North Central Texas inundated with rain

A tropical low moving up from the Gulf brought drenching rains to Eastland County and the area Sunday. By late that day a line of intense thunderstorms stretched from Mills County in the south to Throckmorton in the north, with Eastland County right in the middle.

This unusual weather system was tracking north, accompanied by flashes of lightning and rolls of thunder.

The heavy rains - generally over five inches - brought flooding to a number of areas, with Eastland being especially hard hit. The storm also dropped small tornadoes over Kokomo, Lake Leon and Olden.

Water ran up to six feet over the dam at Lake

Leon, with some backing up in lake homes. Both forks of the Leon River were out of banks, and running over bridges in places. Rural roads in most parts of the county became almost impassable.

At one time Sunday night three major roads into Eastland were closed - Highway 6 to the south, East Main St., and Highway 112 to the north.

At 10:15 Sunday morning Jim Caldwell, who lives on the north side of Lake Leon, went down to the Dark Hollow Cove near his house to tie up another boat on his boat dock. It was not raining at that time.

As Caldwell was kneeling down he heard a roar like a freight train, and then something "popping

like a machine gun."

Caldwell says that he looked up and saw debris flying over the Pat Albus home nearby. As he turned to get off his boat dock the tornado hit, lifting off the top of the boat house. It also scattered fishing gear every direction, but did not touch him.

Caldwell estimates the tornado was about 1,000 ft. across, and moving from 30-50 m.p.h. "It happened so fast that I didn't have time to get scared," he says.

The same twister apparently hit the home of Tommy and Janet Tho-

mas, which is located near the Caldwell and Albus residences. Janet reports that took the largest tree in her front yard and dropped the top of it on her fireplace chimney, knocking it around.

Reportedly some people at the La Mancha resort saw the same twister moving across the Lake, looking like a waterspout. Some wind damage was also reported around Olden.

Carbon missed the

worst of the wind, but had rains of five and one-half inches plus. Some water went in houses, and there was heavy damage to the streets. Dale Walker reported that the Carbon City Commissioners met Monday night to discuss repair to the streets. He also reported that the Highways to Rising Star were under water in places.

In Rising Star, Elaine Coleman, newspaper Editor, reported that the

recently cleaned drains carried off excess water in the downtown area. On Monday there was water across SH 183 three miles north of town, however. Rainfall in the Rising Star area was about the same as that throughout the county - over five inches.

On Monday the heavy rains began to move out of the county, and the skies cleared. The big tropical low began to break up at it drifted into Oklahoma and points northeast.

Texas Department of Public Safety seeking recruits

The Texas Department of Public Safety is seeking applicants for a recruit school scheduled to begin Sept. 22, 1997. Persons who successfully complete the rigorous six-month recruit training academy in Austin will join one of the country's premier law enforcement agencies.

"We're encouraging all persons interested in a career with the DPS to go by their nearest DPS office and get a complete application package and a list of all the qualifications," said Lt. Curley Colquitt, who heads the DPS recruitment effort. "The DPS is very interested in attracting qualified female and minority applicants, since historically those groups have been under represented in law enforcement," he said. "DPS offers a challenging and rewarding law enforcement career."

Graduates of the school initially are assigned to one of the uniformed services of the Department-- the Highway Patrol, License and Weight or Driver License service. After gaining experience, troops can apply for promotions within those or other areas of the DPS.

Applicants must be at least 20 years old on the

date of probationary appointment to the position of trooper-trainee and be of good moral character and habits. Applicants must have at least 60 hours of college (prior law enforcement or military experience may be substituted for some or all college requirements). A final conviction (including probation) for DWI, DUID, domestic violence or a felony offense automatically will disqualify applicants. Both oral and written statements given during the application process will be

verified for accuracy.

Those selected for the recruit school will be required to successfully complete psychological testing, physical examinations, drug screening and additional physical demands. Their character, habits, previous employment and other factors also will come under scrutiny.

Applications will be accepted through 5 p.m. June 20 from out-of-state and through 5 p.m. July 11 from Texas residents. Persons interested in

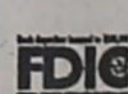

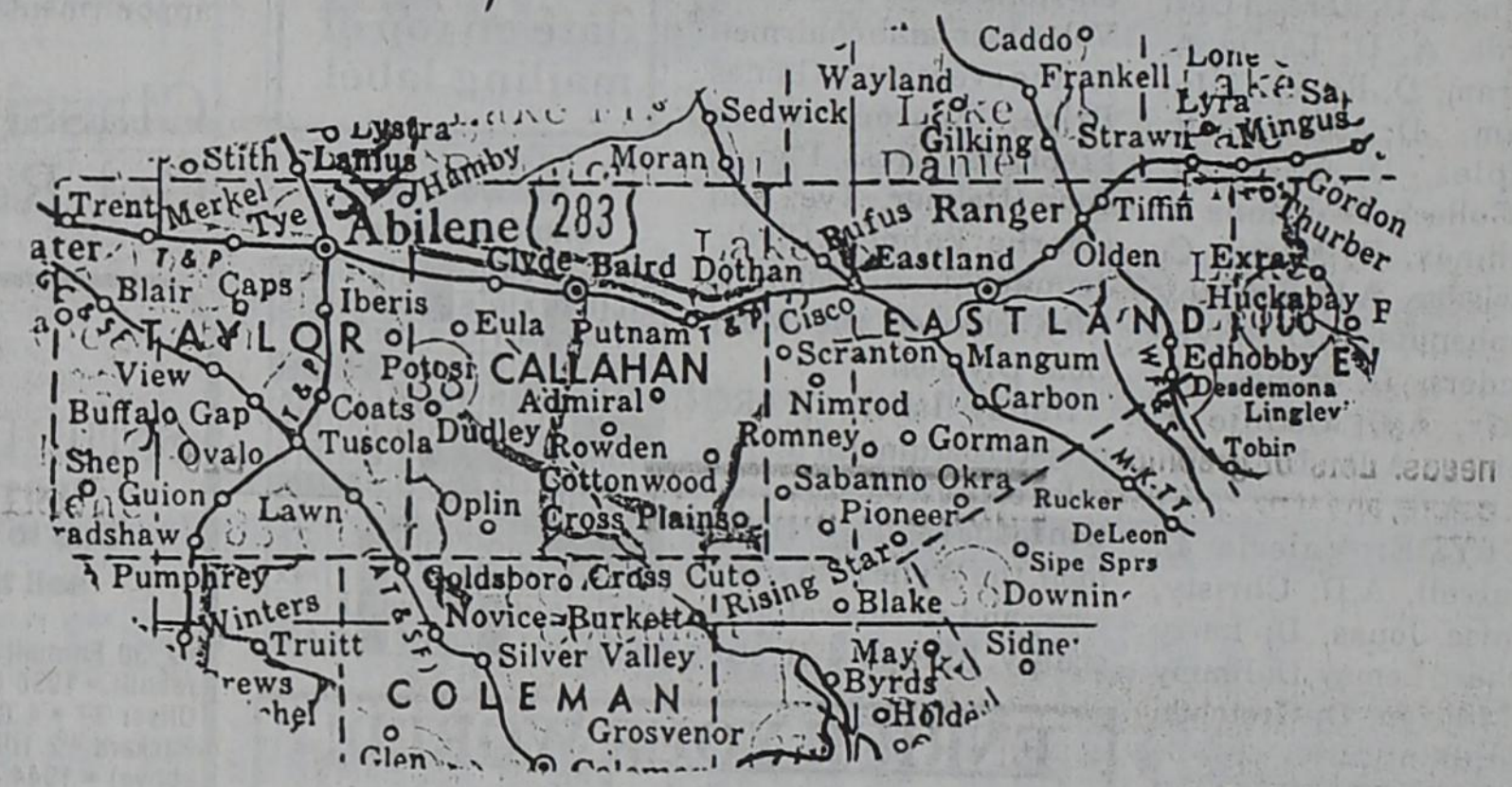

AUSTIN — The state paid lottery consultants Ben Barnes and Ricky Knox more than \$23 million to stop working for Texas Lottery operator GTECH.

Barnes and Knox had argued that the agreement was private business and not subject to disclosure. On June 18, the day after Attorney General Dan Morales said the agreement should be made public, the information was released.

Barnes, a former lieutenant governor, is getting \$168,328 a month for the next three years. Knox, a former member of the Texas Racing Commission and long-time lobbyist, is getting \$58,752 a month for three years. Also, GTECH said Barnes and Knox would be paid \$15 million.

The state decided to buy out Barnes' and Knox' lobbying and consulting contract in February, a month after federal prosecutors implicated the two men in a kickback scheme.

Lottery Commissioner John Hill of Houston said he was "stunned" at the amount of the settlement and that it was a factor in the commission's decision in March to call for new bids on the lottery operator contract.

Though neither man has been charged with wrongdoing, the agreement says the payments will stop if Barnes or Knox are

convicted of any crimes related to their work for GTECH in Texas.

Sex Offender Bills Signed

Gov. George W. Bush has signed bills which give Texas some of the toughest sex offender laws in the nation.

Sen. Florence Shapiro, R-Plano, joined the governor at the bill signing. She authored "Ashley's laws" after the 1993 killing of Ashley Estell, a 7-year-old girl abducted from a Plano park by a paroled sex offender.

The Legislature passed Ashley's laws in the 1995 legislative session. The measures required stronger penalties and set up a system for police and residents to track offenders after they are released from prison.

The new bills will fine-tune those statutes, Sen. Shapiro told the Dallas Morning News.

The bills provide:

■ A "two strikes" rule that a sex offender convicted of a second offense against a child receives an automatic 35-year prison term without parole.

■ Inmates charged with any crime lose any "good conduct" credit in jail if they try to contact victims under age 17 or members of the victims' family.

■ Deferred adjudication, a form of probation that allows a conviction to be dismissed after a period of time set by a judge, will be available only once to sex offenders.

■ A judge must consider a victims' wishes about placing the offender on deferred adjudication and the public must be notified when a sex offender is placed on it.

■ Sex offenders who commit certain offenses, including promotion of child pornography, must report their addresses for the rest of their lives so the public may be notified where they live.

■ Juvenile sex offenders on probation must receive psychological counseling and submit to polygraph tests to monitor their progress.

The new sex offender laws take effect Sept. 1.

Travel Rules to Be Discussed

House officials last week said they will set guidelines for thrifter travel for state lawmakers and hold a June 25 public hearing on the issue.

On June 2, the last day of the legislative session, Senate members tentatively agreed to set restrictions on air fares, rental cars and hotels — after the Austin American-Statesman questioned lawmakers about taxpayer-paid expenses on trips and reported that some had spent excessive amounts on out-of-state trips the past two years.

"We're going to look at the issue from top to bottom," said Rep. Tony Goolsby, chairman of the House Administration Committee which oversees House members' spending.

"We got the green light from Speaker (Pete) Laney to do what needs to be done. ... It will be better for all of us," Goolsby, R-Dallas, was quoted in the American-Statesman.

Goolsby, however, said he was uncertain whether new rules could be enacted soon enough to affect House members' summer travel.

Under current House rules, legislators must first obtain Goolsby's approval by submitting a budget for out-of-state trips.

Perry Declares Candidacy

Promising to focus on education, crime and economic opportunity, Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry kicked off his campaign last week for lieutenant governor.

Perry, 47, a Haskell rancher, former House member and two-term agriculture commissioner, is the first Republican to declare for the post. He joins Democratic state Comptroller John Sharp in the race to succeed retiring Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock.

"I offer the people of Texas a solid record of delivering efficient and effective government," Perry told supporters in making his announcement in Austin.

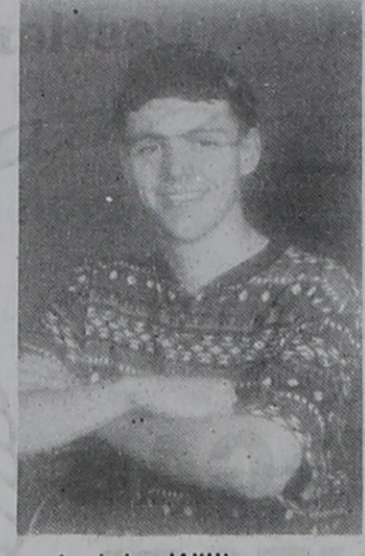

Bill education benefits previously denied them. The enabling legislation was signed into law October 9, 1996. It permits certain full-time National Guardsmen who entered their first period of active duty in the military between July 1, 1985, and November 28, 1989, to elect Montgomery G.I. Bill (Active Duty) benefits. The election must be made before July 8, 1997. Active duty Guard members should contact their Education Officer for election procedures. Current or former members not on active duty should call VA toll free at 1-800-827-1000 for help in filing the application.

"A strange thing about religion is that we all know what it is until someone asks us to tell them." Few questions about the world of faith — individuals, events, geography and credos — need go unanswered by reference to THE OXFORD DICTIONARY OF WORLD RELIGIONS, edited by John Bowker (Oxford Univ. Press: \$45.00). Bowker, professor of divinity at the University of London, ranges over the major beliefs, their customs, offshoot cults, each faith's dogma on current interest topics (abortion, homosexuality), and more in a cyclopedic, 8,200-entry guide — a major information source for seekers of whatever theological tradition... The word "Bible" derives from the Greek "biblia," meaning "books." One of the most colorful presentations of the collected books of the Bible is contained in THE DK ILLUSTRATED FAMILY BIBLE, Dr. Claude-Bernard Costecalde, editor, illustrated by Peter Dennis (DK Pub.: \$29.95). Dr. Costecalde, theology lecturer at the Sorbonne, draws on the New International Version of the Bible for selections of most familiar stories and passages from Old and New Testaments (Adam and Eve, Joseph, Jesus' Nativity, etc.). Mr. Dennis illumines the texts most vividly, and along with photos and informative side bars the volume is a learning delight for believers of all ages... THE DIRECTORY OF SAINTS, by Annette Sandoval (Signet: \$5.99), offers an unusual listing of those martyred worthies — by calling or nation (the Immaculate Conception is patron of the United States of America). Lists of saints, their days, and their symbols are appended.

Her last words before she lapsed into a coma were, "Please don't let those boys hit me again." Our request is for a nice monument for her grave. None of us can afford it after the funeral costs and it breaks our hearts to go to the cemetery and there is nothing there. We can purchase a nice one for about \$500, and we thank you in advance for whatever your decision. P.S. This can all be verified through the Zanesville Police Dept.

KEEP YOUR WILL CURRENT

Do you think that you don't really need a will? Without one, your assets may go to someone other than you intend, and your child's guardian may turn out to be someone other than your first choice.

State law takes over when someone dies *intestate*, that is, without a will. If you are childless, all of your assets may go to your spouse, or they may be split between your spouse and your parents. If you have children, a portion typically will go to them, and a portion will go to your spouse, but your parents may end up with part of your estate. If you die without a will, your children will typically receive their share in full upon attaining majority, but you may prefer that their share be placed in trust for a longer period. *You* should determine where your assets will go, and when.

You also want to designate the guardian to your minor children. If you die intestate, a judge may be required under the law to appoint a grandparent as guardian of your children, even though you might wish to name someone younger.

Even if you have a will, it's important to keep it up to date. For example, you may need to amend or rewrite your will if you marry, have children, get divorced, if a beneficiary dies, or if your wealth increases substantially. You may also need a new will if you move to another state, since the requirements for a valid will vary from state to state.

Keep in mind that a will controls only the distribution of your *probate* estate - it doesn't control assets held in trust, joint assets, retirement accounts, or life insurance policies on which you name an individual, trust or corporation as beneficiary. Thus, the execution of a will may be only part of your total estate plan.

Trading With China

A perennially difficult vote in Congress is the poorly named "Most Favored Nation" — or MFN — trade status for China. Among the numerous controversies surrounding this issue is the fundamental matter of MFN sounding as though special and privileged status is being granted. In fact, MFN status simply means that the United States will engage in normal trade relations with another country.

At the real core of this controversy, however, is how we feel about the human rights aspects of China and, more importantly, how we as a nation which compassionately hopes for the betterment of all people in the world should behave towards China.

No one with any knowledge of China would argue that their society is all that it should be, or even close, for that matter. Stories of human rights violations, religious persecution, rampant poverty, and horrendous working conditions abound. Opponents of MFN status for China argue that the U.S. should not reward this sort of behavior; rather, we should punish it through isolating China.

I disagree. I see that argument like a wife, upset with her husband's behavior, saying that the only way he will ever improve is if she divorces him. As one who has been married for 36 years, I believe that in most cases, it is by remaining in human relationship that we have the best chance

for improvement. MFN for China enables American economic and religious ideals to circulate among the 1.2 billion people of China. Trade status grants us admission not only to the Chinese government, but also to religious and business leaders. If we close the door on trade, we close the door to missionaries, farmers, manufacturers,

teachers, and others. And the trade with China is not simply altruistic behavior on America's part. Last year, Texas sold \$1.3 billion of goods to China, \$500 million of that coming from agricultural products. With 1.2 billion potential consumers at stake, the whole world is interested in China. If we choose not to sell our products to

them, you can bet the line will form quickly of other countries ready to profit from our absence. Ending our trade might isolate China from the U.S. but it certainly wouldn't keep the rest of the world out of their markets.

Whether it is Rev. Nelson Graham (son of Billy Graham) speaking of the opportunity to distribute 1.8 million Bibles to Chi-

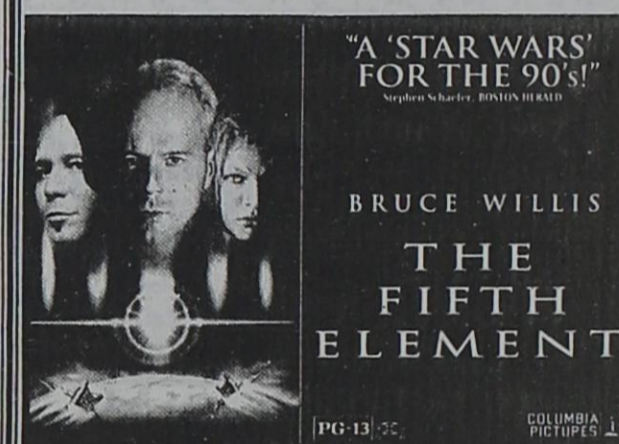

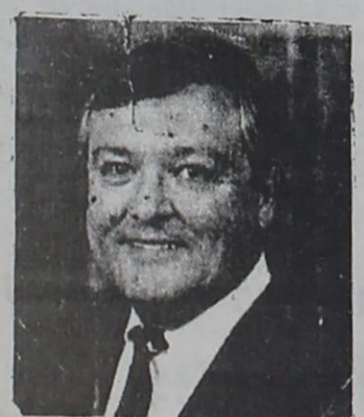

List at Hardin-Simmons University during the Spring semester.

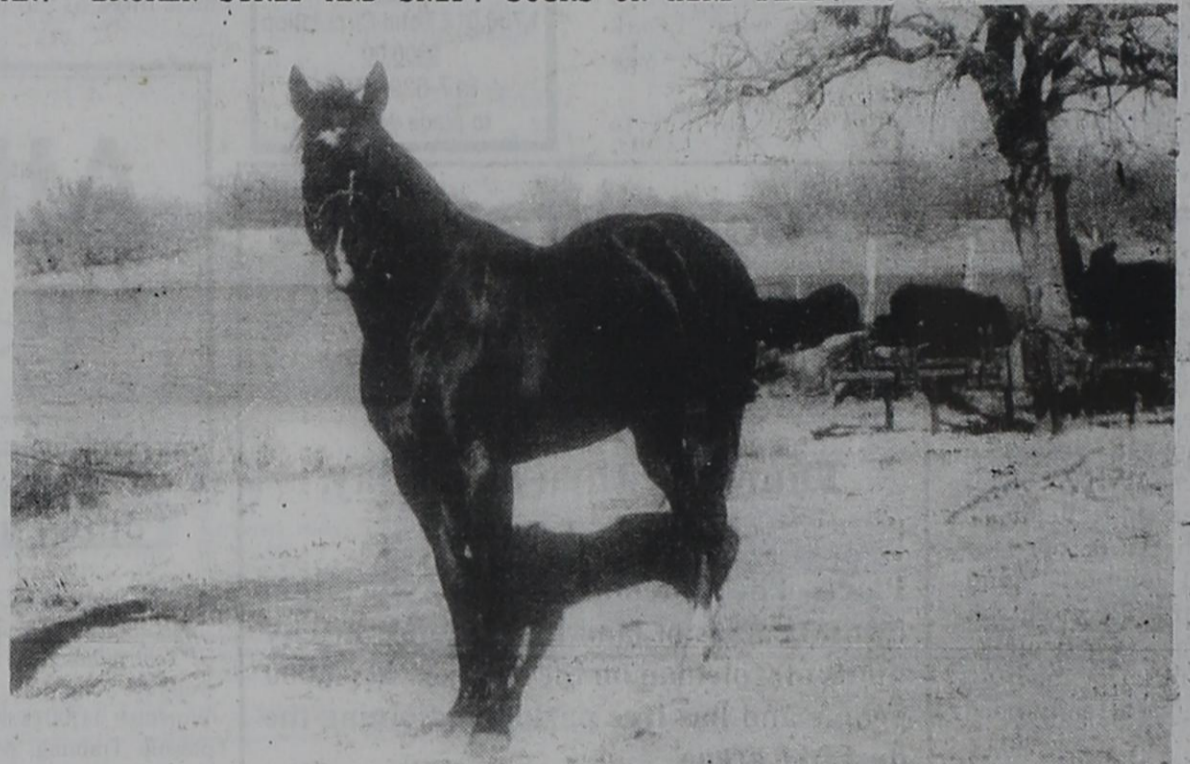
