County Historians Hold Yule Supper Recently

Mr. and Mrs. Glen Elliott were hosts to members and guests of the Callahan County Historical Survey Committee for a Christmas "covered dish" dinner and meeting in their ranch home near Baird on December 11.

Mrs. John Berry of Clyde, chairman of the Committee welcomed the group and presided for the business session. Invocation was given by W. C. Holley of Clyde.

Mrs. Berry reported that Bob Watson of the State Historical Survey Committee had visited recently in Callahan County and had commended the local committee for its accomplishments.

Mrs. C. B. Snyder gave a report for the History Appreciation Committee, stating that a list of speakers who would be available to talk on various phases of Texas and American History in the county schools, was being prepared. The incomplete list includes Mmes. John Berry, C. B. Snyder, Blanton Scott, S. L. McElroy, Lee Ivey, and B. C. Chrisman, with other speakers to be named later.

It was announced that a marker is ready to be placed at the pioneer residence of Jim Prew of Clyde; also plans for the markers on the Griffin-Varner house at Cottonwood, the Baptist Church at Admiral, and the old Cedar Bluff School near Cottonwood are being carried out.

Mrs. Berry reported that the marker for the Old Corn Road which was placed on the Berry Ranch will be moved to a more accessible location near the ranch entrance.

It was suggested that a marker be placed on the Cottonwood tree believed to be the largest in Callahan County, located about ten miles south of Clyde.

Members voted to seek information through the newspapers as to names of several people buried in the small cemetery just off FM road 18 southwest of Clyde, approximately a mile from the business district.

Mr. Chrisman was asked to see what could be done about having weeds and grass cut in old Callahan City Cemetery on the Admiral road.

Mrs. Tommy Windham read a history of the Callahan County Historical Survey Committee from its organization in Sept. 1962 with B. C. Chrisman as chairman. A copy of this will be placed in the Callahan County

Cross Plains High School varsity cagers played on the halves in outings last week. Cross Plains girls claimed two wins in three outings, and the Buffaloes dropped two contests in three tilts. Only the Herd B unit kept the week's effort above the break-even level.

Both local varsity teams were eliminated from competition in the Rising Star invitational basketball tournament last week end in second round after winning opening clashes.

Buffettes triumphed over host Putnam sextet Tuesday of last week, but the Herd fell to the Panthers. Interning Bisons claimed a win over Putnam boys B team.

Local Squads Win Both Cross Plains entries triumphed in opening round of the Rising Star tournament last week end.

Buffaloes rolled to a 49-36 decision over Goldthwait. Cross Plains took a 14-4 edge in the first quarter and stretched that by another 10 points at half time, 30-10. Goldthwaite rallied in the final eight minutes, outscoring local girls 17-9. Terry Edington paced Buffette scoring with 22 points, and Sherry

Ingram added another 17. Buffaloes finally defeated Blanket 48-39 in the opening round. The Herd posted an 11-5 margin in the first quarter, but went cold in the second, leading just 15-11 at intermission. A 15-point third lifted Bisons to 30-22 advantage.

Rodney Renfro hooped in 18 points for Cross Plains, and Ricky Kirkham netted 10. Starting Buff Don Dillard suffered a severely sprained ankle in the first part of the game, and according to Head Coach Mack McConal will be out of the lineup for at least two weeks.

Buffaloes fell to a solid Early High School team in second round Friday.

Early grabbed a commanding 20-6 lead in the initial eight minutes, and padded that in the next two frames before pulling off to post a 57-44 triumph. Kirkham topped Buff scoring with 13 points, and Renfro chipped in with 12.

Early bowed to Goldthwaite in the finals 47-41.

Cross Plains Area Awaits Gala Yule

Cross Plains is geared for a gala Christmas.

A large influx of former residents and kinsmen of Cross Plains citizens is expected for the two-day Yule week end. Many families are expecting children home for the festive holiday week end, and many

others are anxiously looking forward to departure time to spend Christmas in the homes of loved ones in other parts of the state and nation.

Adding to enjoyment of the Christmas season this year is the fact that Christmas Day falls on Saturday, giving many local business and professional

people two days in which to celebrate.

All downtown businesses will remain closed on both Saturday and Sunday, and some on the business district along Highway 36 are expected to take a rest on Saturday, at least part of the day. Some will work on Sunday schedules both days.

County courthouse at Baird will close Wednesday afternoon at quitting time and not reopen until Monday morning. City of Cross Plains office will follow custom of long standing by closing at noon on Friday, allowing employees a half-day extra holiday on Christmas eve. Most other downtown businesses will close at regular time Friday evening and will reopen Monday morning.

Cross Plains Schools will close for a long Yule recess at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday, today, for an 11-day vacation. Classes will resume at regular time on Monday, Jan. 3, for a full day's schedule, according to Wayne Ford, superintendent.

Most of the local stores will follow a similar procedure at New Year's it also being on Saturday.

Local peace officers are expecting traffic to be exceptionally heavy during the two days, and all will work longer than usual hours.

Of concern to local firemen is the danger of fires when the city is mostly in active from a business standpoint. Cross Plains City Council has urged strict adherence to an ordinance prohibiting shooting of fireworks within the corporate limits. The City Marshall, Chuck Thomas and Cross Plains volunteer firemen join in asking cooperation of the citizens of the city in helping to control use of fireworks and blazes after Christmas packages have been opened.
