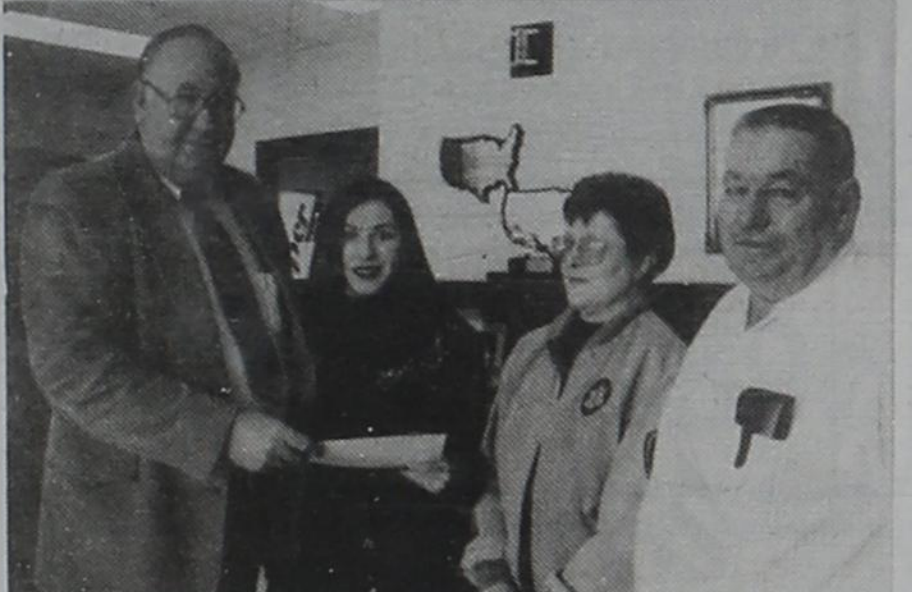

Callahan County Sheriff Of 16 Years Passes Away

Bill W. Skinner, 62, died Friday, January 19, 1996 at his home after a 2 1/2 month illness.

Services were at 2:00 p.m. Monday, January 22, 1996 in the First Baptist Church with the Rev. Riley Fugitt officiating, assisted by the Rev. Jack Willoughby. Burial was in Ross Cemetery Annex, directed by Parker Funeral Home.

Mr. Skinner was born November 13, 1933 in Harleton, Texas. He had lived in Baird since 1960, moving here from Marshall, where he was raised. He was a military veteran, farmer, rancher and milk distributor before being elected Callahan County Sheriff in 1976. He remained in the office for 16 years. He was working for as an investigator for Knowles Investigation Service. He was a member of the First Baptist Church in Baird, Sheriff's Association and the Peace Officers Association. He married Beverly Lowrey July 23, 1988 in Baird.

While he was probably best known for wearing a badge, he also drew notoriety for wearing a guitar across his chest. The "singing sheriff" didn't hesitate about leaving the band during a performance if duty called him away.

Wayne Knowles, who was Skinner's chief deputy in the sheriff's office, said he was "more than just a lawman, he was a friend to the residents of Callahan County. He was a fine and honest lawman. He was devoted to his community. He went way above and beyond the call of duty as a law officer. He was a friend, and he really cared for the people of Callahan County. He was a really fine fellow."

He was preceded in death by one daughter, Robyn Skinner in 1975; and one brother, Neill Skinner in 1985.

Survivors include his wife, Beverly Skinner of Baird; one daughter, Tammy Schneider of Clyde; one son, Kerry Skinner of Baird; one stepdaughter, Beverly Miller of San Angelo; one brother, Ray Skinner of Diana, Texas; three sisters, Pat Skinner of Marshall, Joyce Taylor of Levelland, Bettie Barber of Marshall; 10 grandchildren; and numerous nieces and nephews.

Remember The Boys In Gray

Jasper Newton Bowen was born in 1842 at Alabama. He came to Texas in 1877 and to Callahan County in 1905. Jasper married Margaret Bowen March 1, 1866 at Tuscaloosa, Alabama.

The records show that J.N. Bowen enlisted in the 5th Golladay's Alabama Infantry - Battalions C.S.A. in 1862 at Tuscaloosa, Alabama. Transferred to the 50th Alabama Infantry Regiment Company F. He surrendered April 1865.

The 50th was ordered to Tennessee and fought at Shiloh, saw action in Kentucky. It fought in many conflicts from Murfreesboro to Atlanta. Endured Hood's winter campaign in Tennessee, and was active in North Carolina. At Chickamauga 16 killed and 81 wounded and was badly cut up at Franklin. Few surrendered in April 1865.

One day seven old Confederates were sitting on the covered wooden porch of the Cottonwood Post Office about 1910, talking about battles of long, long ago. A band arrived. Such an unscheduled event was unheard of in Cottonwood. Young men in cadet uniforms carried horns, drums, cymbals in their hands. They were from a state college and on tour with the mission of converting more rural youths to the idea of higher education. They gathered around a tall, gray man, who was also in uniform. He was the director. All the Saturday afternoon crowd knotted around them in front of the post office. The band director tooted a whistle. The band boys snapped to attention and in a stiff-legged movement stepped into formation. They raised

their horns. The director came down with a stick in his hand.

The band cut loose with a rousing of "Dixie". At the first notes of "Dixie" the veterans on the post office porch shot up as if they had been worked by a spring. They yelled, and each one threw his hat into the air. They jumped up and down and beat each other on the back. Occasionally they roared out full Rebel yells in unison. Their eyes glistened.

The director jerked his little stick up and down. The music came faster and faster. The old vets jumped and yelled and stamped their hats. When finally the music ceased, with a crash equal to the one with it commenced, the Confederates hugged each other as if they had been long lost brothers, and sobbed and cried.

Jasper N. Bowen was there that day. He departed this life on the 13th day of January, 1915. He was buried in the Cottonwood Cemetery, Callahan County, Texas.

The other six Confederate Veterans there that day were A. W. Booth, J.A. Coats, E.N. Coffey, J.M. Hembree, T.J. Norrell and J.T. Respass.

All six men are buried in the Cottonwood Cemetery.

The day the Band came to Cottonwood as six year old boy was an eye witness to the South came a live again, who was Lewis T. Nurdyke in his book "Nubbin Ridge". Edmond N. Coffey was his grandfather and had brought him to town that day. So if you are ever at Cottonwood you may still hear the echo of that Rebel Yell.

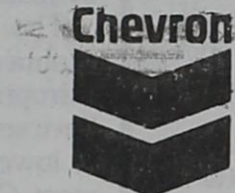

IF YOU CHIP A TOOTH

Billy was playing sandlot baseball. He was catcher - a brave one - without a mask. As fate would have it, the batter swung at a pitch and the backswing hit Billy in the mouth and chipped off two of his front teeth. This is a typical dental emergency which requires immediate dental care.

When injury exposes the tooth pulp, it can be serious since the potential for infection is high. The pulp is the innermost chamber of the tooth and contains nerves and blood vessels.

Temporary treatment of injured tooth pulp includes the use of a sedative dressing to cut down sensitivity in the area. If the pulpctomy (removal of the pulp material) is necessary, it will be

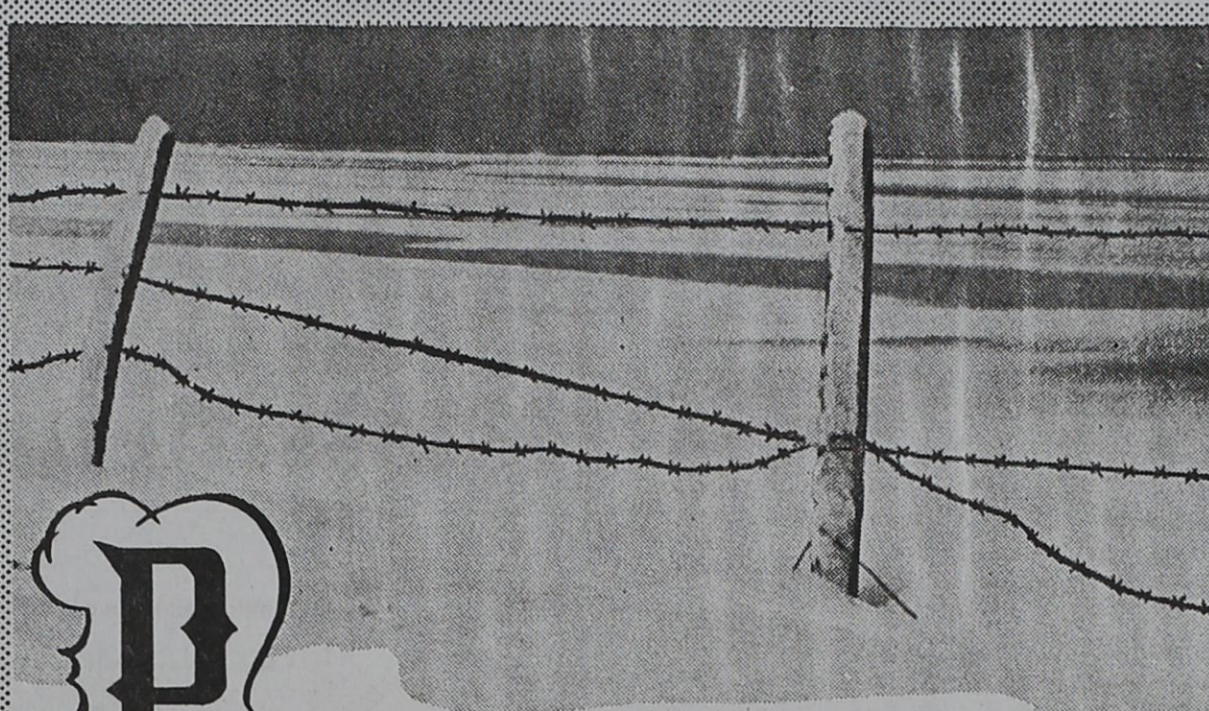
followed by root-canal therapy, and the use of a sedative dressing to cut down sensitivity in the area. If a pulpctomy (removal of the pulp material) is necessary, it will be followed by root-canal therapy, and the use of a crown or a cap if the tooth can be preserved.

Until you can get to a dentist following an injury, keep the mouth as clean as possible by rinsing it with a solution of salt water. If there are loose teeth, no food should be chewed until the teeth are stabilized in the jaw.

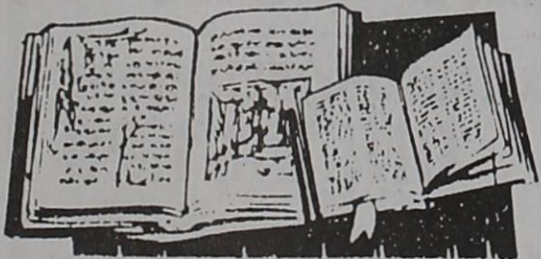
