Successful Parade, Bonfire, Rally Held

Winn Named Queen At Halftime Show

Friday night was homecoming for Muleshoe High School. The weather had turned off to cold, with an icy north wind stinging. But, Thursday, the weather was still warm and proved to be a perfect evening for the pre-homecoming parade, bonfire and pep rally.

Leading the parade from the high school parking lot were Chief of Police and Mrs. Harold White, followed by a fire truck from the Bailey County Volunteer Fire Department.

Marching in formation was the Muleshoe Mighty 'M' Band, and alongside to guide the band were High School Bandmaster Jim Harvey and Junior High

School Bandmaster Bob Badger. Leading the band were twirlers, Monica Griffiths and Marilyn Pool, followed by Majorettes Cynthia Gable and Jeanie Putman.

Flat bed trailers were utilized to transport the football players and pep squad, with decorated cars and pickups all through the parade route.

The parade went from high school to Highway 214, north to Highway 84, one block east to Main Street, then down Main Street to the north end of the Boy Scout grounds.

Waiting for the crowd on the Boy Scout grounds was a tall pyramid of scrap lumber, topped by an Indian effigy. The effigy swung from an improvised gallows, complete with colorful headband. As the pyramid bonfire blazed, the effigy was consumed in the fire. Providing a sideline of entertainment, firecrackers which had been stuffed into a hip pocket of the coveralls on the effigy exploded, crackling their own music.

Special music was presented by the band, and the cheerleaders led the group around the bonfire in spirited school yells.

Lyndal Murray, manager of C. R. Anthony, was special speaker at the pep rally. He said, "I have watched the Muleshoe..."

North Wind; Cold Temperature Fails To Deter Capacity Crowd

An overflowing homecoming crowd Friday night was not disappointed in Benny Douglass Stadium in Muleshoe when the Muleshoe Mules broke a long standing losing streak and defeated the Friona Chieftans, 20-7.

During halftime activities, queen candidates for the 1970 homecoming queen and their escorts were announced. Candidates were Marilyn Pool, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Myron Pool III; Cathy Mardis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Mardis and Judy Winn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jess Winn. Named queen for 1970 was Judy Winn. Each of the girls were presented gifts by the cheerleaders and Judy was crowned by her escort, Mark Dillman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Neal Dillman. Escorts for the other two candidates were Jon Cole and Jack Allison.

With Friona receiving the initial kickoff, they were unable to move the ball and punted to Muleshoe. On the Mules first offensive play, district leading scorer Bobby Hayes broke loose and galloped 55 yards for the Mules first TD. His running partner, Don Wheat, skinned across the goal line for two extra points and with less than two minutes gone on the clock, the score was 8-0.

The stunned Friona players were unable to control the ball and it went back to Muleshoe within 25 yards of the goal line before losing out to Friona on a fumble.

Friona was unable to reach the shadow of the goal posts in the freezing north wind, but the fired-up Mules began a steady march and scored on a quick pitch-out from quarterback Mike Riley to Don Wheat, who passed to Bobby Hayes in the end zone from approximately the three yard line.

An attempted pass for extra points failed and the Mules had maintained almost complete control of the ball through the first quarter and well into the second quarter.

Friona, who was riding on a two game winning streak this year, after defeating Farwell in their first game, 27-16 and Bovina the following week, 27-6, saw the scoreboard reflecting a possible upset at halftime. The halftime score was 14-0 and the Mules' fans packed in the stands and along the fence were wildly cheering.

Going into the third stanza, both Muleshoe and Friona defenses held until late in the quarter. After a long run by a Chieftan, Friona's Donnie Luellen scored from the five yard line and blasted through the middle. Bobby Drake booted the extra point, and Friona officially logged their solitary points in the game.

A 25-yard touchdown run by Bobby Hayes in the third was called back and nullified on a Mule penalty, keeping the score 14-7 going into the fourth.

Mule quarterback Mike Riley added the final TD for the game with 1:17 on the field scoreboard as he plucked over from the one-yard line. Bobby Hayes attempted to run the extra points was rucked up in an Indian skirmish slightly behind the goal line.

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MAIF Contacts Beef Processing Concern

An industrial prospect met in Muleshoe on Monday, September 21, with part of the Muleshoe Area Industrial Foundation industrial team and several people who work with at-

tempting to secure industry for the Muleshoe area.

Chicago representatives of a beef liver processing firm worked with Earl Harris, Don Harmon, Max King, Jeff Peeler, M.D. Gunstream, E.T. Ford, Neal Dillman, Alex Williams, Jess Winn, Bill Loyd, James Glaze, Stan Barrett and Ralph Douglas, who was called in from Lubbock to assist.

Harmon Elliott, manager of the MAIF, said the industrial teams showed the prospective industrialists the former vegetable processing facility on the west side of Muleshoe on Highway 84. It was decided that the former vegetable plant would be the feasible location because of the cooling space available in the plant.

Elliott explained that before the building could be utilized, much remodeling would have to be done and equipment would be necessary. He added that MAIF is working presently figuring remodeling and equipment prices and a decision will be made at a later meeting.

The beef processing concern from Chicago prepares beef lives in large quantities in frozen packages for delivery to large supermarkets.

If the processing plant moves to Muleshoe, they will employ 10-12 persons, with up to 40 persons expected to be eventually employed.

The MAIF chairman said the industrial foundation has worked all this year on mobile home building prospects. He said that by letter and telephone 11 different mobile home manufacturers have been contacted.

Enochs Gin Gets First '70 Cotton Bale

Dean Gilliam, a farmer one mile north and one mile west of Enochs, hopes he has broken his unlucky '13' jinx. He produced the first bale of cotton which was ginned in Bailey County for 1970. The cotton was taken to Enochs Gin Co., Inc. Wednesday. Enochs Gin Co., Inc. owners are D.J. Cox and Howard Hale.

Gilliam said that last year, he was hailed out on June 13; frozen out on replanted cotton on October 13; made 13 bales of cotton and got 13 cents a pound for his crop.

Hand-pulled from a dryland crop, the bale was 475 pounds and produced 810 pounds of seed. The Enochs farmer had planned Paymaster III seed.

Several farmers who were around Enochs Gin Co., Inc. Thursday afternoon predicted "fair" crops for the Enochs area this fall. Although some cotton had to be replanted following the June "blow-outs" from three sandstorms, most Enochs area farmers proved to be optimistic about their crops.

Barring a disastrous early freeze, such as the one which virtually wiped out farmers in the southern areas of the county last year, most cotton farmers predicted one-half to three-fourths of a bale per acre on their dryland crops.

Even though some farmers had scanty moisture and were delayed in their planting due to the lack of rainfall, the crops in the immediate Enochs area

Duck Season Set To Open November 4

The duck season opens in Texas November 4, and continues through January 12. Under the new system, 90-point ducks are the mallard hen, black duck, wood duck, redhead, canvastack, New Mexican duck and hooded merganser, both drakes and hens. Ducks rated at 20 points are mallard drakes, pintail hens, both drake and hen ring-necked ducks and mottled ducks. All other ducks, not listed above, count 10 points each, except for the closed season on fulvous and black-bellied tree ducks.

The proclamation explains, "The daily bag limit will be reached when the point value of the last bird taken during the day and added to the sum of the point value of other ducks already taken during that day reaches or exceeds 100 points." For example, a hunter who has taken nine ducks of 10 points value each for a count of 90 may fill his daily bag with one more duck of any value. On the other hand, a hunter with one 90-point duck in the bag who then takes a second duck of any species has also filled his limit for the day.

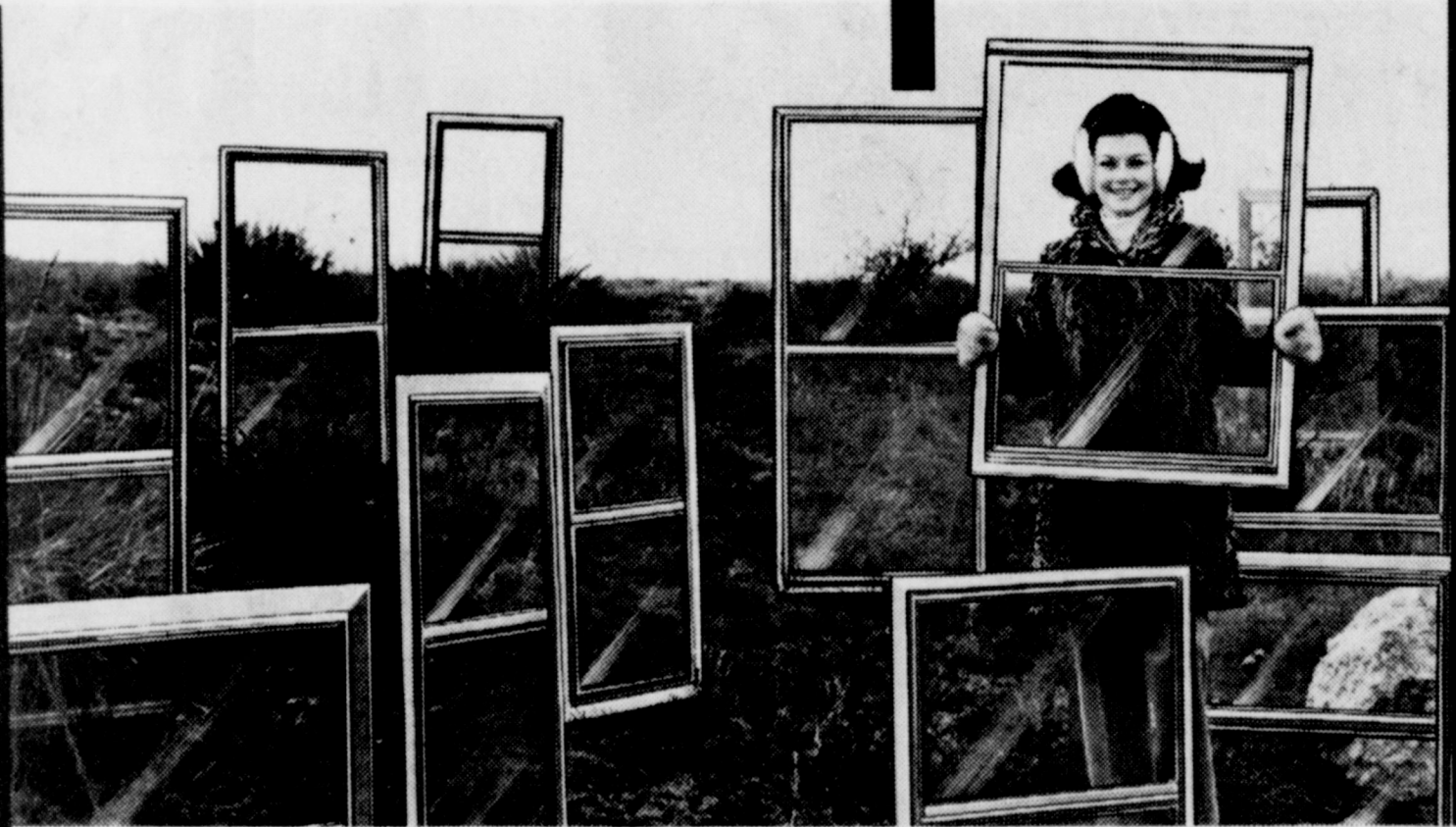

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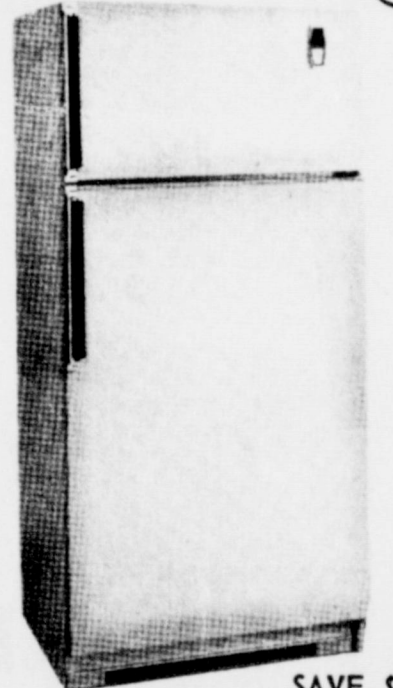
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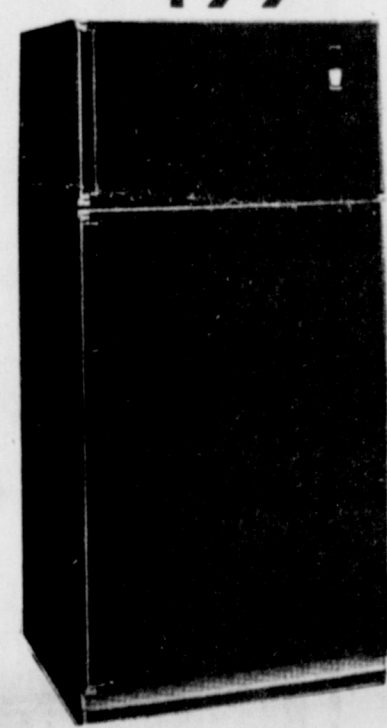

After a recital in Grand Rapids, Michigan, David Nicolette of the Grand Rapids Press wrote, "Away from the piano it would be difficult to convince anyone who hadn't heard her play that she is a formidable musical talent. She's just too

youngful, open and friendly. Any doubts that little Christina might not have the maturity of felling and physical strength to meet the demands of piano concertizing vanished as she presented a stirring program of Beethoven, Schumann, Ravel, Chopin and others."

4-H Leads The Way To Higher Education

SPECIAL--A total of 286 scholarships valued at \$166,700 are offered this year to current and former 4-H members. These bring the dollar amount of educational grants given during the last decade to \$1.4 million.

The figures were compiled by the National 4-H Service Committee, Chicago, which obtains funds from private sources.

Some 45 of 60 donors contribute funds for scholarships which range from \$300.00 to \$1,600. Each business firm or foundation sponsors a specific program such as safety, or underwrites scholarships to be used in pursuing specific courses of study such as forestry.

Several companies have been supporting 4-H in this manner for about 50 years. Among the pioneers are Montgomery Ward; International Harvester Company; The Santa Fe Railway System; Chicago and North Western Railway Company; The Sears-Roebuck Foundation and Kerr Glass Manufacturing Corporation.

In the learn-by-doing 4-H program, scholarships are awarded to national or regional winners who usually are high school juniors or seniors, or college freshmen.

There are 45 such programs which range from achievement to veterinary science.

The scholarships can be used for a regular four-year college course or in vocational schools, short courses, business training, nursing and the like.

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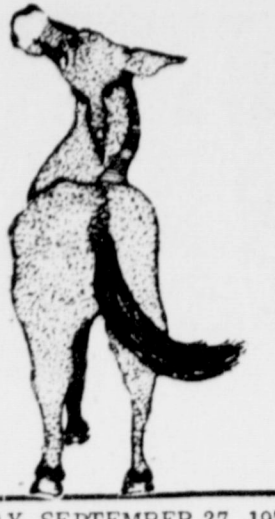

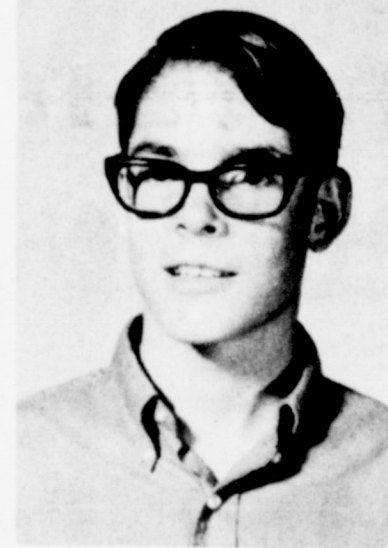
