Showers Continue To Fall Over Sector

Showers have continued to fall over the Cross Plains area during the past week. Rains have ranged from heavy, brief downpours to light sprinkles.

The moisture has been a boon

to area gardens, fruit crops, pastures and other crops which have been planted. It has, however, delayed peanut planting and sowing of maize and hay crops.

The wet weather also is endangering wheat and oat crops.

Most area farmers, although hedging on actually saying enough rain has fallen, indicated that dry, sunshiny weather is needed to ripen small grain crops so harvest may begin on what is expected to be a bumper crop. Others opine that dry weather is needed to get peanut crops planted.

In most sections of the Cross Plains area grain harvest is still a week or more away. If drying conditions are not forthcoming soon peanut crops could be extremely late.

In most local areas rainfall ranging from sprinkles to heavy showers have fallen during the past week. Almost daily Cross Plains has gotten a shower. Monday afternoon and during the night .75 of an inch was gauged here.

At Cross Cut Ron Bagley reported only a light shower Monday, but he had 1.70 inches of rain during the past week.

The Pioneer community has averaged about 2.00 inches of rain in the past seven days counting the shower Monday.

N. V. Gibbs reported .60 of an inch at Rowden Monday, and noted that about another one inch fell during the week.

Roy Tatom at Atwell reported only .30 of an inch on Monday and a light sprinkle Tuesday.

Top rain on Monday was reported by Mrs. Alice Champion near Cottonwood with an even inch.

Edwin Erwin at Sabanno gauged .60 of an inch on Monday and another .20 of an inch fell there Tuesday.

No high winds nor hail was reported at any community in this section of the state during the past week.

Baird Junior Rodeo Slates 3-Day Show For This Year

The Baird Junior Rodeo has been shortened to three days this year. Performances will be held at 8 o'clock Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights, June 7, 8 and 9, according to Dick Vestal, Baird FFA advisor and driving force behind the annual event.

Vestal cited lower number of entries, soaring costs of energy and travel as the reasons for cutting the show back to three nights instead of the usual four-performance show as has been the custom for the past several years.

The rodeo will be held in the Callahan County Sheriff's Posse arena just east of Baird of U. S. Highway 80 (Interstate 20 business route).

The show will be produced by Runt Sloan of Newcastle, who has produced the Baird show for some years, and produces rodeos all over central and West Texas.

Admission to the rodeo will be \$1 for students and \$2 for adults.

Competition will be held in three age brackets for both boys and girls, 16 to 19, 13 to 15 and 12 years and under. Girls events are barrel racing, pole bending, flag race, breakaway roping and goat tying. Boys events include bareback broncs, ribbon roping, bull riding, tie down roping, breakaway roping, flag race, barrel race, wild steer saddling and steer riding. An added attraction will be a boot race for cowboys and cowgirls 8 and under.

Saddles will be presented the all-around cowboy and all-around cowgirl.

L. E. Weeks of Abilene will help judge the 17th annual show. Vestal will do the announcing.

A street parade will be held through downtown Baird at 5 p.m. Saturday, June 9.

Post Office Requires New Size Standards July 15

"Use up your small and undersized envelopes and cards before July 15," Sectional Center Manager - Postmaster Jack D. Watson reminds customers. That is the date when the Postal Service's new size standards become effective.

The Fort Worth postmaster said that after July 15, envelopes and cards measuring less than 3½ inches high or 5 inches long will be returned to the sender if mailed.

Postmaster Watson said that because the envelope and greeting card industries have had more than three years to prepare for the new standards, few retailers should still be selling undersized pieces.

"Many consumers, however, are likely to still have smaller envelopes and cards in their supply of stationery," Watson said.

The regulations also prohibit flimsy cards. In the future they must be at least seven-thousandths (.007) of an inch thick. An official postal card, for instance, has a thickness of nine thousandths of an inch.

Undersized pieces and flimsy cards are being banned because they can become trapped in other mail, tear and jam mail processing machinery. As a result, the letters of others can also be damaged, it was noted.

The standards also affect oversized and odd-shaped pieces of mail, Watson said. For first-class mail weighing one ounce or less, there will be a surcharge of 7 cents for pieces more than 6 1/8th inches high or 1 1/2 inches long.

Vaccinate Horses For Sleeping Sickness

Texas horse owners should begin plans to vaccinate their animals against Eastern, Western and Venezuelan Encephalomyelitis, advises Greg Gerngross, Callahan County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service with offices in the courthouse at Baird.

This sleeping sickness is caused by viruses transmitted by mosquitoes.

Early clinical signs of the disease are depression and high fever. Diminished reflexes, a drooping lower lip, reluctance to move and incoordination soon follow.

Horse owners should consult their veterinarians about vaccination against all types of the disease, Gerngross advises. Following the initial series, annual booster shots are required.

Gerngross believes those vaccinations are worth the trouble since prevention is cheaper than treatment or losing a valuable animal. Since the course of the disease is short, treatment is generally unsuccessful. Also, treatment costs would pay for several animals' vaccinations each year.

To aid mosquito control, insect repellents, sprays and screened enclosures for night stabling may be helpful.

"What Is The Holy Ghost?"

First of all I think it would be more correct to say, "WHO is the Holy Ghost?" He is the third person of the Divine Trinity, through whom the entire Godhead works with man. The personal pronoun "He" is used most often in the Bible in reference to the Holy Spirit or Holy Ghost. In the Hebrew language the word "ruah elohim" means Spirit of God; in Greek, "pneuma to hagion" is Holy Ghost or Holy Spirit. So, we see these terms all refer to the same thing.

Salvation is God's greatest gift to the world. The Holy Ghost is God's greatest gift to His children, the Church. There could be no new birth (salvation) until Jesus paid the sin price at Calvary and became the first-born from the dead. It is the work of the Holy Ghost that makes man NEW CREATURE. When a person makes Jesus Lord over his life, the Holy Spirit comes upon him and overshadows him just as He did Mary when there was conceived in her a "holy thing". There is born in that person a new life, a new spirit, and he becomes literally born of God. Man, in his natural state of sin is taken and his spirit is recreated in God's image. This change of man's nature is the greatest miracle of any age.

The ministry of the Holy Spirit is not to only impart the nature of God to the spirit of man, but to come and live in the new creature and to reveal to him the exact knowledge of God; to give him a new heart of flesh in place of a stony one; and cause him to keep God's statutes. (Ezk. 36-26, 27). The will of God is that every BELIEVER be filled with the Spirit. In the early church men were taught to receive the Holy Spirit upon becoming believers. To be born again and not be filled with the Spirit, is like being a train without a track. The infilling of the Holy Ghost is the POWER needed to carry on one's service to God. The Greek word "dunamis", translated "power", like dynamite, ability and might. After the Power from on high is endowed upon the believer, he has the ability to become a witness for Christ. (Acts 1:8) The "power" to become the sons of God in John 1:12 was the "legal right" or "authority" to become something. The traditions and doctrines of men have ribbed many believers of the indwelling of the Holy Spirit by failing to teach new converts that the Holy Spirit is not only available but also is a command of the Lord. Conversion is by and through the Holy Spirit, and He is from that time on "with" you. Jesus said, "And I will pray the Father, and He shall give you another Comforter, that He may abide WITH you forever; Even the Spirit of truth; whom the world cannot receive, because it seeth Him not, neither knoweth Him: but ye know Him: for He dwelleth WITH you, and shall be IN you." (John 14:16, 17) The Baptism of the Holy Ghost is the Baptism of POWER. John the Baptist said that he baptised with water unto repentance; but Jesus would baptise with the Holy Ghost and with fire. (Matt. 3:11) Jesus told his disciples that they would receive power after the Holy Ghost had come upon them. (Acts 11:15, 16) You must agree that those people were saved believers at Pentecost when they were FILLED with the Holy Ghost and spoke with other tongues as the Spirit gave utterance. (Acts 2:2-4) The Baptism in the Holy Spirit must be preceded by regeneration (salvation), and only then can the Holy Spirit take up residence within your "Holy Temple". (1 Cor. 6:19)

The first "outpouring" was in the upper room on the day of Pentecost, but it was a continuing occurrence from that time on. The Gentiles later received the Baptism of the Holy Ghost just like the Jews had, and they recognized that fact because "they heard them speak with tongues and magnify God." (Acts 10:44-48), (Acts 11:15-17) The apostle Paul received the Holy Spirit three days after he was saved. (Acts 13:9) Twenty-five years after Pentecost Paul went to Ephesus and asked the believers there if they had received the Holy Ghost. They told him they had never heard about it. Then Paul laid hands upon them and they received the Holy Ghost and spoke in other tongues. (Acts 19:1-6) In Acts 8:14-17 many believers in Samaria received the Holy Ghost. Another way we can see that Salvation and the Baptism in the Holy Spirit are two separate experiences and not imposed unknowingly or automatically is by the words of our Lord as quoted in Luke 11:9-13. He tells us in many ways and various places in the Bible to seek the Baptism in the Holy Spirit. He says He will give the Holy Spirit to them that ASK Him.

We have been looking at the different aspects of God's saving work in man. It is necessary to look at these three experiences — salvation, water baptism, and Baptism in the Holy Spirit — separately, because of our inhibited way of living they have become separated, and the full picture has been lost. In the early church these three experiences occurred closely together — but this has not often been the case today.

The scriptures assure us that God does not change and that the promise of the Comforter is still available to us today exactly as it was then. John 14:12 says, "Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that believeth on me, the works that I do shall he do also; and greater works than these shall he do; because I go unto my Father." Joel 2:28 prophesies, "And it shall come to pass afterward, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh; and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy. Your old men shall dream dreams, and your young men shall see visions: (29) and also upon the servants and upon the handmaids in those days will I pour out my Spirit." Finally we realize this Promise of the gift of the Holy Ghost is available to us today as it was in Bible days by the scripture; Acts 2:38, 39: "Then Peter said unto them, Repent, and be baptised every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost . . . For the promise is unto you, and to your children, and to all that are afar off, even as many as the Lord our God shall call."

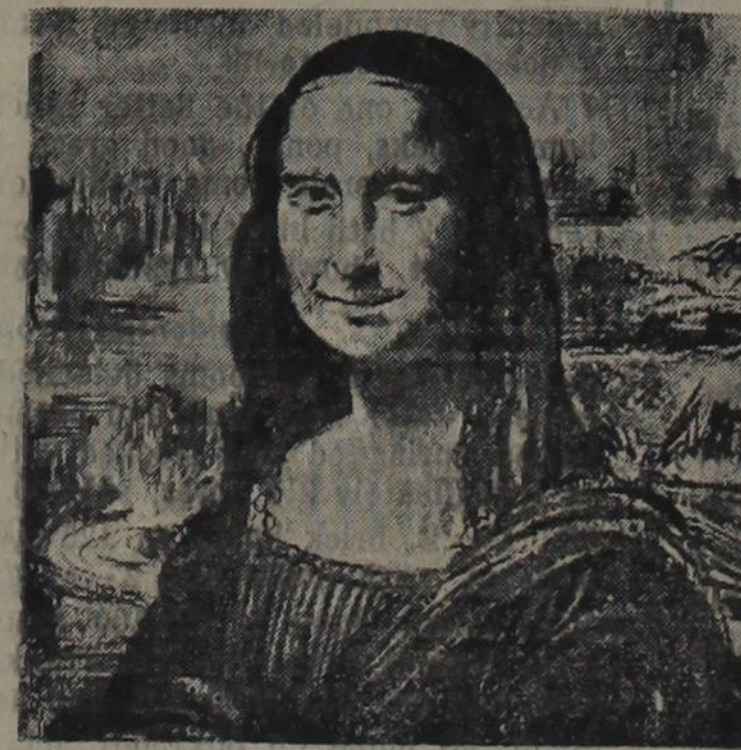

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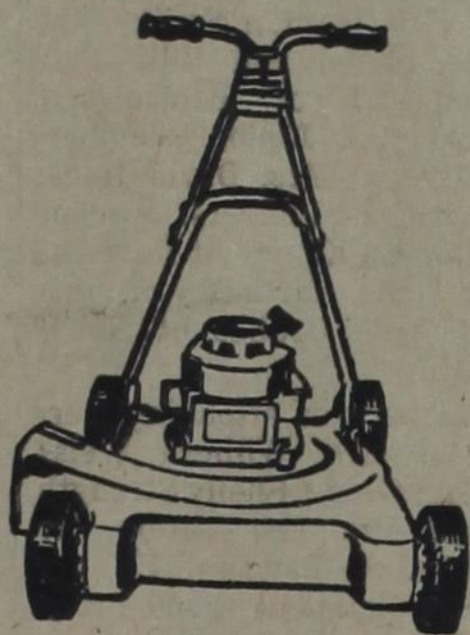
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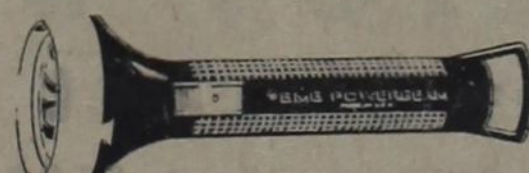

Pioneer News Items

Thank you Gladys Sessums! You were the only one to call in your news. I called twenty-six homes, some more than once, trying to find people at home this lovely Monday morning. Many were probably in their gardens.

Last time I spared you some of the news you don't get through regular channels. This time I'll not be so nice—just some little know bits and pieces.

The U. S. House of Representatives is balking at the vote that will ultimately cost the taxpayers \$26.1 billion to complete the giveaway of the Panama Canal. Contrary to the media-created public opinion, the Canal issue is not over. According to the treaty itself and the Constitution (Art. IV, Sec. 3, Clause 2) the House must act to implement the treaty and provide funds. On May 17, by only 2 votes, the giveaway survived a vote that would have killed it by a return to committee. Proponents are postponing any future votes until they can change enough votes to insure passage. Carter has hosted 100 congressmen hunting giveaway votes.

President Carter has established a Helocaust Commission that plans to spend \$30-50 million to educate the public to demand Senate ratification of the Genocide Treaty. Also a Holocaust Center is to be attached to the Smithsonian Institute and a recommended TV documentary will be additional taxpayer costs. The Genocide Treaty passed the United Nations following the horrors of World War II. Few people seem aware that what was done to the Jews, Gypsies and others by Nazi Germany was little different than what our allies (Russians) were doing to those people we returned through Operation Keelhaul. Russia (a member of the U.N. Security Commission) insisted that genocide for "political" reasons be stricken from the treaty or they would veto the measure. All the mass murders committed by Communists are "political" so the treaty will never protect their victims. Genocide, under the language of the treaty is not just the physical death of a person or persons. It is also the death or end of a culture or traditional religion, etc. Missionaries and those who contribute to their

support would be guilty of the crime of cultural genocide and could be hauled before a World Court for teaching pagans the Bible! According to Sen. Sam Ervin, hailed by most law scholars as the top constitutional authority, the U. S. would no longer be a sovereign nation, but under a world system and there is no protection for U. S. citizens from forced extradition.

The GAO (Government Accounting Office) completed a study that was supposed to support the metric conversion but backfired and showed that economically it could not help anyone except textbook publishers and others in the educational materials field by giving them a whole new market. A bill has been introduced to repeal the metric conversion legislation of the early 1970s. Virginians are fighting the rezoning that will allow 236 acres to be the site for 6,000 workers.

The FCC (Federal Communication Commission) is now trying to reach a decision on a proposal that homosexuals be officially designated a community group that must be consulted before a radio or TV station can have its license renewed. Fear has struck the hearts of some station managers. In Texas and California preachers have been taken off the air for using anti-gay sermons when "persons" called to complain of bias. In Dallas the gays were given more than equal time to present their side and the preacher is in court trying to get back on TV.
