Change In Review Ownership Is Told

In a transaction consummated Monday morning Jack Scott sold his three-fourths interest in the Cross Plains Review to D. J. (Jack) McCarty of Glen Rose. The trade was made retroactive to Aug. 1.

Benny Glover, who has owned a quarter interest in the local newspaper since March 15, 1965, has established a partnership with McCarty and will continue as editor of the hometown publication.

Ted Souder, popular local businessman who has been with the Review since January, will continue with the firm taking on new responsibilities in advertising and merchandising in addition to duties in the mechanical department.

Ethlyo Dickson, who until a few weeks ago was secretary at the First Baptist Church here, has taken over reportorial and bookkeeping duties at the newspaper. She is a graduate of Texas Woman's University and qualified by both education and personality to handle these duties in an enviable fashion.

McCarty, who by virtue of having plied his trade in many cities over a period of more than 35 years, is one of Texas most widely-known weekly newspaper publishers. He is presently renewing old ties in Cross Plains having served as editor and publisher of the Review from May 1951 until Jan-

uary 1960, when he and Scott became joint owners and publishers. In 1963 the two men bought the Glen Rose Reporter and McCarty moved there to expand that paper. Under his guidance and that of his son, Dan, a third generation Texas newsman, the paper has become a journalistic leader in its section of the state. In 1965 McCarty and Scott dissolved their partnership with each becoming full owner of the paper he was at that time running.

It was at this juncture that Glover, a native of Cross Plains who had learned the trade in the local printing plant, became associated with Scott and moved into the editorship. During his tenure the newspaper which has long been a prize winner in journalistic competition, added more than a dozen trophies of various types. Glover is particularly adept at sports writing being generally regarded as one of the finest in his field.

McCarty will serve as publisher and general manager of both the Cross Plains and the Glen Rose newspapers, dividing time between the two.

Before first coming to Cross Plains McCarty was associated with the late M. S. (Doc) Sellers in ownership and publication of the Rising Star newspaper. He sold his interest in that property when he came to Cross Plains, however, during the mid-1950's he reacquired the business and operated it a couple of years in partnership with Weldon Wooten, who had also learned the printing trade in the Cross Plains Review plant.

Scott's tenure with the hometown newspaper began in July 1930. He is rounding out more than 30 years with the Review. During world War II he supervised a military newspaper in the Philippines. He recently underwent eye surgery and when asked about his plans for the future said "For a while I'm just going to let my eyes rest, reading nothing with smaller type than the funny page."

3-Day Rainfall Nets 1.22 Inches In City

Rain showers which fell over Cross Plains and surrounding countryside Friday, Saturday and Sunday of last week totaled 1.22 inches here, according to records maintained by F. C. Newton, official observer for the National Weather Service.

The three-day total, combined with 1.47 inches which was received on Aug. 1, brought to 2.69 inches rainfall recorded here during this month. Aggregates since showers began falling late last month gives the Cross Plains area about eight inches, and areas north of Cross Plains have totaled approximately six inches. The Burkett community has measured a similar amount, but totals west of here including the Rowden area have been somewhat less.

Outlook for almost all crops now appears bright, and stockmen report pastures growing rapidly. Some stock ponds are reported full, but most are still below normal level although almost every one caught some water from the mostly slow rains.

According to Newton's records Cross Plains had received 11.98 inches of rain to Tuesday at noon, still far below the norm of 24.54 for a full year. May is still the wettest month in 1971 with 3.75 inches, but August with its 2.69 net is second.

Federal Housing Units Here Full; Waiting List Said Long

Two federally-subsidized, low-rent housing developments here, which accepted first tenants in March 1967, have remained full and Mrs. Oran S. Bains, executive director, reports a lengthening list waiting vacancies.

The projects consist of 14 apartments for elderly occupants situated one block west of Main Street, and another development of six apartments for younger renters, located two blocks east of Cross Plains school campus.

Cost of the two developments ran \$255,601.78 and construction began in March 1965. A Temple firm served as general contractor.

Most apartments are of the one-bedroom type and Mrs. Bains declares that average rental is \$26 per month for one person.

"We could rent twice as many apartments as we now have",

Mrs. Bains said, "and there has been talk of applying for additional units but nothing has been done in this regard recently".

Five persons, three men and two women, serve on the board of directors for the housing projects. They are appointed by the mayor and those presently serving are Claude Foster, Elvis B. Scott, Louis Richardson, Mrs. D. C. Jones and Mrs. Howard E. Coburn.

The \$255,601.78 which was supplied through the Housing Assistance Administration is to be repaid over a 40 year period.

Mrs. Bains said the Cross Plains project paid about \$700 one year and \$1500, another toward the bond obligations.

HOME AND FAMILY HINTS FROM HIGGINBOTHAMS

Do you have to "see it to believe it"? Then you may be living under the misconception that harmful moisture presents no threat to your home. Moisture will eventually be both seen and believed when ugly rusting or decay of building materials begin in your home, when paint blisters and peels, wood warps and mildew and fungi grow.



"Moisture created within the home will seek the path of least resistance to the outside, and this path is often through the walls, causing moisture damage inside and outside.

"Moisture created in my home? There's no such thing!" Think a minute! Breathing and perspiration create water vapor — an average of 1/2 pint per hour for a family of four. Dishwashing for four — three times a day — averages one pint of moisture per day. Washing clothes adds approximately 5 pints of moisture. Each family member taking a shower will add a half pint of moisture to the interior atmosphere; tub baths add less. Steam from cooking food and moisture from gas combustion can total approximately 5 pints from three meals for four.

If proper steps are taken to combat moisture BEFORE it begins its rampage, it will probably never cause serious damage. Ventilating fans and louvers (from the slotted kind used in roof gables to the devices designed for insertion in structural materials) permit air to circulate and dry out moisture that would otherwise invade the walls.

Vapor barriers can be installed beneath the plaster during construction of a new home. Or a finished wall can be coated on the interior with an impervious wall paint, such as a quality primer sealer. A good coating of paint should be applied behind radiators and other fixtures, inside the closets and cupboards, and behind shelves and other boards attached to walls.

When possible, open a window in bathroom, wash room, and kitchen when doing things that will create air moisture, and close the doors that lead to the rest of the house too. Another good idea is to regularly air out your home . . . particularly during the winter months . . . to let moisture out and fresh air in.

To guard against moisture from exterior sources such as the weather, check gutters and downspouts for proper drainage AWAY from the home's foundation, moisture-proof foundations, inspect roofs regularly, make sure that wooden siding does not come in contact

with the ground and that glazing and caulking around joints and seams is done properly and maintained.

All these things considered and done, you'll be safe from moisture damage and can look through an unfogged window with the knowledge that moisture's unseen destruction is a stranger to your home. Combat moisture's menace with quality Jones-Blair paints from your Higginbothams store.

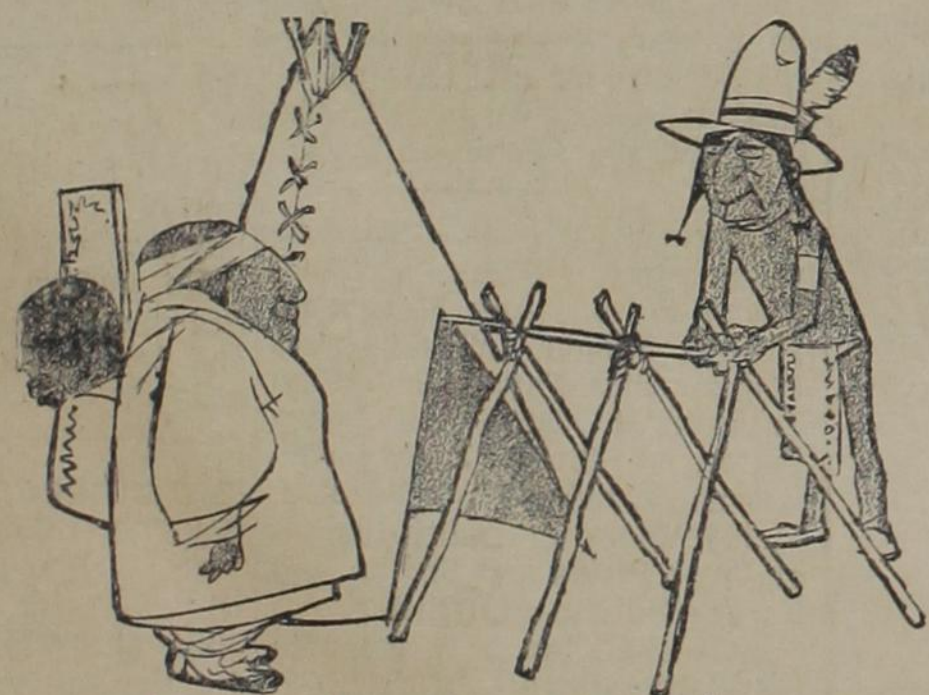

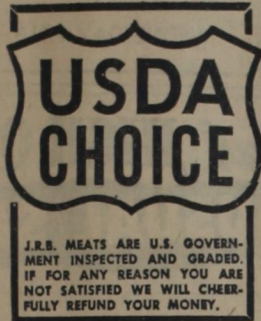


