## Tax Guide Available To County Farmers

The 1972 issue of the Farmer's Tax Guide, Internal Revenue Service Publication 225, is now available at the local County Agent's office at Baird.

The new tax guide includes information on income and self-employment tax, required tax reporting dates, and an illustrated sample income tax return. Included are 17 major chapters ranging from record keeping requirements to fuel tax credit.
