## School Opens Fall Term On Tuesday

Cross Plains Schools will get underway with a full day's schedule here Tuesday, Aug. 24 according to an announcement made this week by Wayne Ford, Superintendent of Schools.

Opening class will start at 8:31 a.m. and school will be dismissed at 3:44 p.m. School day will be divided into seven, 55-minute periods.

Ford said that enrollment this year is expected to be slightly less than the 488 students enrolled at the close of the 1970-71 school year, with a

small class of 18 first graders expected opening day.

Scot Edington, High School Principal, is asking all students who failed to register at the close of last year's term and those moving into the school district during the summer, to report at the high school building Friday, Aug. 20, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. and register for the new year, so that the first day of classes will not be disturbed by registration matters.

Faculty of the local schools

was filled last week with hiring of two part-time instructors. Tuesday of last week Charles Malcuit of Howard Payne College accepted the position of director of the Buffalo Band. He will teach band only.

Usually the band director doubles as an instructor in some other phase of the educational program.

This year, however, Mrs. Kenneth Smith of near Rising Star will be teacher of language arts in seventh and eighth grades and world history in the ninth grade. She accepted the part-time position Thursday.

Malcuit is a native of Michigan and will graduate from Howard Payne at the end of the fall semester. He is single.

Mrs. Smith is a graduate of Hamilton High School and holds a degree from Howard Payne College.

School will begin one day earlier for 60 Cross Plains High School students who are enrolled in a vocational training program, a cooperative effort between the local school system and Cisco Junior College.

The local students will be bussed to the Cisco campus on Monday morning, Aug. 23, for an orientation program. Two busses will leave the high school campus at 8:30 a.m. for the orientation session, scheduled from 9 to 10:30 a.m.

Ordinarily one bus of students, those enrolled in auto mechanics and drafting will depart from here Monday through Friday at 7:20 a.m. for their three-hour courses. The other bus will leave an hour later, 8:20, each day. They will be taking two-hour courses in office occupations and data processing.

All students will return here at noon for lunch.

Busses will make their routes opening day and the school lunch room will be in operation. Bus drivers will be: E. K. Coppinger, Audrey L. Purvis, W. Glenn Vaughn, C. Junior Baugh, Oral L. Joy, John T. Beggs, L. Pender Mitchell, Scot H. Edington, O. B. Switzer and Don Jobe.

Preparatory to the opening of the 1971-72 school year, the school board adopted a record budget of \$307,047.00, following a public hearing, and Ford said the proposed budget included: \$169,426.00 for instruction, \$32,379.00 for instructional related services, \$45,148.00 for pupil services, \$38,186.00 for administration and debt service, \$20,910.00 for plant maintenance and operation and \$1,000 for ancillary services.

The board also approved a motion to replace auditorium and stage curtains at a cost of \$2,500, and sanctioned changing the football and student insurance coverage to another company in order to provide better coverage.

The board also approved plans to hold an open house on Monday, Aug. 23, from 7 to 9 p.m. when parents and patrons are urged to attend and meet faculty members, school administrators and tour the school facilities.

## School Lunch Price Due Increase Coming Term

School Superintendent Wayne Ford said here this week price of school lunches will be increased for students for the first time since the start of the 1966 school year. The increase will amount to 10c on each lunch, and should produce enough revenue to offset a deficit of \$3,444.23 suffered by the program here last year.

Ford said the new price schedule will be 40c for grades 1-6, 45c for grades 7-12, and 60c for adults. He pointed out that extra milk will cost 5c per half-pint for an increase of 1c over last year.

In speaking of the increases, Ford said that a person had only to look at his own bills to under-

stand the need for more money in the program. He noted that virtually everything has increased in price since 1966, including wages, and school employees drawing \$1.60 per hour now will get \$2.00 per hour, Feb. 1, next year when the minimum wage increase goes into effect.

Supt. Ford said that a comparison would reveal that with basically the same number of employees and basically the same type of educational program the 1966-67 budget was \$237,012.27, compared with the current budget of \$307,047.00, thus it has become absolutely necessary that revenues be increased.

**2 Spellings Used By Frontier City**

Correct spelling of Belle Plain, name of the first county seat of Callahan County, is an oft-disputed topic. Early day documents of many different types spelled it: Belle Plain, Belle Plaine and Belle Plains.

Photostatic copies of the original post office records reveal that the name of the first county seat was Belle Plain from June 18, 1878 until October 12, 1888. At the latter date the spelling was officially changed by the post office department to Belle Plaine.

The spelling Belle Plains was never correct, however, it is believed that it was sometimes written that way as is Big Spring today often pluralized to Big Springs.

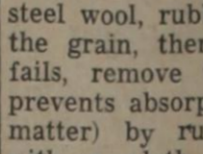
FROM HIGGINBOTHAMS

By Barbara Williams

Whether you bought your wood furniture from Higginbothams or from another dealer (perish the thought!), it will some day need a little first aid treatment. Clip this article and those that will follow for your own Furniture First Aid Handbook.

**MINOR SCRATCHES AND BLEMISHES:**

When the blemish has not penetrated the finish on the wood, a simple application of furniture wax or polish will sometimes hide the mark. If not, try applying the wax with very fine steel wool, rubbing gently with the grain, then polish. If this fails, remove the wax (which prevents absorption of coloring matter) by rubbing the area with a cloth saturated with naphtha and wiping it dry with a clean cloth, or wash the piece thoroughly with warm soapy water and allow it to dry thoroughly. Now try one of these:



**Nut meats, linseed oil** — The oil from a Brazil nut, black walnut, or butternut may provide enough coloring to hide a minor scratch. Break the nut meat in half and rub well into the blemish. Rubbing the mark with linseed oil may help, also, but don't use crude oil — this could soften the finish.

**Coloring crayon, wax sticks** — Match a crayon as closely as possible to the furniture color or use a special wax stick, which is softer and easier to use than ordinary crayola. Fill the scratch and rub in well with your finger. Wipe with a soft, dry cloth.

**Shoe polish** — Use a paste in a brown shade. Apply with a cotton-tipped toothpick, rubbing carefully on the blemish; then buff dry. Remember that

the polish will provide a shine when it is buffed, so the repaired area could be noticeable if the furniture has a dull finish.

**Iodine** — To conceal scratches on red-finished mahogany, use new iodine; for brown or cherry mahogany, iodine that has turned dark brown with age will perform well. For maple, dilute iodine about 50% with denatured alcohol.

**Rottenstone and Oil** — Get an ounce of rottenstone from a paint or hardware store and keep it in an old salt shaker. Put a few drops of lubricating or salad oil on the blemish and shake on some rottenstone — enough to make a paste. Rub briskly with the grain of the wood, using a clean, soft cloth. Wipe frequently in order to compare and match the gloss of the repair with the finish.

**Callahan Has 2 July Traffic Fatalities**

Callahan County has the only two fatal traffic accidents in the four-county district supervised by Sgt. Jerry Mathews, of Eastland, former local Department of Public Safety Patrolman.

This county also led in total number of accidents with 24, according to Sgt. Mathews's report. Eastland followed closely with 23. Following were Stephens with seven and Shackelford with five. Twenty-five persons were injured in 59 accidents over the district last month with breakdown as follows: Callahan 6, Eastland 9, Shackelford 3 and Stephens 7.

Total accidents and deaths are down from totals a year ago the report from Sgt. Mathews shows. Only Callahan lists an increase in fatalities and accidents. Through July 1970 only two had died in 122 mishaps, whereas this year five have been killed in 127 crashes during the same period.

Eastland County shows four deaths in 138 wrecks this year compared to eight fatalities in 149 mishaps a year ago. Shackelford has had one killed in 38 accidents in 1971. A year ago one had died in 43 mishaps, but in 1970, four had died in 53 crashes.

Over the district 12 fatalities have occurred in 351 accidents through July this year compared with 15 in 377 mishaps in 1970. Identical number of persons injured are listed through July, 144, although there have been 89 accidents in which personal injury occurred this year as compared with 81 in 1970.

W. D. A. Corp. of Austin has completed a Marble Falls lime producer five miles southwest of May in Brown County Regular Field.

It is No. 1-A D. G. Stover, spotting 330 feet from the south and 2,165 feet from the east lines of James F. Roberts Survey 479.

Daily potential was 41 barrels of 41 gravity oil. Flow was through a 11-64-inch choke with packer set on the casing and 100 pounds of tubing pressure.

Production is from perforations at 2,440-53 feet, treated with 500 gallons of acid. Operator set 5 1/2-inch casing at 2,471 feet.

Hole was drilled to a total depth of 2,490 feet and plugged back to 2,472 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 600-1.
