

Landlords and persons who live in rental property are urged to contact the Housing Authority of Callahan County concerning participation in a program designed to assist our citizens to secure decent, safe, and sanitary

The program benefits landlords and owners by providing financial assistance during vacancy and certain depository and damage guarantees. The program aids eligible renters by providing financial assistance on the basis of need. Persons that wish to apply for rent assistance must make application for eligibility and subsequently provide proof of income. Applicants must be a family or head of household. If an individual applies he or she must be 62 years of age or handicapped or disabled.

Cost of housing occupied by the applicant must be within the limits set forth in a fair market rent schedule. Fair Market rents are based on standard market housing, however any standard unit falling within the Fair Market schedule is eligible.

Participation in the rent assistance program is voluntary on the part of owners/landlords and renters. A representative of the Housing Authority will be in the following cities at the hours indicated beginning Monday, April 16, 1979:

"Prophecy"

"Prophecy came not in old time by the will of man; but holy men of God spake, as they were moved by the Holy Ghost.

God says in Ezekiel 39:6, "I will SEND a fire (probably Atomic fire) on Magog (Russia) AND among them that dwell carelessly in the isles, (America was considered an 'isle' in Ezekiel's day), and they shall know that I am Lord. Russia and America have nuclear submarines and atomic weapons aimed at each other and ready to fire at a moment's notice. These powerful warheads would bring any target area to desolation in a matter of minutes. God tells us in Ezek. 38 & 39 about Russia's invasion of Israel. Russia will "have an evil thought" and decide to take Israel for her spoils. Ezek. 38:4 states that God is going to put "hooks into thy jaws, and I will bring thee forth..." We can recognize several "hooks": (1) Rusia desperately needs a warm water passage; such as the waters around Israel offer. (2) The fabulous mineral and chemical deposits of the Dead Sea are equivalent to four times the wealth of the United States, according to modern computations. (3) The ol deposits in the Middle East are indispensable for the survival and success of modern industrialized nations. Russia and her allies (probably Arab nations gone communist) will invade Israel "from the north parts" (Ezek. 38:15' and God himself will destroy them in the mountains of Israel. (Ezek 39:1-5) It is probable that Russia will fire upon Israel's allies (America & possibly Egypt) and America would immediately retaliate. That could explain Ezek. 39:6 concerning "those who live carelessly in the isles". Would you not agree that America is living carelessly before God?

We are all acutely aware of how the world events are rapidly shaping up exactly according to Bible Prophecy. One such event is the Common Market of Europe. God foretold in Dan. 2 the fall of four great empires: Babylon, Mediopersian, Grecian, & Roman. Daniel also foretold that in the latter days (in which we are now living) that ten nations will rise out of the old Roman Empire. The Book of Revelation tells us that they will have "one mind, and shall give their power and strength unto the Beast. (The soon coming World Ruler.) Today we see fulfillment of these prophecies beginning to come to pass. The Common Market of Europe now has nine nations. Unless something unforseen happens Gree e will probably become the tenth nation; making Daniel's prophetic number complete. (Dan. 7:7, 8) The development of this union follows Daniel's prophetic guidelines exactly. They are standardizing their monetary system, scholastic systems and common citizenship. Notice also that the whole world is conforming to the metric system. In a one world government these systems would need to be standard.

Some other conditions that line up with these end-time prophecies include the United Nations and the Ecumenical World Council of Churches. This could give rise to the one-world government and the one-world church system. Rev. 17:13 states that ten nations will give all their power to one man, the Beast, the one-world ruler (Antichrist) whom God has fcretold us about. In Rev. 17:8 we are told that this Beast will ascend out of the "bottomless pit" and "they that dwell on the earth shall wonder". Many will believe in him and even worship him as God. This Anichrist world ruler will make war on the Saints of God and overcome them. (Dan. 7:25) (Rev. 13:7-10). He will have power over all kindreds, tongues and nations. No one wil be able to make war with him. (Rev. 13:48) After the rise of the Beast we see the rise of the False Prophet (Rev. 13:11-

18) who will enslave the minds and souls of men. The second 'Beast' will be similar in many ways to the first. The first Beast is a political leader while the second Beast is a religious. leader. Notice the first Beast rises from the SEA; which is from the unrest of troubled nations. (Rev. 17:5 - The waters (sea) which you saw...are peoples and multitudes and nations and tongues.) Notice the second Beast rises from the EARTH. Having religious power he will merge all religions together. In Rev. 13:11 we see he has two horns like a Lamb, showing he will try to imitate Jesus Christ. Many will fall for his deception. From all of this Satan has set up a blasphemous imitation of the Tribune God. The first Beast will proclaim himself God. The second Beast will masquerade as the Messiah. The liberated demons (Rev. 16:13, 14) will imitate the power of the Holy Spirit. The False Prophet will have as much power as the Antichrist. The False Prophet will: (1) exercise unlimited authority (Rev. 13:12); (2) force people to worship the Roman Antichrist (verse 12); (3) perform great miracles (verse 13); (4) deceive the population (verse 14); (5) make a seven year covenant with Israel (Dan. 9:27); (6) force the people to worship the Antichrist's image in the Temple (Rev. 13:14): (7) murder all non-conformists (verse 15); (8) force the people to receive the "mark of the Beast" (verse 16).

Regarding the "Mark of the Beast" in Rev. 13:16-18, this mark will be in their right hand or in their forehead. No one can buy or sell who doesn't have this mark. It will be a MARK of the NAME of the Antichrist or the NUMBER of his name; the number 666. In Rev. 14:9-11 we learn the consemences of taking that mark; eternal doom in the lake of fire!

People have been anticipating these "last days" for so many ears that it's hard to believe we could actually be the generaton that witneses it. But prophetic events are falling together so fast that we have to heed what Christ himself said: "So likewise ye, when ye shall see all these things, know that it is near, even at the doors. Verily I say unto you. This generation shall not pass till all these things be fulfilled". (Matt. 24, 25)

Absolute, open flow was 850,-000 cubic feet of dry gas daily from perforations at 1,815-20 feet treated with 500 gallons of mud acid.

Operator, set the 41/2-inch casing at 3,098 feet. The hole was cleaned out to 3,200 feet and plugged back to 1,920 feet. It was plugged in 1952 at 4,083 feet as W. R. Brown No. 1 Fred Heyser.

'Let us safeguard humaness of our children by guaranteeing the interaction they require TO TURN THEM INTO HUMAN BEINGS.


