BAIRD — A wind gauge not being present could be a big factor in keeping Kathy Jones from setting a National Record in the girl's long jump. Coach Robert Stovall will submit the jump, but it is doubtful of getting the mark approved.

Kathy, along with the girls track team, were competing in the Honeybee Relays at Stephenville last Friday.

Miss Jones had an effort of 20'2" for the long jump. This was one of her four records during the meet. She had a 6.9 in the 60-yard dash; 11.2 in the 100 and 36'4" in the triple jump. Last year Kathy set a national mark at Stephenville in the high jump with a height of 5'11"

Overall, the entire team did very well, scoring a total of 40 points. Creola Hardwick made the finals in the 100-yard dash, as did the 440-yard relay team, but both failed to place.

Miss Jones won the trophy for high point girl.

The next meet will be the District contest, which is to be held Thursday, April 5th, beginning at 3 p. m. on the ACC track in Abilene.

James Allen Hatchett Acquitted In 42nd District Court Monday

BAIRD — The 10-man, 2-woman jury found Spec. 5 James Allen Hatchett, innocent of the charge of murder with malice aforethought, after deliberating more than four hours. The jury acquitted him, ruling that he had not Delvin Willingham, 39, near Hamby, in self-defense last September 11th.

Following Judge Don Lane's reading of the verdict, Hatchett's wife, and Mrs. Delvin

Willingham, bust into tears. Later Mrs. Willingham collapsed in front of the Courthouse.

Pale, but obviously relieved, Hatchett had no expression when he learned that the jury had actually acquitted him. He stood quietly at the counsel table, looking toward his wife and Mrs. Willingham. His attorneys, A. L. (Dusty) Rhodes and John Allen Chalk thanked each of the jurors individually.

After he read the jury verdict, and before he announced it, Judge Lane called Sheriff Miller, Texas Ranger Sid Merchant and three other lawmen to the bench and told them to stand between the defendant and gallery of about 50 spectators who were in the courtroom, including members of both the Willingham and Hatchett families.

Paynter and Rhodes had several heated exchanges during the trial, the two almost had to be separated by deputies during Rhodes' final argument.

Hatchett still faces charges of being AWOL from his Army Post in Newport News, Va., and will be returned there for a possible court-marshal.

Defensive Driving Course To Be Held in Clyde School Cafeteria

CLYDE — Region 14 Education Service Center in Abilene, as a cooperating agency in the Driving Improvement Program with the Texas Safety Association, will conduct a Defensive Driving Course at Clyde School Cafeteria. The first meeting will be held Thursday, April 18 at 7 p. m.

The Defensive Driving Course is a ready-made program thru which an individual can minimize the risk of injuries from traffic accidents by learning defensive techniques. Not only do the graduates become safer drivers, but are eligible for auto insurance premium discounts which usually are greater than the cost of the course. Nearly five million men and women have already graduated from DDC courses taught by approved agencies.

The Defensive Driving Course is an 8 hour classroom course in accident avoidance. It is based on the driving techniques practiced by professional, commercial drivers. All DDC instructors have been certified by the National Safety Council. They employ the latest audio-visual

aids to supplement the course textbooks and state highway rules booklet, which each student receives. Students completing the course also receive a signed, wallet-sized certificate from the National Safety Council. Moreover, DDC students take with them the knowledge that they are no longer simply "average" drivers; they have become safer, more skillful, better drivers. Research indicates that DDC graduates as a whole have fewer accidents and traffic violations than they had before enrolling in the course.

The driving course, to be offered at (as stated previously) will meet for four consecutive Thursday nights from 7 to 9 p. m. beginning April 18. Interested adult licensed drivers are being accepted in the classroom. There are some openings yet to be filled. The class size will be limited to 35 individuals.

Students are charged a \$10.00 tuition fee to cover the cost of the course materials. To reserve a place in the class, interested persons may contact Don Allen at Clyde Schools.

Clyde Freshmen Take Second Place At Winters Invitational Track Meet

CLYDE — The Freshmen track team took 2nd place with 128 points at the Winters meet, just behind Colorado City's 132½ points.

Field events produced many points, with the only 1st and 2nds of the meet. Billy Dugan vaulted 9'6" for a 1st, with Buddy Moore winning 4th at 8'6". Carl Miller took 1st in high jump with 5'7" and Dugan won 3rd at 5'. Moore took 2nd with a leap of 18'5" in the long jump, with Joe Hale 6th and Rick Rose 7th in the same event. Jimmy Green and Glenn Reeder were 1st and 2nd in the discus. Reeder got 5th and Green 6th in the shot. Moore and Parker won 4th and 5th in the 330 relay.

The 440 relay ran a 50.4 for 3rd, with Keith Johnson, Wayne Parker, Joe Hale and Mike Walker, running. Buddy Moore, Wayne Parker, Mark Hogan and Mike Walker won 2nd in the 1320 relay. Kelly Young won 4th in the 660. Dugan and Johnson did well in the hurdles as they took 5th and 6th in the 70 highs and 4th, 5th in the 220 lows. Henry Lozano won 5th in the 1320 with 4:02.8. Hale won 2nd in the 100 and 200.

Clyde managed only 16 points in the tough Red Skin Relays, with 22 teams participating. Billy Dugan brought home a medal for his efforts in the high jump, clearing 5'8" for a near

record. Green got 4th in the discus. Reeder 6th in the shot, Hale 6th in the 100, Lozano 7th in the 1320, Parker 8th in the 330. Clyde also won 8th in the 440 relay and 7th in the 1320 relay.

The square dance planned to benefit West Texas Rehabilitation Center, has been postponed until after June 1, when the dance pavillion being built at the rodeo grounds will be completed.

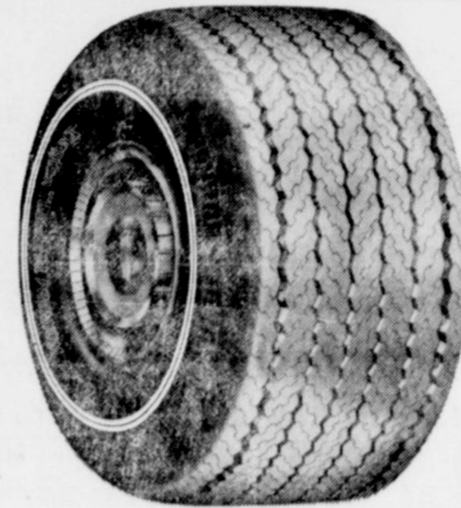

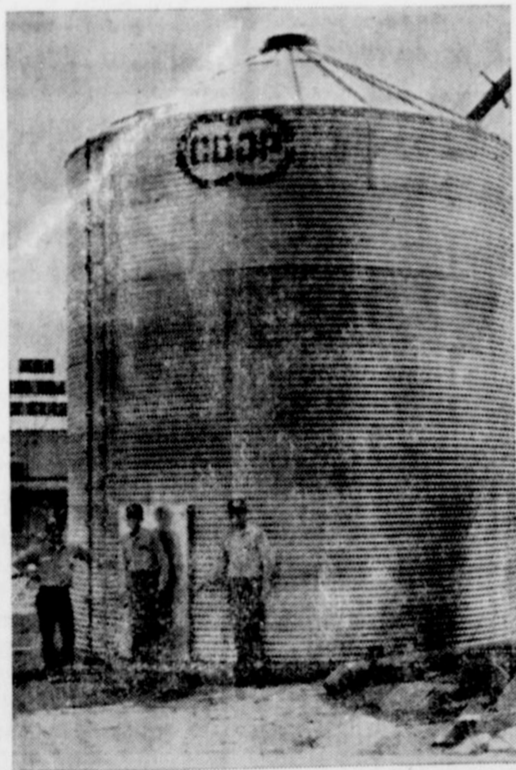

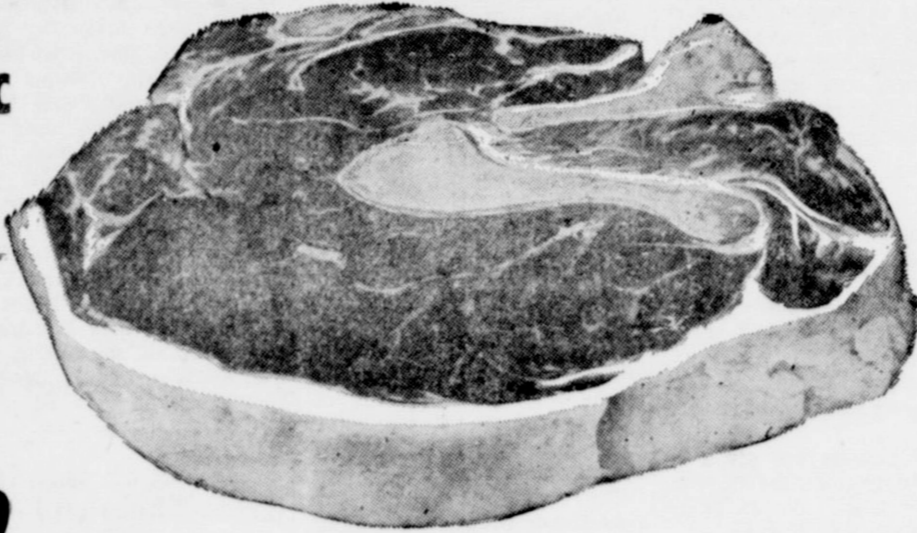
