

Marc Gilmore Dies From Explosion Injuries

CLYDE — Funeral services for Marc Gilmore, 23 a Clyde Volunteer Fireman, who died from injuries received in a Feb. 11th explosion, were held at 2 p. m. Thursday in the First Baptist Church of Clyde.

Rev. Glenn Ward, pastor of Cherry Heights Baptist Church officiated, assisted by Rev. Riley Fugitt, pastor of the First Baptist Church, and Roy Phemister, minister of Clyde Church of Christ.

Burial was in Ross Cemetery in Baird, under the direction of Bailey Funeral Home of Clyde.

Gilmore died at 8:30 p. m. Tuesday in Hendrick Memorial Hospital.

Born April 10, 1950 in Abilene, Gilmore was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert G. Gilmore of Clyde. He married Brenda Cutbirth on May 26, 1973 in Clyde.

He lived in Baird until he was three years of age, and lived seven years at Cottonwood, before moving to Clyde. He was a 1968 graduate of Clyde High School, and received his Associate degree from Cisco Junior College in 1970. He attended Hardin-Simmons where he was a member of the Cowboy Band and Concert Band.

Gilmore was a member of the Cherry Heights Baptist Church, where he served as music and youth director. He had been an active member of Clyde Volunteer Fire Department for the past three years, and had been employed by Check Chevrolet Co. in Baird for the past seven months.

Callahan County Meeting Set On Pilot Predator Control Program

BAIRD — Farmers and ranchers in Callahan County will have an opportunity to learn about an experimental coyote control program on Wednesday, March 6, at 9 a. m. in the District Courtroom, announces Co. Agent Greg Gerngross.

The meeting will concern the safe use of the M-44 spring loaded ejector which uses sodium cyanide capsules as a means of controlling predatory animals. The device has been approved by the Environmental Protection Agency, for use in 15-monthly experimental programs in 44 counties. The program will be directed by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The aim of the program is to determine the safest, least expensive and most effective methods of controlling predators without harm to other wildlife and environment. Only those farmers and ranchers participating in the training meeting will receive certificates, to be certified to purchase the M-44 and capsules to use in the pilot program.

Dr. Rex Kyker Featured Speaker at CofC Banquet

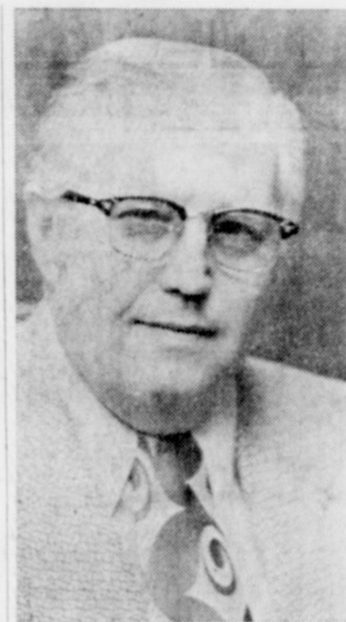

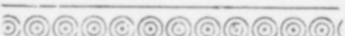

Baird Tracksters Place Fifth In Ballinger Invitational Track Meet

BAIRD — The track team won 5th place at the Ballinger Invitational Track Meet last Saturday. There were 14 teams entered, including 1973 Class A State champ, Sonora.

Mason placed 1st in the meet with 70 points.

Baird scored in several of the event. Jimmy Meador placed 2nd in the shot put with a toss of 42'6", and won 1st in the discus with a throw of 151'10" — a very commendable throw this early in the season.

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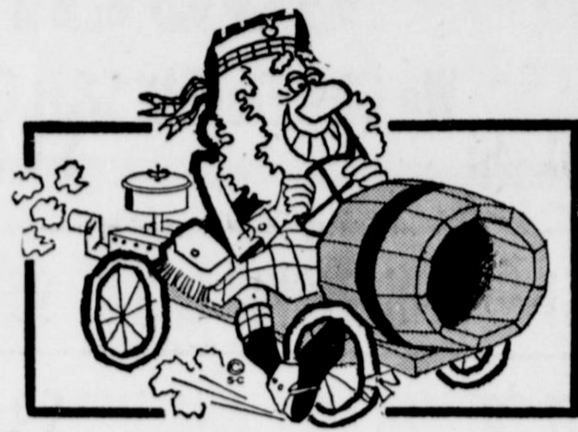
