

Grain Harvest Beginning As Area's Fields Start To Dry

Clearing weather last Sunday has improved the agricultural outlook for Cross Plains area.

Instead of the usual lack of moisture, area farmers were worrying about an over abundance of rainfall.

Thunderstorms Friday and Saturday did some damage to small grain crops in this area, but with good weather the harvest will be in full swing in a few days.

Friday evening a tornado was reported sighted about seven miles northeast of Coleman, and it was reportedly tracked to a point southwest of Cross Plains. No report of it touching down or damage has been received here. Damage was done in north Coleman.

High winds in the area west

and south of Cross Plains has damaged the grain crops somewhat by "blowing them over." Glenn Payne reported extremely high haygrazer stalks were also flattened last week end.

Combining of oats had begun Monday in the Rowden area, although an abundance of rain has fallen in that area. One producer said the wheat is ready, too, but we can't get to it yet.

A bumper crop of wheat and oats is expected this year. Grades and yields are expected to be high. Although only a few thousand bushels had been marketed in Cross Plains as of Tuesday, the buyer said the grades are good and yields are above average with some wheat running 40 to 50 bushels. Num-

ber one wheat was bringing \$3.50 per bushel late Tuesday, having jumped about 50 cents in past few days.

Dry weather is needed by peanut producers and cotton farmers too. Both these crops need to be planted soon. One producer said last week that if seeds are not planted soon, peanut farmers will be in trouble.

Most areas reported more than an inch of rain during the past week end. Mrs. Calvin Champion reported 2.20 inches near Cottonwood, and Alton Tatom had 2.30 during the week with 1.70 of that falling Saturday night. R. T. Watson of near Burkett had .90 of an inch both days, Homer Don Parson at Pioneer had 1.70 during the week end. Ron Bagley at Cross Cut gauged 1.20 Saturday, and Pete Fore at Pioneer had 1.20 most of which fell Friday. Edwin Erwin at Sabanno had 1.50 Saturday, and Tommie Harris at Rowden gauged 1.25 Saturday. Total of 1.40 fell in Cross Plains.

Glenn Payne, who lives several miles west of here reported he has received 20 inches of rain this year. Another observer reported receiving over 14 inches of rain since March.

Bill Reed Returned As Methodist Pastor

Rev. Bill Reed has been returned as pastor of the United Methodist Church in Cross Plains and the Methodist Church at Burkett.

Appointments of church pastors in the Brownwood District were made last week at the annual meeting of the Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church in Waco which was held June 3-6.

Rev. Reed came here as pastor originally in November 1977, succeeding the Rev. Aubrey Edwards, who died. Rev. Reed has been re-appointed here for the second time.

Other former local pastors who are in the Central Texas Conference are Rev. Luther Helm who has been appointed at Carbon and Rev. Lloyd Hagemir who is at the First United Methodist Church at Glen Rose.

Public Meeting Set For Tuesday Night

The second of two scheduled public meetings is to be held Tuesday, June 19, by the City of Cross Plains in compliance with regulations concerning application for a grant from the HUD

Small Cities Assistance Program. The session is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. at the City Hall.

Purpose of the meeting is to discuss the application for the

grant and to solicit public participation in its preparation.

It was pointed out that the City of Cross Plains was recently approved to submit a full application for a \$1.5 million grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development in the Small Cities Assistance Program.

Mayor O. B. Edmondson stated before the first public meeting that all interested persons are invited to attend.

Only one local citizen attended the meeting Tuesday, June 5. That was Frank Gravin, and he has begun a campaign to enlist attendance by others within the city for the second session.

City has employed a Dallas engineering firm which has been working on the project about two years.

Among improvements planned once the money becomes available are additional water sources, more sewer line, extended water distribution system, senior citizen center, waste disposal additions, drainage improvements and other undertakings.

It was noted that the grant is to be funded over a three-year period with \$524,000 being made available immediately upon approval of the full application by HUD.

Kilos Grab L.L. Top Spot But Protest Filed On Win

Kilowatts have apparently narrowly assumed the leadership of Cross Plains Little League by posting two victories last

In the second contest Thursday the Kilos blasted the Beadels 26-1 in a four-inning game. Visiting Kilos pushed seven runs across home plate in the first inning. The team added three in the second and fourth innings and 13 in the third. The lone Beadel scored in the first.

Regular season is scheduled to end Tuesday, June 26. Rained out games are to be played at the regular season's end if final standings will be affected.

In Search of Truth

I have read with increased concern the paid ads which have been in the last four issues of the Cross Plains Review. In these ads Mr. T. O. Powell has been publicly condemned for making statements which were judged as "exemplifies the spirit depravity of 'conservative' America" today. Mr. Powell has been the object of the wrath of these articles simply because his convictions were different from the convictions of the author of the articles, Mr. David Holmes. Mr. Holmes seems to have a political ax to grind, and tends to use scripture out of context, religious platitudes, and ambiguous reference to "the law of God, and the Gospel of Jesus Christ" to justify his position. If one believes the Bible one must believe it all not just the portions which seem to prove one's point. One can take scripture out of context to prove anything they want, but it does not mean that it is a valid statement!

No one will argue that our system of government is perfect. Nor will anyone argue that there are not problems in our social system, but our system is one that can be changed by people who have the vision and the courage to be involved in making change. Socialism is not inherently evil, read Acts 2:44-47. It is the human factor which makes the principles of Biblical socialism unworkable. It would not work in a society which was completely Christian. Where does the Bible condemn governments? Jesus did not, Paul didn't, Peter did not, read I Peter 2:13-17, there was not condemnation of the government even though Christians were being fed to the lions of Rome.

Mr. Holmes' understanding of the "law of God and the Gospel" is not in harmony with New Testament Christianity. The "law of God and the Gospel" is not ambiguous, nor is it critical except toward those who covered their sin of self-righteousness in religious legalism, and jargon. What is the "law of God"? "And you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength. The second is this, You shall love your neighbor as yourself. There is no other commandments greater than these." (Mark 12:30-31) The Gospel is specific in its intent and meaning. It is the good news of Jesus Christ nothing more or nothing less, "and it shall be that whosoever calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved" (Acts 2:21). It is positive and affirming, Jesus said, "Woman where are those thine accusers . . .? Neither do I condemn thee: go and sin no more." (John 8:10-11)

Paul, a man who lived in a world of moral decay, religious decline, and political corruption, wrote these words: "If I speak with the tongues of men and angels, but have not love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but have not love, I am nothing. If I give away all I have, and if I deliver my body to be burned, but have not love, I gained nothing. Love is patient and kind; love is not jealous or boastful; it is not arrogant and rude. Love does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrong, but rejoices in the right. Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends. (I Cor. 13:1-8) I would encourage Mr. Holmes to read the New Testament, and read it again until Jesus Christ healed the spirit of self-righteousness which radiates from each of his articles, and to let the Holy Spirit fill his soul with a love of people. If he will do that then perhaps he may be able to guide them to the Savior Jesus Christ, rather than be a stumbling block to someone who needs God's redemptive love.

It is my time to write Pioneer News and as usual, I wish to write some introductory remark. I hope what I write will not be too boring and that in reading it will provoke readers to...

"THINK"

"Think" (to think, that is,) is suffering from non-use among people today. In saying this I restrict the meaning of the word to right thinking, and it does not include the wrong exercise of the mind. Right thinking is based on honesty and an intention of living with, and trying to do something about the conclusions we arrive at.

Truly there is much confusion, fear, unrest and discouragement among all peoples today. Fundamentally, there is only one reason for this and that is the age-old battle between good and evil, that originated when man fell (out of) the Garden of Eden and his efforts to get back to that Eutopian state where life is beautiful and at its best. Before we can reach this state (if one is deluded to think we can) greed, lust for power, dishonesty, selfishness, must be ruled out of our lives and out of the lives of those who make our laws. Briefly, my theme for today is to set our own houses in order and be willing to take the rap.

Most of the following paragraphs are quotes from a church paper and one I am glad to read; not that it reveals any solution to our problems but that it is a revelation of some of the evils that are labeled "good" by many people. It does provoke thought. "Totalitarian Left" embraces the gamut of advocacy of unlimited government power, Nazism to Communism.

"The 4-volume 2,500 page Biographical Dictionary of the Left 1973, by Francis X. Gannon Ph.D., Georgetown Univ. lists Leftists and Pro-Communist activities of some 200 organizations and 550 individuals including churchmen Reinhold Niebuhr, Fathers Daniel and Phillip Berrigan, The Reverend Jesse Jackson, Martin Luther King, Jr., and Harry W. Ward, a co-founder in 1909 of what became the National Council of Churches.

"The real father of Communism was Adam Weishaupt, professor of Canon Law at Bavaria, Germany, who founded his secret Order of the Illuminati May 1, 1776—the date Reds celebrate: Goal, Illuminist Elite World tyranny. Methods, wipe out all competing loyalties, religion, family, patriotism, moral principles, and cultural heritage, capture the minds of the rich, powerful and intellectual, control public thought by controlling all public media.

In 1978, publication of two works—exposed the Illuminati, in France in the Abbe Barrouel's 4-volume tome, in England in 'Proof of a Conspiracy,' by professor John Robison (304 pages) with many of Weishaupt's letters. Top-level and radical Marxist leaders have demonstrably conceived and directed the push for Social Security (1933-35), the UN (1944-45), UNESCO and UNICEF; the graduated income tax and Federal Reserve (1913) both Marxist planks; for ERA, IWY, IYC, (1979), AIM, American Agricultural Movement (1976); sex education, 'mental health' environmentalism, gun control; fedgov control of education, land use, and medicine; forced busing, and so much more.

These Red causes have been greatly aided by dupes who can't see the Red connection, and our churches have cooperated to a tragic extent. Of the 95 scholars who brought forth the Revised Standard Bible, 30 had a total of at least 95 pro-Communist affiliations (Congressional Record, March 3, 1960, page 3981) and/or records of pro-

communist support. Again, the Bible warns of false prophets. End of quote. Letter written by J. A. James, Jr., Bastrop, La.

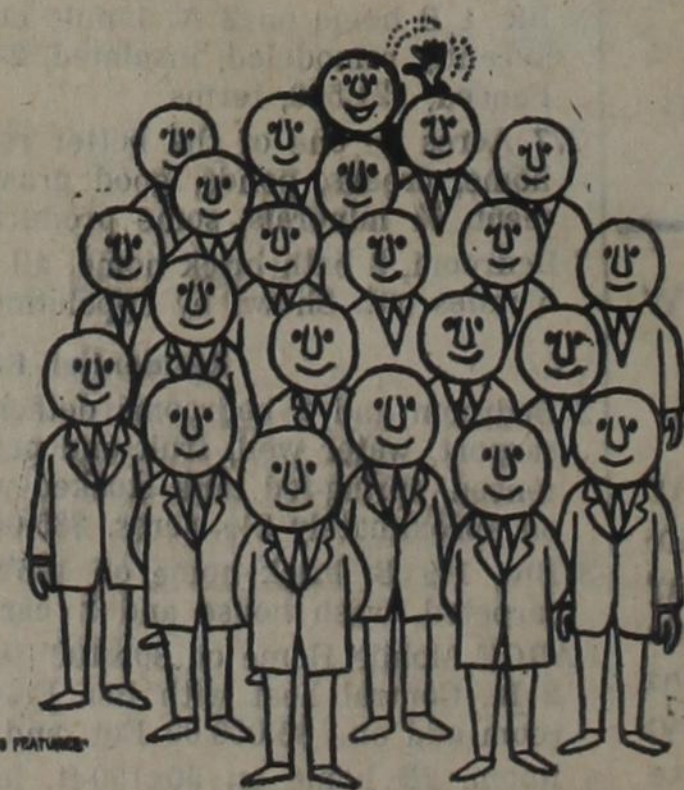

5 Times For Action With Social Security

There are five times when a person should get in touch with a social security office, Glyn Hammons, social security district manager in Abilene, said recently.

Knowing the five times for action is too important to take for granted. It can mean greater security for a worker and his or her family.

The five times are:

Before a person gets his or her first job—to apply for a social security number. A person should allow four to six weeks to get a card.

After a death in the family—to see if survivors' benefits or a lump sum death payment are payable.

When somebody in a family is disabled—to learn if disability benefits are payable.

When a person reaches retirement age—65 for full rate cash benefits or as early as 62 for reduced payments. A person should come in two or three months before 65 to arrange Medicare protection even though he or she is not retiring.

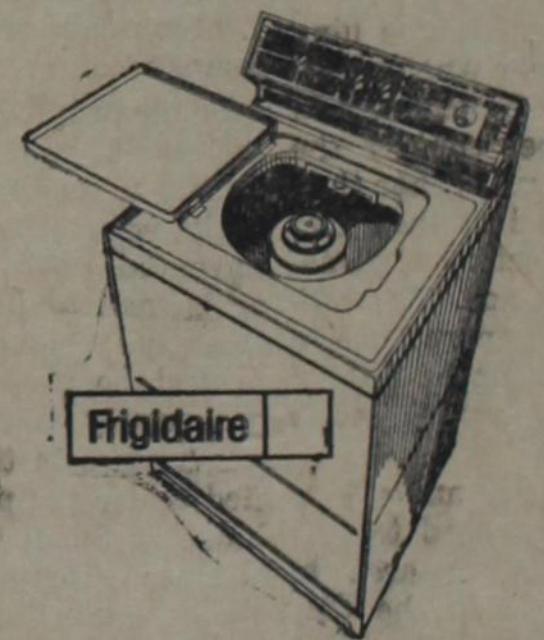

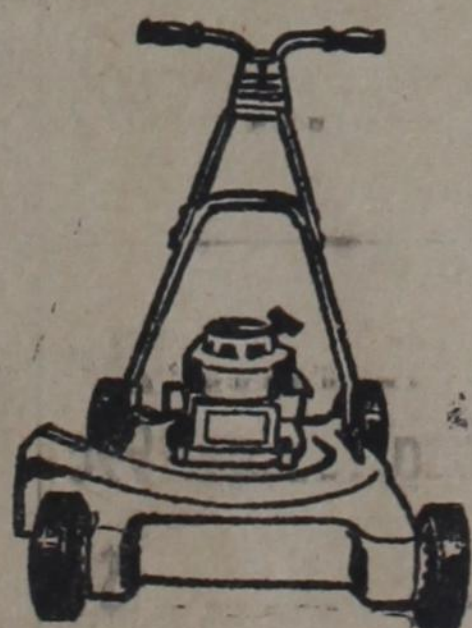

Sheep, Goat Industry Losing To Predators

Predators were responsible for a much higher percentage of sheep and goat losses in 1978 than in 1967. So says a recent survey conducted by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The survey, initially requested by the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association, showed that predators caused 58 per cent of all sheep and lamb losses in 1978 compared to 25 per cent in 1967. Seventy-two per cent of all goats and kid deaths in 1978 were attributed to predators, compared to 45 per cent in 1967.

Coyotes were the worst offenders, taking 24 per cent of all sheep and goats lost. Eagles, contrary to popular opinion, were next, accounting for 20 per cent of all goats and kids and 14 per cent of all sheep and lambs lost. Bobcats took 19 per cent of goats lost and 15 per cent of sheep lost. Red fox and dogs picked off a few percentage points in both categories.

Overall, predators cost Texas producers an estimated \$13 million in losses in 1978, roughly 62 per cent of all such losses. This is only a partial estimate, however, because it fails to take into account the losses on wool and mohair, a substantial portion of total sheep production income and by far the most important source of income to Angora goat producers. Because of the buyer-dominated market system encountered in livestock production, stockmen are unable to pass these losses on to consumers.

More than two-thirds of the producers polled reported employing some form of predator control. Trapping was the most common method and the one considered most effective. The M-44 cyanide ejector was used by only 14 per cent of respondents and was reportedly considered least effective. Producers as a whole generally stated that the government ban on predicide 1080 in the early 1970's cost them their most effective control tool.

The 1980 ban also corresponds with the survey's overall finding that predation since that time has been responsible for a greater percentage of losses than prior to that time.

The survey was mailed to 1476 producers and received 81 per cent response. Of the less than 300 producers who failed to respond, only 29 actually refused to answer the survey questions when contacted by telephone. The remainder could not be reached by phone, suggesting primarily incorrect address and telephone information.

Citizens! To Arms!

LET US CONFRONT A SEA OF TROUBLES AND SO END THEM!

It has been said that the great difference between American and English literature is the extensive use of allusion in the English and the lack of it in the American. Everyone will recognize the implied reference to the French national anthem and to Shakespeare.

The Cross Plains Review, dated June 6, 1979 carried a Public Meeting Notice that in the penultimate reference to Edmondson read S/O. B. Edmondson. Despite my professional differences with the Mayor, based upon my opinion that Texas laws regarding garbage, litter, uncovered and uncovered garbage cans and lots covered with five years of weeds should be cleaned up and his opinion that the city cannot afford such amenities; I ask that in the future the S/ be spelled out to avoid misunderstanding.

The Public Meeting in the Notice is referred to as the Second Meeting. I was present at the First. It was a farce. I was the only member of the Public present and I am certain the Citizens of Cross Plains do not want to be represented by a D --- Yankee nor should they be. I understood this application has been in preparation for from two to three years. I could prepare the application as it stands in ten days. Yet every question I asked regarding it was received as if I were questioning the legitimacy of the City Fathers. The Criteria referred to in the application were not available. My recollection is that the number of homes requiring repair was given as three. When I said I could recall four on Avenue F South of the Shamrock Station I was told the "three" was only an estimate.

As a result of my approaching senility I remember when an estimated cost of a project had to be within five per cent of the actual cost. If it ran higher than five per cent or less than five per cent a satisfactory explanation had to be made. The estimate had to be prepared one to two years in advance. But of course wages and material costs were constant.

Much the largest amount of the grant is to be used to provide sewerage to an area in which at least one of the City Fathers lives. I was told that this area now has only septic tanks. Only septic tanks! Suippes Gunnersy Range, the only Bombing Range available to all of the NATO where the Atomic Bomb could be dropped after Wheelus in Libya was closed to us, had only a septic tank. So did Lawrence Inn, one of the most prestigious country Inns in America. Both, of course, were correctly designed and constructed. I am certain of this as both were designed by me and constructed under my direct supervision. I am sure none of the Commanding Generals, Field Marshalls, Members of the Nobility nor either of the two members of the British Royalty who used the Suippes Septic Tank and Field gave a Contingent that it was not a Sewerage unit.

My understanding is that housing repair will be limited to those having an income of not more than seventy-two hundred dollars a year. I guess there are several hundred who fall into that group. Every one of them should come to the June 19th Meeting. This may be your last chance to be heard.

There was an item in the ap-

plication of some thousands of dollars for Code enforcement. I pointed out that Cross Plains has no laws, no plumbing code, no electrical code, no building code, no zoning regulations; nothing that would call for "Code Enforcement . . . The customary contract specification phrase: Materials incorporated in the work and provided by the Contractor and the work done by the Contractor shall be in full and complete conformance with all applicable Codes and Regulations; will be worthless as there are no applicable Codes nor Regulations.

There are two very worthwhile projects that would correct very dangerous conditions and protect our qualified residents against fire and death.

One is the correction of the thousands of electrical deficiencies in Cross Plains. Prior to 1968 I thought France had the worst electrical work in the World. France has no Electrical Code and no Licensing of Electricians. The result is that anyone can do any electrical work in any way he wishes using any materials in any manner he wishes. In the Spring of 1968 I found the same conditions exist in Cross Plains. More people are killed in France as they use 220 volts rather than our 120 v. The immediate work to be done would be the installation of Service Switches "at the nearest point to the Service Entrance, inside or outside the building." Also the provision of a proper service and equipment ground. The Service Switch provides means of quickly and completely disconnecting the building wiring from the Service Drop. The service and equipment ground protects persons from electrocution and the building against fire.

Some people may remember the case several years ago when during a very cold spell an elderly woman huddled over an unvented, open flame gas heater burned to death. It is most strongly recommended that a project be prepared to provide gas supply and venting of all gas heaters in the homes qualified under the provisions of the FY 1979 Small Cities Grant Assistance Program. To assist in the determination of such qualification a knowledgeable and professional person should prepare a guidance for the Residents of Cross Plains.

It should be understood that the beneficiaries of the reference Program need not be Citizens nor registered as Voters.

A qualified reporter should be present at the June 19 meeting and at all other public meetings in the City of Cross Plains to keep a complete and correct report of the meeting. This was not the case at the first meeting.

HUD is being requested to send an observer to the June 19th meeting.

Discussion is suggested at that meeting of providing sidewalks, specifically in areas where streets are not paved.

I am not nor shall I in the future be a candidate for any public office. After all, I saw what happened to Mr. Rhoades. If nominated I shall not run, if elected I shall not serve.
