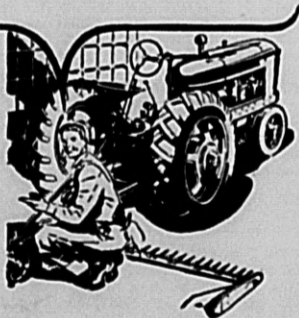

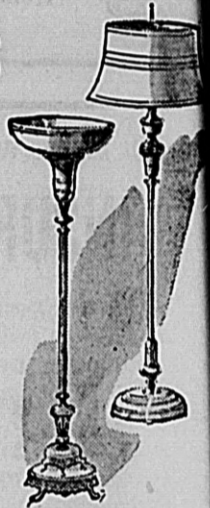

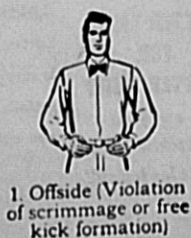
