Report By School Nurse Says Pupils Health Good

Cross Plains school children, like others of Callahan and adjoining areas, are believed healthier than the national average.

County School Nurse Mrs. Lynn (Eulala) Ault recently filed with Wayne Ford, local school superintendent, a report of examinations and tests given

400 Cross Plains students, from kindergarten through the 12th grade.

Visions of 400 was checked with deficiencies noted in 11 children. Eight are said to already be receiving professional attention.

Hearing of 200 was examined with only three deficiencies noted. All three have been referred for medical attention.

Dental examinations revealed 37 in need of attention out of a total of 340 checked.

Throat examinations were given 340 youngsters. No defects were reported.

Sixty-six children were checked for tuberculosis with one positive reactor. One x-ray was given and Mrs. Ault's report indicated no tuberculosis in the school system.

Immunizations were given as follows: smallpox 70, diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus (series) 7, D.P.T. boosters 15, diphtheria and tetanus boosters 51, measles vaccine (Ruebella) 12, polio boosters 13 and polio series 10.

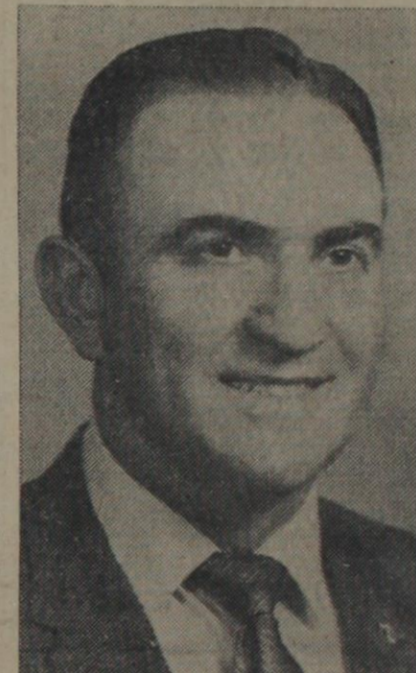
Memorial Service At Burkett Set Sunday

J. C. (Doc) Claborn, manager of Higginbotham interests in Cross Plains, returned home late Monday from Dallas, where he accepted delivery of a new ambulance. The vehicle was immediately placed into service.

It is a 1971-model Oldsmobile with a specially manufactured M & M body and equipped with all required emergency medical apparatuses. The vehicle is the second late model coach of its kind in service here. Higginbothams also have a 1970 model Cadillac on specially-built body and likewise equipped with oxygen tanks, respirators and all other emergency devices.

Area Voters Frown On Changing Constitution

Callahan and adjoining counties were generally opposed to changes in the state constitution as four proposed amendments found little support at the polls Tuesday.

Amendment number 1 (ethics and salary raises) lost in Callahan 372 to 155, trailed in Coleman County 540 to 182, was behind 777 to 559 in Brown County, and 668 to 330 in Eastland.

Amendment number 2 (procedure for submitting constitutional changes to voters) failed in Callahan 351 to 172, in Coleman 514 to 201, Brown 813 to 518, and Eastland 626 to 372. Amendment number 3 (wel-

fare ceilings) was approved in two of the four counties. Callahan rejected it 321 to 209 and Coleman 381 to 340. Brown County favored the proposition 720 to 630 and Eastland County 514 to 499.

Amendment number 4 (water quality) was disapproved in Callahan County 286 to 242. Coleman County went against the proposition 365 to 353. Brown County voted for the amendment 796 to 630. Eastland County was also for the amendment by a tally of 562 to 445.

Only the fourth amendment won statewide acceptance. The other three lost.

Sgt. Mathews Reveals Summary Of Mishaps

Twelve persons were injured in 50 traffic accidents during the month of April in the four-county district served by Highway Patrol Sgt. Jerry Mathews. Callahan with a total of 23 mishaps led remainder of the district, however, Eastland had six personal injuries compared to five in this county. Mathews' report showed Stephens and Eastland counties each had one fatality. Shackelford County fared best with only three accidents.

Spray Pecan Trees Now Agent Advises

County Agent Gregory Gerngross says that homeowners who have pecan trees should be watching closely for the pecan nut casebearer. Eggs from the moth are deposited on the tips of the nut clusters and hatch in four to five days. After they hatch, they enter the nuts, usually at the base and feed, each larva frequently destroying an entire cluster. Upon reaching maturity, the larvae pupate in nuts and emerge as adults in June and early July.

Expected spray date for Callahan County is May 26-28. Before spraying, inspect the pecan nuts and make sure that you have eggs on the clusters. Insecticides cleared for use on pecan trees for the casebearer are: Guthion, Thidon, Malathion and Toxaphene. As with all chemicals, follow recommended rate on the label and use precaution when handling.

Agent Urges Spray Now For Bagworms

Now is the time to control bagworms in this part of the state, according to the County Agricultural Agent Gregory Gerngross.
Bagworms, which normally infest cedar trees and shrubs, will attack also almost any type of foliage that grows. Trees that were infested last year and still contain the old bags will normally be infested this year. Examine these very closely for bags, which are about 1/4 to 1/2 inches long and are covered with old leaf parts. This pest overwinters as eggs in the old bags and newly hatched larvae emerge from the bag to begin feeding.
Bagworms may be controlled by spraying with one of the following: Malathion, toxaphene, lead arsenate and Sevin.
Bagworm larvae are easy to control on plants that are thoroughly covered with insecticide since the larva not only crawl across the insecticide, but also will eat some of the foliage that has the insecticide on it.
For people who do not want to use insecticides, handpicking and destroying the larvae by mechanically mashing or putting them in a garbage can in an enclosed container is an effective control.
Caution must be used in handling all insecticides.

Burleson Tells Of Drought Assistance

Congressman Omar Burleson announces that the U. S. Department of Agriculture is offering emergency conservation assistance in five additional counties in Texas to help repair damage caused by wind erosion and severe drought. The counties are Callahan, Castro, Hockley, Lipscomb and Parmer.

On April 28, 1971, an allocation of \$2 million was made to the Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) State Committee for use in sharing with farmers the cost of deep plowing to bring clod forming subsoil to the surface, and measures to reduce soil loss from wind including contour listing, contour chiseling, cross-slope chiseling and pit cultivation. The five counties listed above are eligible for aid under this allocation along with the 62 counties named April 29.

Emergency conservation assistance is designed to enable the Secretary of Agriculture to alleviate conditions resulting from a natural disaster and to restore agricultural lands to productive capacity.

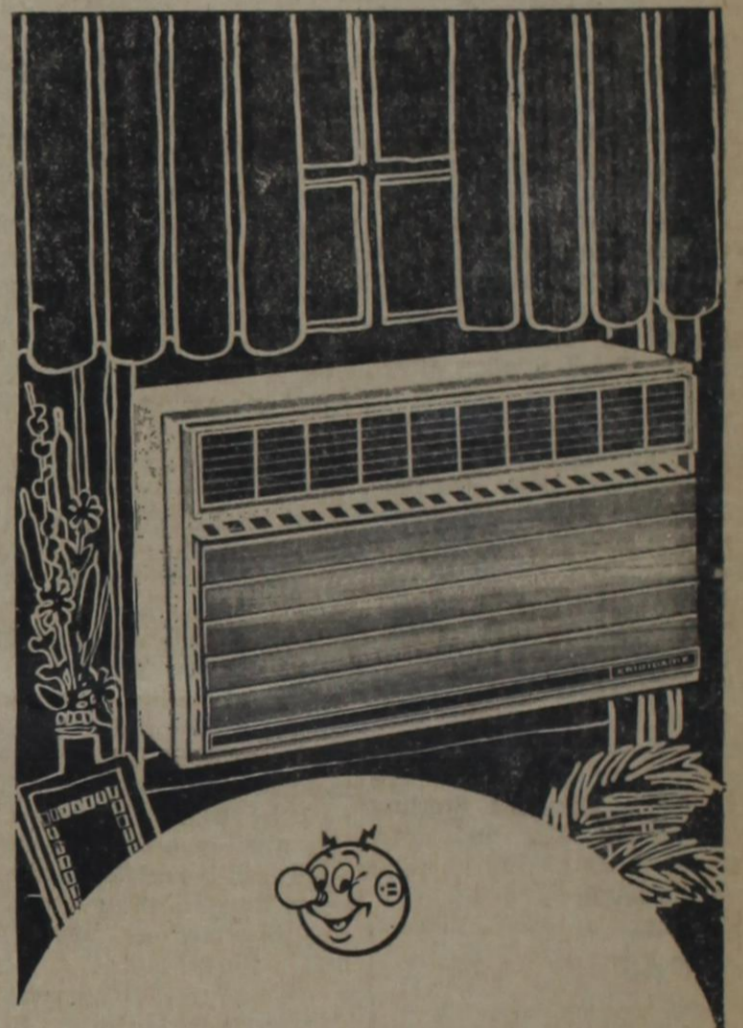

Dedication services of the new library are scheduled at 10:45 a.m. at the church in Fort Worth.

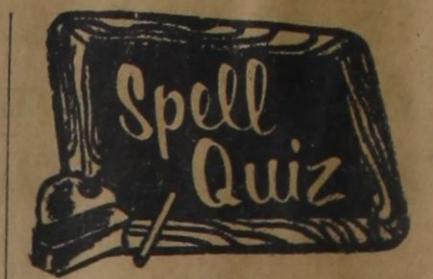

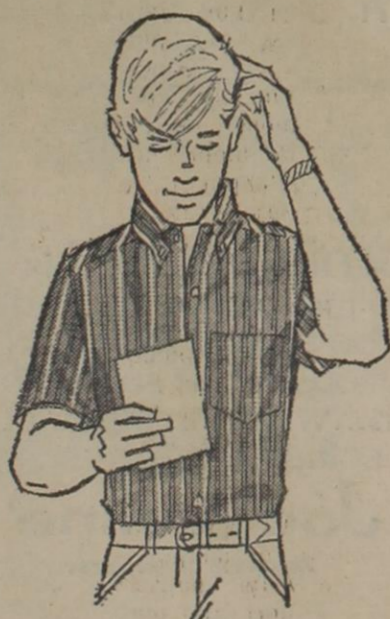
