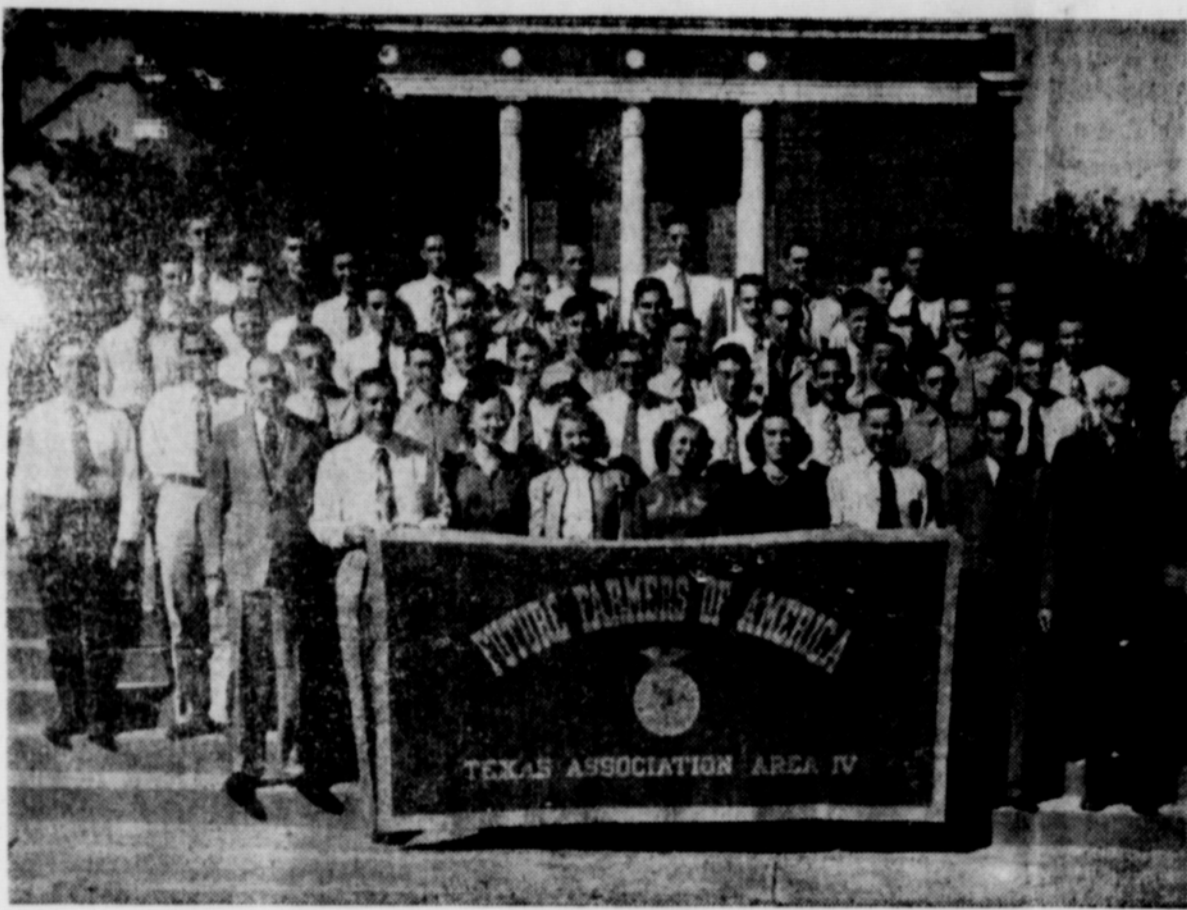

"The destruction of mosquito breeding places and rat harborage, the proper disposal of garbage and trash and the general cleaning up of all premises," said Dr. Cox, "will be of incalculable value in helping to keep down summer health hazards such as dysentery, typhoid, and poliomyelitis. Good community house-keeping and ordinary sanitary measures require the prompt removal of all waste matter in and around yards and homes in order to abate the danger of such diseases, and insure good health protection throughout the state."

Dr. Cox stressed the fact that many dangerous diseases are filth-borne, and the only possible way to control them is to eliminate the insanitary conditions responsible for their spread.

GIVE EXPLANATION AS TO WHY CITY'S BONDS ARE OWED

When the matter of the city of Cross Plains' bonded debt arises in local discussions the question is often asked: "For what is all of this money owing?" Feeling that the general public would appreciate the information as to the exact amount of the city's bonded indebtedness and for what purpose the bonds were issued, the Review has secured this information. The present total of \$109,750 bonds were issued in 1936 to finance the city at that time. The interest rate on bonded indebtedness was six per cent and by refinancing in 1938 the city council then was able to secure a lower rate and at the same time issue additional bonds for past due interest coupons, which were then outstanding. Of the \$109,750 issue in 1936, \$38,000 was used to take up six percent bonds on the local water works, dated March 15, 1925. \$29,000 was used to take up street improvement bonds bearing six percent interest and which had been originally issued June 1, 1927. An additional \$30,000 was to take up six percent sewer warrants dated August 15, 1926. The remaining \$32,750 was to pay off outstanding coupons for unpaid interest on the bonded debt at that time. The local city government is endeavoring to arrange another refinancing program at this time, whereby the interest rate, which is now four percent, might be reduced, however, these plans are only in the formative stage and will be presented to property owners, thoroughly before any official steps are taken. PEANUT ACREAGE 3 PERCENT BELOW LAST YEAR TOTAL
 Statistics are that peanut acreage in 1947 will be 3,847,000 acres, only three percent less than 1946's. The average planting, states the National Peanut Council, trade association of the Peanut industry, last year's peanut production topped the two billion pound mark for the sixth consecutive year and was 15 percent above the 1935-45 ten year average. Peanuts are now the sixth crop of the United States, the 8th of the South. Peanut farmers have derived \$300,000,000 from the crop last year, and the sales of shells, crushes, confectioners, and peanut butter manufacturers add up to many more millions, producing wages for thousands of employees.
 "Peanuts have obviously attained definite place in the American diet along with apple and ice cream," says James E. Wood, president of the National Peanut Council.
 Three growing areas comprise the peanut belt. In the Virginia-Carolina area, this year's acreage is reported to be about the same as last year's with slight increases in Virginia and Tennessee. Offsetting reduction in North Carolina; the southeastern area, it is believed, will have a three percent decrease in acreage. Georgia and Mississippi acreage reduced acreage, while South Carolina and Florida plan slight increases. In the Southwest, production of 30,000 acres in Texas expected to be partly offset by anticipated increases in Louisiana and Oklahoma.
