"I have served as the principal of Cross Plains High School for nearly three years and I feel I have more than adequately performed my duties. I have tried to be consistent, fair, and honest in my dealings with all students, parents and associates. I feel good about the things I have done and feel no need to apologize to anyone."

"I hope that in future years Cross Plains will achieve a unity of spirit and commitment to the task of providing the best possible education for their youth. I feel that until such a spirit prevails, this community will continue to be divided and torn with unrest. Until the time comes that people can put aside their petty jealousies, stop their blame gossipy, and work for the best interest of all, instead of their own personal desires.

A race developed in the Cross Plains School Board election last week when Benny Callaway filed as a candidate.

He joins Joe E. Hanke, Jr. and Charles H. Payne as candidates for the two places. Three-year term of Hanke is expiring as is that of Payne, although he won the seat only last year in a one-year unexpired term vote.

Holdover board members are Randy Foster, John D. Montgomery, Roberta Conlee, Benny Glover and Reggy Stover.

There had been no new candidates during the week for Cross Plains City Council. A race exists there also.

Having already announced are Frank Robertson, Raymond Franke, Dwayne Wilson and James Nichols for two-year terms, and Ray Purvis for a one-year term.

Purvis is asking return to the board to finish a one-year term. He was appointed alderman several months ago to serve until regular election in place of James Le May.

Three regular two-year terms are up for grabs. Robertson and Franke are seeking return, while Bob Lane says he does not wish to run again. Wilson and Nichols, both newcomers to city politics are asking election.

Only Mayor O. B. Edmondson and Alderman W. G. (Wimpy) McCoy are holdovers in the Council.

Aspirants for the school board may file with Mrs. Conlee at her home south of town on Highway 279, and council candidates may file at the City Hall.

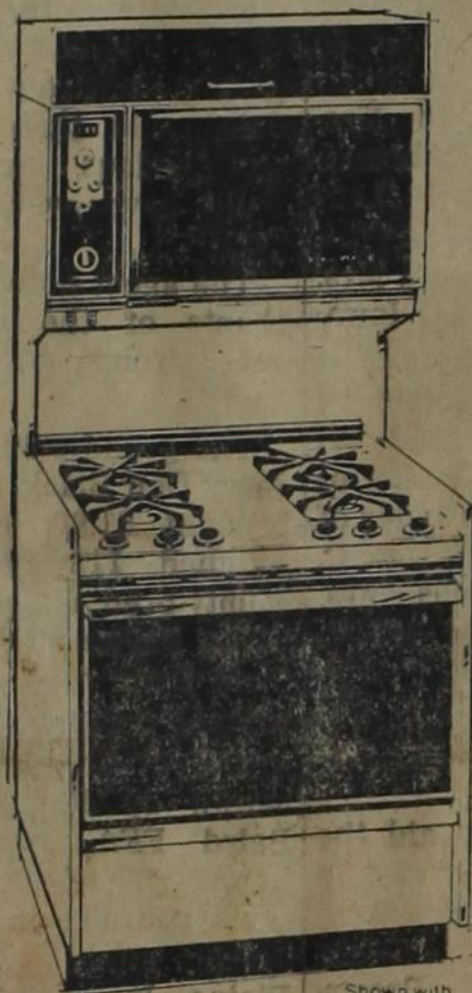

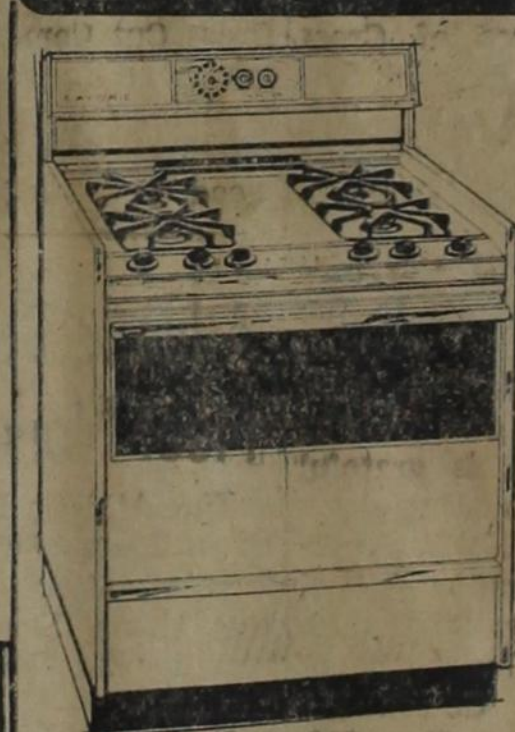

Local Phone Tax Passed To Patrons

Telephone users within the city limits of Cross Plains and Rising Star will see the local two per cent franchise tax added to their telephone bills beginning this month, according to Alan Armstrong, Customer Service Manager for Continental Telephone in Baird. The city tax had previously been paid by the company out of its local service revenues.

In a recent rate order to Continental, the Public Utility Commission of Texas directed that any local franchise or street use tax paid by the company be broken out from local service charges and passed on to customers receiving service in the taxing jurisdictions. The firm complied with this order in local rate adjustments placed into effect last summer, but held off billing the tax until certain questions were resolved and city councils notified of the change.

The commission determined that telephone users should be aware of the tax impact on their phone bills. Only customers within a taxing jurisdiction will be liable for the tax. The ruling exempts telephone customers in rural areas and those in cities levying no franchise tax.

"On the brighter side," said Armstrong, "we are pleased that the federal excise tax on both local and long distance service has been reduced from four per cent to three per cent. For many customers the reduction in federal tax will offset the added local tax. In both cases the telephone company serves only as the tax collector and regularly forwards the tax receipts to the appropriate government body."

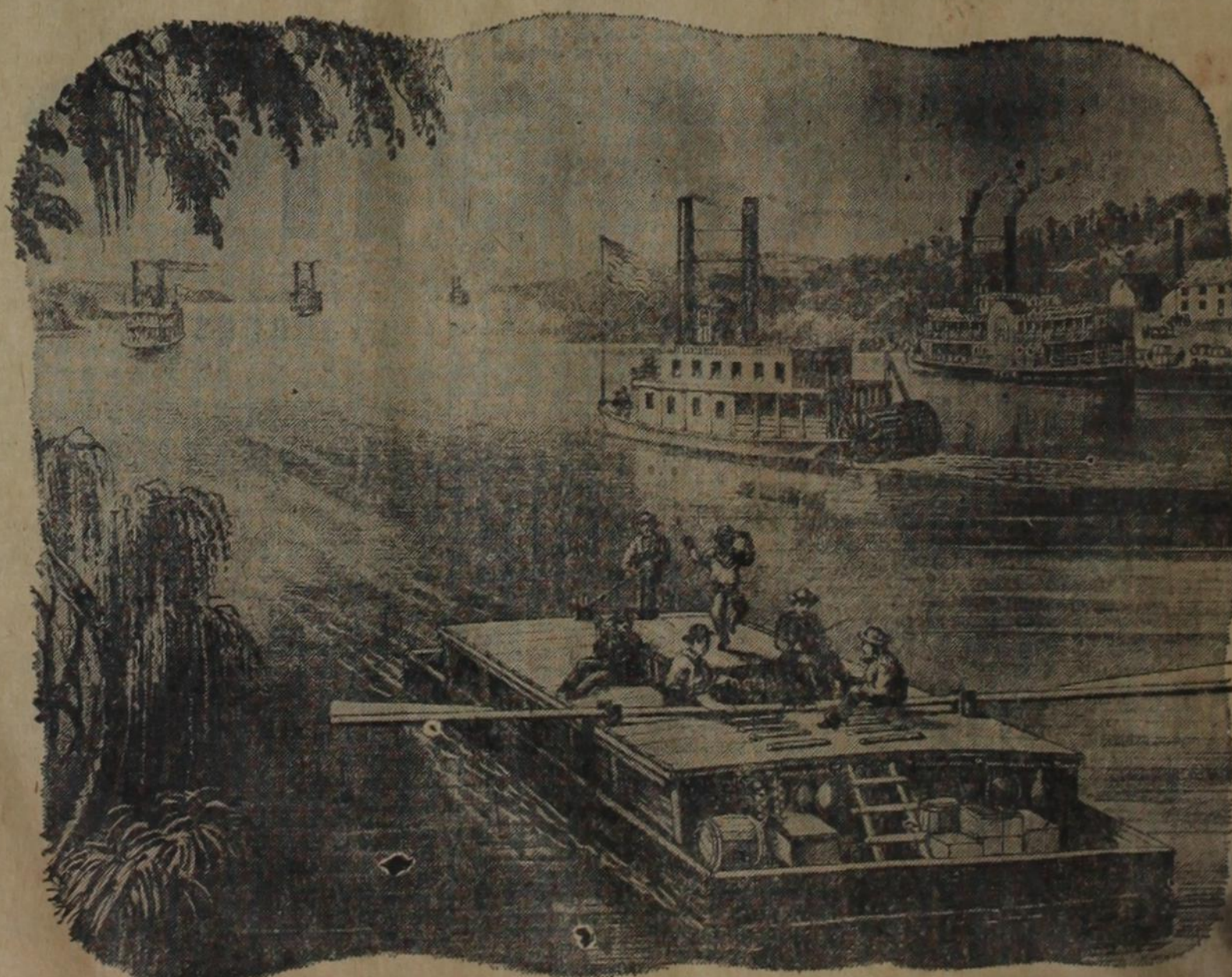
