Although the calendar reveals this to be time for small grain harvesting, few combines will be used locally. Those who do harvest are expected to keep yields for next year's seed. Local buyers had bought no wheat, oats or barley up to mid - afternoon Monday.

Last week's rains brought to 5.53 inches received in Cross Plains during the first 151 days of 1971. Only one year in the past 24 has been as dry during the first four months. That was 1959, however, that year ended with more than a normal rainfall, a total of 27.30 inches being recorded.
