





An examination of the fact is conclusive: brutality in the name of good, unproduction by regulation, the deification of a group of men as a deity (tody such is Parliament, the State, the Federal Government...every group but our God), and always the eventual illegalization of individual responsibility (for the good of the people, of course) with slavery to the 'state': intellectual, soul, spiritual, and bodily slavery becoming more obvious. And with the illegalization of individual responsibility and action, virtue, honor and glory and immortality and peace become evils. YES, the results of socialism in Britain are undesirable. But those fruits, those results are predictable; they vindicate God's Word, for the leaders, the judges, the administrators and the people are in rebellion against God and His decreed bonds as they deny God's good will, God's truth, and His salvation to men except via their a-thiestic plans. Of course it is noteworthy that the results are never as their many PROMISES - birds do not knowingly fly into the net.
