Rains Wet Sector; Hail Hits 2 Areas

Rain and hail struck the Cross Plains area early Tuesday morning as thunderstorms roamed this section of Texas.

Apparently the most damage was done in the Atwell Community about 9 miles north of Cross Plains. Alton Tatom reported that his and area gardens were ruined by the hailstones which were reported as big as large marbles. Oat crops in that area also suffered heavy damage. Fruit crops were also expected to suffer from the pounding of the ice.

Torrential rains fell in that sector with 2.7 inches being reported by Tatom. His gauge showed one-half inch early Sunday.

The Sabanno community, about 7 miles northeast of here, also suffered hail damages. Edwin Erwin reported that his garden was damaged by the hail, but it was not yet known if the fruit crop suffered greatly. He reported 2.00 inches of rain there, early Sunday morning .50 of an inch fell there.

Charlie Sowell who lives about two miles north of Cottonwood said that his gauge showed 2.50 inches of rain Tuesday morning. Although he reported no hail,

S. E. Paige, who lives about mid-way between here and Cottonwood reported 1.40 inches of rain on Tuesday and an inch Sunday.

W. O. Rachels at Pioneer and Ron Bagley at Cross Cut both reported gauges showed one inch of rain Tuesday morning.

That amount was also reported by Bagley on Sunday. Rachels had only half that on Sunday.

An inch was reported by Sterling Odom at Rowden Tuesday, and at the N. V. Gibbs place .50 of an inch was gauged early Sunday. Winds blew considerable Sunday, it was reported.

Mrs. Leota Maynor, who with her family lives just north of Burkett, said her gauge showed .90 of an inch Tuesday morning and .50 of an inch early Sunday.

Virtually all area stock tanks are full, and pastures and fields are soaked. The agricultural outlook for this section of Texas looms extremely bright at the present.

Most Veterans Qualify For Marker, Cash Allowance

Under federal laws, the U. S. Veterans Administration can provide a headstone for the grave of most veterans whose military service was under honorable conditions. According to Irvin G. Mobley, service officer for Callahan County, the families of some veterans do not want the government grave marker, preferring to install a private marker of their own choice.

Public Law 95-476, enacted during the 1978 Session of the U. S. Congress, now permits the Veterans Administration to pay a cash allowance toward the purchase of a non-government grave marker for the graves of eligible veterans. The payment of the cash allowance applies only in cases where the burial of the eligible veteran has occurred on or after October 18, 1978, the date the above mentioned law was approved.

When a veteran is buried in a private or public cemetery, other than a National Cemetery, and the family or next of kin has purchased a private grave marker, a claim can be made for the cash payment from the VA. VA Form 21-8834 can be used for this purpose, and must be supported by written proof of the purchase of the private grave marker. The VA, following receipt of the application and proof of purchase, will pay a maximum of \$50 to the claimant. This amount will be subject to periodic change, since the enabling legislation provided that the payment would be the same as what the VA must pay for the government headstones under the annual con-

tracts. If the cost of the government grave markers increase, then the VA will also increase the amount paid toward the purchase of the private headstone.

Persons who feel they might be eligible for the VA reimbursement for the purchase of a private headstone for a veteran should contract their local Veterans Service Officer for assistance in making application for the lump-sum payment.

Spray Pecan Trees With Zinc - Agent

One of the primary nutrients necessary for beautiful pecan trees and regular harvest of high quality pecans is zinc, says Greg Gerngross, Calahan County Extension Agent at Baird. Strange as it may seem, pecans are one of the few plants that can not absorb zinc from the soil. Application of zinc to the soil is of no significant value to pecan trees in Texas.

Zinc must be applied in a form that can be absorbed by the leaves. There are two types of zinc which can be used in Texas, zinc sulfate or ZZN. The rate of zinc for spraying pecan foliage in Texas are two pounds of zinc sulfate or one and one-fourth quarts of ZZN per 100 gallons of water. The homeowner should use two teaspoons of zinc sulfate or ZZN in one gallon of water. Three or four applications of zinc in April and May on mature pecan trees are sufficient to prevent a zinc deficiency.

With good zinc management, other cultural practices such as fertilization and irrigation will be more effective so zinc sprays are one of the most important first steps to success each year, says Gerngross.

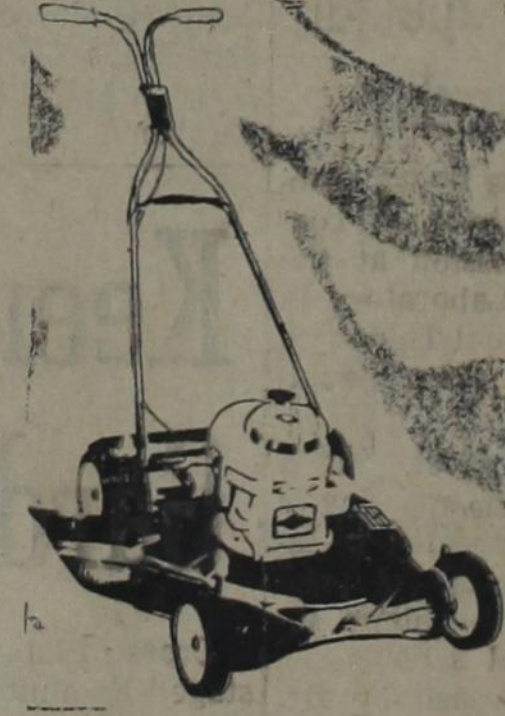

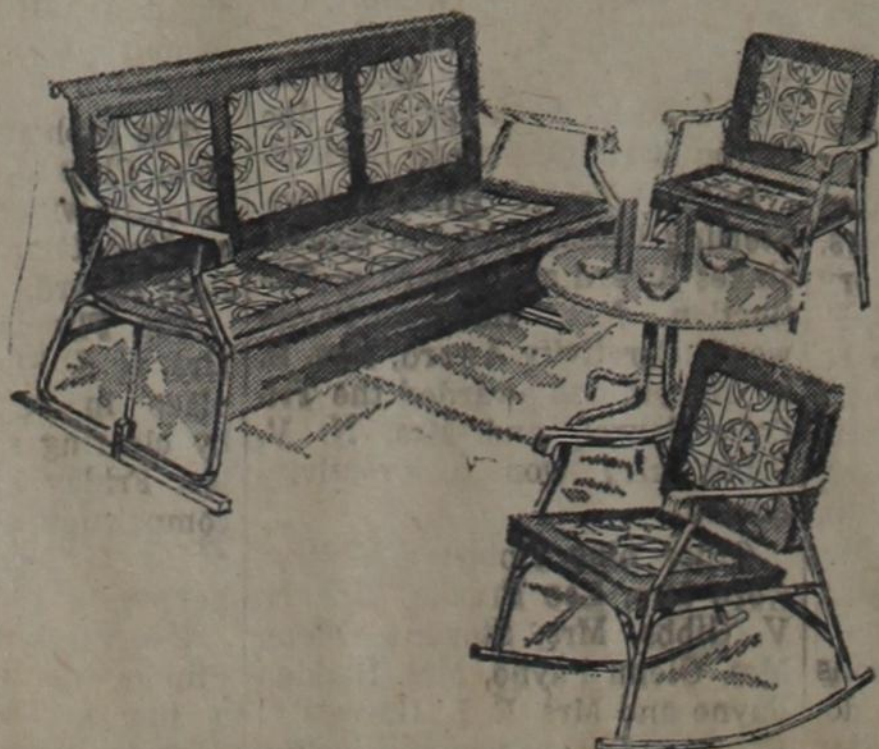

REBORN BLIND?

(Second of Three Parts)

But is this not an anomaly in view of the phenomena that the overwhelming majority of babies physically born are NOT born blind? And since Jesus illustrated spiritual truths by using observable phenomenon of the physical part of creation are we not well advised to reject such a premise? Yet, in examining the advocacy and participation of the nominal Christian in the aforementioned cultural practices, it must be concluded that the underlying premise that permits the participation is that Christians are reborn blind. Additionally, these advocates usually assert that being a Christian is no solution since no one knows for sure any effective answers or solutions to such complex problems that confound both the degreed scholars and elected politicians.

Now, this minister doesn't argue that such statements do not initially sound plausible, contritely humble and suggestive of real religion. But, upon analysis, if such philosophy is accepted, several leading theological questions must be answered by these advocates:

- * What was the message preached and believed by the nominal Christian?
- * Where are the differences that follow one being converted from hostility to God?
- * What is the urgency and advantages to specifically preaching, knowing and obeying?
- * What is the relevance (value) and authority (for the nominal Christian) to reject the spirit of fear and rest in Christ's Testament?
- * Lastly, Since both (unconverted and nominal Christian) admit no compelling contrast between God's will and the above, what does it mean to know the truth?

Interested young persons who meet the above requirements should write to Congressman Charles W. Stenholm, House of Representatives, Washington, D. C. 20515, no later than July 16 OCT or SAT examinations will then be necessary as a rating device to set up slates for nomination. The competition is keen but Cong. Stenholm wants to assure that all young persons who are interested in a military career may have an opportunity to compete for nomination.

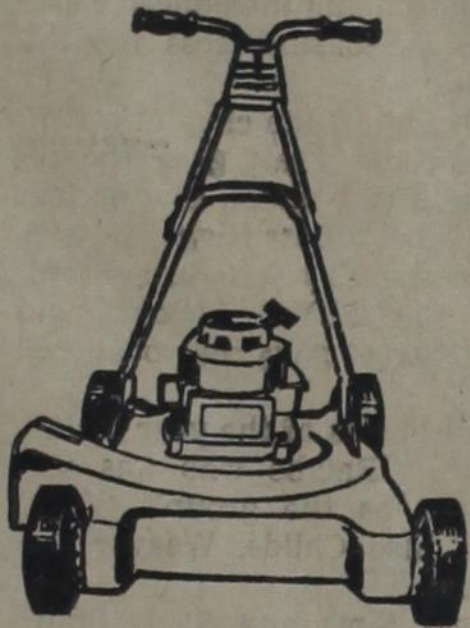
