

Are You Guilty?

God has always commanded his people to give hime one day out of seven. Today we see very few who are mindful of this commandment. In Ex. 20:8-10, God says, "Remember the sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days shalt thou labour and do all thy works: But the seventh day is the sabbath of the Lord thy God. In it hou shalt not do any work thou, nor thy sons, nor thy daughter, thy manservant, nor thy maidservant, nor thy cattle, nor thy stranger that is within thy gates."

Many today are careless of how they treat the Lord's day. Are we guilty of profaning the sabbath by not keeping it holy? What does God think about this? He says in Ezek. 22:8, Thou hast despised mine holy things and has profaned my sabbath." We see many who "justify" their seeking of worldly pleasures on the Lord's day by proclaiming that it is their day of rest, and they equate pleasure with rest. The word of God shows that holiness and worldly pleasure aren't the same thing in keeping the sabbath. Let us check the word of God: 'If thou turn away thy foot from the sabbath, from doing thy pleasure on my holy day; and call a delight, the holy of the Lord, honourable; and shalt honour him, not doing thine own ways, nor finding thine own pleasure, nor speaking thine own words; Then shalt thy delight thyself in the Lord; and I will cause thee to ride upon the high places of the earth, and feed thee with the heritage of Jacob thy father: for the mouth of the Lord hath spoken it." (Isa. 58:13, 14) The Lord tells us in Heb. 10:25, "Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is, but exhorting (encouraging) one another: and so much the more as ye see the day approaching." He is telling us how much more important it is in these last days than ever before.

One very common excuse we hear regarding not going to church is "that there are too many hypocrites in the church". If you are hiding behind a hypocrite, you must be smaller than him. There are hypocrites in every profession, but that is no argument against that profession, just as it is no argument against Christ or the church. You will not have to answer for the sins of the hypocrite at the judgment, but your own. Rom. 2:13 "But woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites; for ye shut up the kingdom of heaven against men; for ye neither go in yourselves, nor suffer ye them that are entering to go in." (Matt. 23:33) God tells us not to judge others least we be hypocrites too; (Matt. 7:1, 5).

Many people are just too "busy" to take time out for church. The Lord told a parable about a man who prepared a feast and invited many guests to come. He sent his servant at supper time to bid them "Come", all things were ready. But they all with one consent began to make excuse ... One had to see about his land and asked to be excused; another had married a wife and could not come; another had bought some oxen and had to tend to that. So when the servant told the master about these things, he became angry and sent his servant out into the city streets to bring in the poor, maimed, the halt and the blind to eat with him; and yet there was room, so he sent the servant out into the highways and hedges to compel them to come in so that his HOUSE would be filled. "For I say unto you, That none of those men that were bidden shall taste of my supper." (Luke 14:16-24)

We are indeed a priviledged people to have the freedom to worship like we believe. We should never take our freedones for granted, but thank God for them. He tells us we wise to take instruction and to learn from the counsels. "Where no counsel is, the people fall; but in the multitude there is safety. (Prov. 11:14)" "The way of a fool is right in his own eyes; but he that harkeneth unto counsel is wise. (Prov. 12:15)" "A wise man will hear, and will increase learning, and a man of understanding shall attain unto wise counsels:" (Prov. 1:5) Let us be wise and be careful to heed the words of God. "Because I have called, and ye refused; I have stretched out my hand, and no man regarded; But ye have set at naught all my counsel, and would none of my reproof: I also will laugh at your calamity; I will mock when your fear cometh; When your fear cometh as desolation, and your destruction cometh as a whirlwind, when distress and anguish cemeth upon you. 
