Baird Junior Rodeo Competition Spirited

A cowboy and a cowgirl from southwest Texas, both in the 13-15 age division, were named all-around performers at the final performance of the Baird Junior Rodeo here Saturday.

The pair took saddles home as top prizes for their performances. Both competed Saturday night, taking the leading positions in several events from earlier pace-setters.

Nubbin Smith of McCamey gathered his points by placing first in his division of tie-down roping and second in the flag race.

Suzanne Newman of Van Horn was the overall leader in barrel racing and second in pole bending and flag racing.

Callahan County performers found competition rough in the bur-night rodeo held at the Callahan County Sheriff's Posse arena. Only five Callahanians placed in the top three of the numerous events on the show's card.

The rodeo, which was once postponed because of the horse sleeping sickness (VEE), ran Wednesday through Saturday nights.

Paula Wright of Cross Plains was the lone first place winner from Callahan. She tied her goat in 15.3 seconds for the best time in the girls 13-15 age bracket.

Earning second place in the bull riding event for boys 13-15 was George McWhorter of Clyde.

Other three top finishers from this county took third places. Terry Edington of Cross Plains was timed in 10 seconds in the girls 16-19 flag race. Vern Lawrence of Baird was timed in 16.6 seconds in the tie-down roping for boys 13-15. Edna Hawk of Clyde scored 54 points in the bull riding event for boys 16-19.

Buffaloes Bow To Wylie 14-6 In Football Opener

Cross Plains Buffaloes scored the first time they had the ball in opening football season at Wylie last Friday night, but a reverse and pass interception with a bit of rinky-dink ball handling let the host Bulldogs post a 14-6 win.

Buffaloes took possession on the Wylie 30 after the Bulldogs could not move on first offensive series. Two running attempts lost two yards and a pass fell incomplete after Bisons had picked up 10 yards on three surges at the line for a first on the Wylie 20. On fourth down Quarterback Roger Crawford threw a strike to End Oliver Robertson 22 yards downfield for the touchdown with 8:02 left in the initial stanza. A pass to Halfback Rodney Renfro was complete on the two-point conversion attempt, but it lacked the necessary distance.

After Wylie failed to move, Cross Plains drove to the Bulldog 20 late in the first stanza, primarily on a 26-yard pass from Quarterback Ricky Kirkham to Robertson. There the drive fizzled.

Local Man Among Six Indicted By Grand Jury

Riley Reed, 17, of Cross Plains was among six persons indicted in felony charges by the 42nd District Court, Callahan County, grand jury in session at Baird Thursday. He was indicted on a charge of making a forged driver's license form.

Other indictments were: Jack Baldwin Collins of Haskell, possession of marijuana; Dorothy Waters, no address listed, theft by bailee; James F. Gaughan, Jr., 22, no address given, felony check swindling;

Virgil E. Brown, 46, of Abilene, and Gary Haile, 22, of Baird, both for driving while intoxicated (DWI), second offense.

Three persons were "no-billed" by the grand jurors. They were Bobby Reed of Abilene, charged with receiving and concealing stolen property; Johnny Miller of Quanah and Jack Alexander, both charged with felony theft.

Information was presented grand jurors by Assistant Criminal District Attorney Sam Moore.

Burleson Asks Pick-Ups Be Included In Tax Help

Congressman Omar Burleson, a member of the Ways and Means Committee of the U. S. House of Representatives, commented briefly today on his effort to include pickup trucks used as passenger vehicles in any legislation to remove the 7 percent excise tax on automobiles.

As the Ways and Means Committee began its hearings on the President's economic proposal, with Secretary John Connally testifying, Congressman Burleson, representative from this district of Texas, made inquiry about removing the tax on pickup trucks. Burleson pointed out that many farm and ranch families do not own an automobile but use their pickups for both pleasure and business. "It becomes the family car in a great many instances," he said, and indicated there is often little distinction between the use of automobiles and pickups. He continued, "It seems to me that it is discriminatory unless

to have some estimate of the amount of money involved, but cautioned that some limitation would necessarily be required. He agreed he would have a difficult time distinguishing between the two, as Burleson presented the case.

Congressman Burleson indicated he would continue efforts to remove the excise tax from pickups as the Committee continues its deliberations. This type vehicle is included."

Bluestem, Indian grasses, Bluestem, Irish potatoes, sweet potatoes, onions, large tomatoes, pears, peaches, pumpkin (mammoth) cantaloupes, watermelons, bell pepper, hot pepper, okra, cucumbers, pinto beans, green peas.

Second place winners: rye, barley, vetch, black-eye peas, peanuts, other seeds, cowpea vines, native grasses, K. R. Bluestem, Bluestem, Irish potatoes, sweet potatoes, small tomatoes, apples, watermelons, okra, side oats gamma seed.

Third placers: barley, vetch, peanuts, other seeds, side oats gamma seed, yellow corn, cowpea vines, native grasses, side oats gamma grass, Indian grass, Irish potatoes, onions, cantaloupes, okra, cucumbers, green peas.

Fourth place: alfalfa, Bluestem, shelled pecans, dried peas.

Cross Plains Buffaloes will take on non-conference foe Santa Anna Mountaineers at the latter's field at 8 p.m. Saturday.

The clash will be the second for both teams, and both will be looking for the first victory in 1971. Bisons bowed to Wylie 14-6 last week, and Baird humbled the Mountaineers 20-6.

Friday's hosts have been tabbed as favorite to win the championship of District 18-B. The Mountaineers are the first of three of that loop's members the Herd will tangle with.

The Mountaineers have 12 returning lettermen from the squad that Bisons defeated 18-7 last season. All the returnees are seniors and juniors most with at least two years experience.

Heading the list of monogram winners back are talented back Ricky Beal and front line warriors Mark Wise and Randall Lovelady.

Another classic struggle is expected between two schools which have played on about even terms in recent years.

School Enrollment Near '70-71 Total

Enrollment at Cross Plains schools had been climbing steadily since opening of the new term on Tuesday, Aug. 24 until last week when five students left. In spite of the five scholastics leaving here, enrollment is

within two of the close of last term. Student enrolled count Monday showed a total of 254 pupils in the 12 grades, first through seniors, compared to 256 at the close of the term last Spring.

High school enrollment is up by four students. Scot Edington, principal, reported 189 students enrolled Monday, compared to 185 at end of the 1970-71 school year. He reported that top enrollment figure was 194 this semester, but five pupils withdrew Thursday.

Jack Watkins, elementary principal, reported figures that showed a decline of six students over last year. He had 265 scholastics on rolls Monday, as compared to 271 at close of school last Spring. He said that the enrollment in the eight grammar school grades had been steadily growing since opening of school.

Twenty-one pre-school students are enrolled in the kindergarten program here and are not included in the total enrollment figure.

Edington released the following figures on enrollment by classes in high school: seniors 39, juniors 54, sophomores 47, and freshmen 49.

Watkins listed enrollments by grades as follows: eighth 38, seventh 41, sixth 45, fifth 39, fourth 25, third 31, second 27 and first 19.

Although local school administrators hoped for more additions within the next few days, it was thought by most of them that the enrollment would remain about the same through this school year.

2 Local Teachers Earn Honors In Education

Two long time teachers in Cross Plains schools have been selected as Leaders of American Secondary Education for 1971, according to an announcement by Wayne Ford, superintendent of the local school system.

They are Mrs. D. C. (Vivian J.) Lee, who retired at close of the term last Spring, and O. B. Edmondson, vocational agriculture teacher.

Mrs. Lee taught 43 years in public education, 35 of which were with the Cross Plains school system. Primarily her tenure was as a high school social science teacher, however, through the years she also served as English and Spanish teacher, business arts instructor and school librarian during her long service to the local schools.

Edmondson came here in July 1941 and has remained through the years as instructor of Vocational Agriculture. He has received many honors in this field during his long and outstanding tenure here. Prior to coming to Cross Plains, he taught agriculture for four years at May High School, and before completing his college education, he was at Maybell in East Texas for three years. He took his BS degree at Sam Houston State University and earned his MA degree at Texas A&M University.

Nominated earlier this year by the school's administrators, these educators were selected for the national honor on the basis of their professional and civic achievements.

Leaders of American Secondary Education is an annual program honoring men and women who have distinguished themselves by their service and leadership in the field of secondary education. Each year the biographies of those honored are featured in the awards volume, Leaders of American Secondary Education.

In announcing the award winners to local administrators, Dr. V. Gilbert Beers, director of the Leaders of American Secondary Education program, cited them for their exceptional service.

"The men and women chosen for this high honor," Dr. Beers said, "have explored new paths, developed new insight, and effectively communicated their knowledge to their students and colleagues. They are the exceptional teachers."

Guidelines for selection include an educator's talents in the classroom, contributions to research, administrative abilities and civic service and professional recognition.

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HOME AND FAMILY HINTS

FROM HIGGINBOTHAMS

This is part 5 of your FURNITURE FIRST AID HANDBOOK from Higginbothams. Clip it and add it to parts 1-4, then watch for part 6!

ALCOHOL SPOTS

Perfumes, medicines and beverages containing alcohol can quickly cause ir-repairable damage because alcohol has a tendency to dissolve any finish. Always wipe up spills as quickly as possible. If the finish has been protected with wax, there may be no spot. If there is one, try these suggestions:

METHOD A — Rub with finger dipped in Beautiflor, Paste Wax, Carnu, silver polish, linseed oil, or moisten cigar ash Rewax.

METHOD B — On some finishes a quick application of ammonia will do the trick. Put a few drops on a damp cloth and rub the spot. Follow immediately with an application of wax.

METHOD C — For alcohol spots on which treatment has been delayed, a more complicated remedy is necessary. Mix rottenstone into a creamy paste with a few drops of linseed oil or salad oil. Apply the paste to the spot with a soft cloth, rubbing with the grain of the wood. If necessary, substitute FFF powdered pumice for rottenstone. (Pumice is harder abrasive.) Finish with rottenstone treatment (see part 1 for method).

WATER MARKS

Marks or rings from wet glasses, vases or plants are common on tables, especially if these surfaces have not been waxed. Wax cannot prevent damage when liquids are allowed to stand on the finish indefinitely. However, it will keep them from being absorbed im-

mediately, thus giving you time to wipe up the liquid before it damages the finish. If water marks appear, here are some tips to try.

METHOD A — Apply Beautiflor with 3/0 steel wool.

METHOD B — Place a clean, thick blotter over the ring and press with a warm (not hot) iron. Repeat until the ring disappears.

METHOD C — Try rottenstone and oil treatment (part 1).

METHOD D — Try camphorated oil (Method A under Heat Marks in part 4).

County A.S.C.S. Explains Role In Freeze Questions

Inquiries about the wage-price freeze and other aspects of the President's Executive Order on Economic Stabilization are being received in the Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Office, according to J. C. Earp, Jr., County Executive Director.

He reminded Callahan County residents that additional information is constantly coming to the ASCS Office, which is an official center for information concerning the Stabilization Program.

While the county A.S.C.S. Office is an official center for information on the wage-price freeze, it has no authority to act on complaints or handle requests for exemptions to the freeze. Such complaints or requests should go directly to the Internal Revenue Service district office at Post Office Bldg., Third and Pine St., Abilene, Texas 79601. If this is not convenient the county ASCS office can provide forms, advise and assistance to persons desiring to submit a complaint.

He also emphasized that the County ASCS Office is serving as an information center for all county residents.

Normally, the ASCS Office deals primarily with farmers participating in farm action programs of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. However, the more than 2800 ASCS County Offices throughout the nation have been called upon to provide information service on Economic Stabilization to all citizens in order to give assurance that every citizen has direct access to official information.

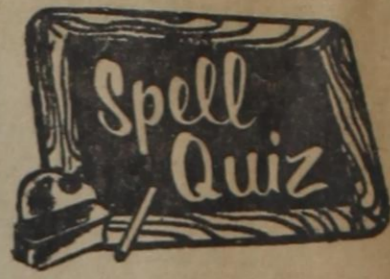
Information received in the County ASCS Office is "across-the-board," he said. It deals with all aspects of the President's Executive Order on the economy. Information is included which relates to agriculture and agri-business, but is not confined to this.
