for funds through HUD to improve source, storage facilities and distribution of water to Cross Plains customers.

Mayor O. B. Edmondson noted that the public is urged to attend these two meetings, and that Cross Plains will be competing for the grants with other communities as was the case recently when this city narrowly missed a grant.

It was pointed out in a public notice in today's newspaper and by Mayor Edmondson that the public meetings are designed to allow the citizens of Cross Plains to identify those problem areas which could be partially or wholly eliminated with funds available through the HUD Block Grant Program. It was also explained that the public hearing are a part of preapplication for funds from HUD which could be used in addressing problem areas of housing, deficiencies in public facilities which effect public health and safety and/or community economic development.

## Rains Boost Sector's Small Grain Crops

Rains last Thursday and light mists and showers first of the week have aided the moisture-starved grain crops in the Cross Plains area greatly.

Although few rain gauges were turned to catch the rain, an estimated inch of moisture was received in Thursday's showers and light rain and mist which fell here Monday.

This locality narrowly missed another ice coating on Monday. Light rain and mist began freezing on above-ground objects early Monday morning, but most had melted by early afternoon. Ice did not collect on the roadways and there were only isolated patches of icy bridges early Tuesday morning. That was caused by dipping temperatures just before 8 a.m. and moisture which had not dried from the highways.

The rainfall was considered a boon to crops and pastures, and more is needed, especially heavier showers to provide runoff to fill earthen stock tanks.

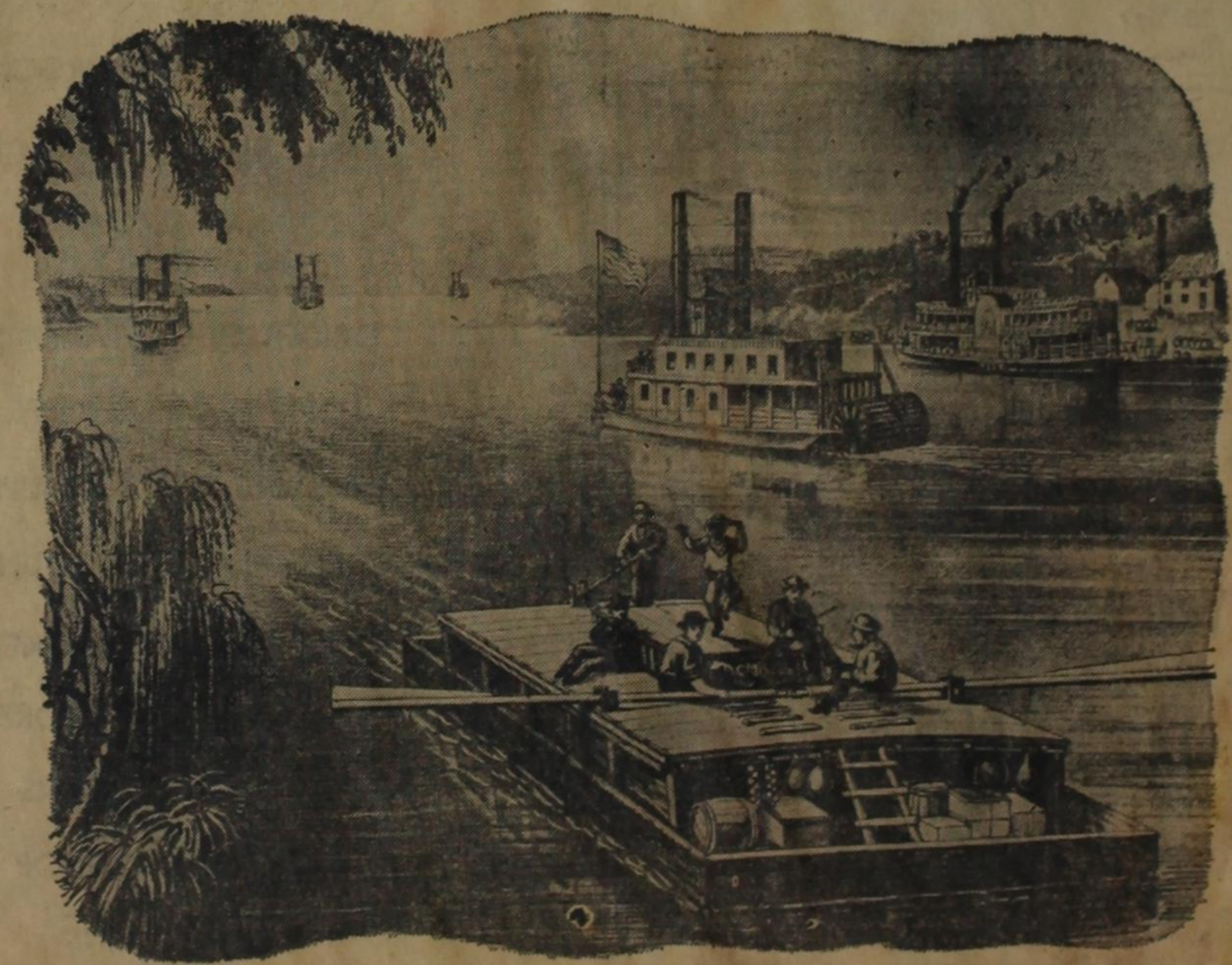
