

Drillers Win 2 Games In 2 Days Last Week

Cross Plains Drillers increased their lead in junior teenage baseball league to two games with a pair of triumphs in a couple of days last week.

The local defending loop champion traveled to Goldthwaite last Friday night, claiming a relatively easy 11-1 win. At Illingworth Field Saturday, Drillers tallied two unearned runs to nip Comanche 2-0. That contest was a make-up of the clash slated here Monday of last week, but which was rained out that night.

Cross Plains owned a 4-0 record after Saturday's action. Both Comanche and Hamilton were two games behind, according to local coaches Audrey Purvis and Billy Dillard, with 2-2 records. Goldthwaite was winless in four outings.

Leading just 2-1 after two innings at Goldthwaite Friday, the Drillers cashed in for five big runs in the third and rolled to victory number three of the season 11-1. Drillers scored a pair of runs in the fifth and seventh frames each. Goldthwaite tallied its lone run in the second.

Southpaw Brad Bowden picked up the mound win as the starter. He struck out four Eagles and held Goldthwaite hitless through five innings. The lone tally allowed was unearned. Jerry Lewis came on in relief for the last two frames, and whiffed three in a shutout appearance.

Cross Plains, exhibiting creditable fielding, collected a dozen hits, the longest of which was an inside-the-park home run by Calvin Corley in the seventh.

Two unearned runs in the fourth inning allowed host Drillers to nip Comanche 2-0 here Saturday for fourth consecutive win of the season.

Eddie Wyatt scored the first run on an overthrow of third where he had advanced after walking. Rickey Purvis crossed home plate on a force-in walk after getting aboard on a free pass also. Cross Plains collected just three hits, all singles, two by Roger Crawford and one by Lewis.

Calvin Corley went the distance on the hill for Drillers, and, according to one scorebook, did not allow a hit. He struck out 14 batters. Comanche had runners at first and second in the second inning, both reaching on errors, and a pair of walks issued by Corley in the seventh put runners at third and first.

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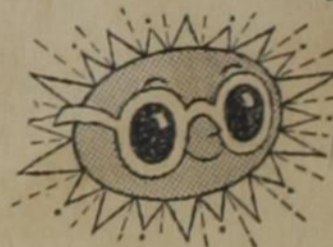

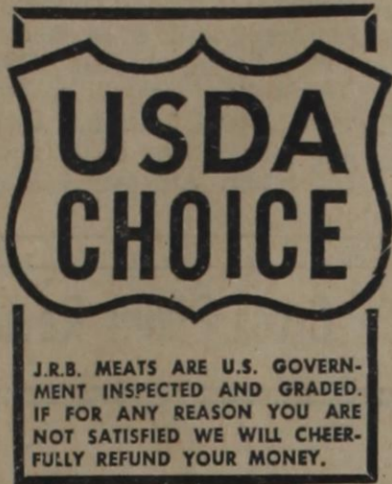

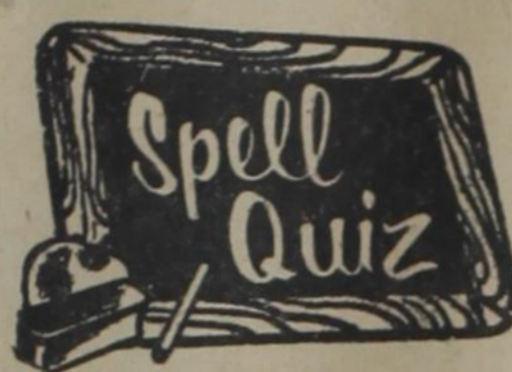
