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

Armyworms Imperil County Grain Fields

Small grain producers in Callahan County are urged to check their small grain fields for the prescence of armyworm infestation. A number of fields in the county have had damaging population of this pest recently, according to Gregory Gerngross, County Agent, of

Producers can check their fields in a number of ways, but random checks over the entire field will give a more accurate estimation of number and denstity of population. The armyworm will vary in size according to age from one-quarter inch to one and one-quarter inches in length. Color will range night and Monday with Mrs. from a pale green to a dark brown with white stripes down each side. This pest can destroy a grain crop in a matter of a few days. Chemical control of armyworms is the only economical means of controlling this pest. 


