Callahan County Water Supply Corporation will meet at 7:30 p.m. Monday, April 9, in the Commissioners Court Room in the courthouse at Baird.

Laura Brown stated that all persons interested in having a rural water supply district formed and a pipeline to their property are urged to attend.

It was explained that before this project can go ahead, there must be sufficient interest shown. A deposit of \$200 per meter and membership must be paid, and number of meters subscribed will determine if the project is feasible. Deadline for subscribing is May 14. It was noted that after that date cost of membership will increase significantly.

Mrs. Brown stated, "At this time we have 46 members, most of them in the Clyde area. If we are to obtain water in the rest of the county, we must work together and sign up now," she continued.

The Cross Plains Review is 70 years old with this publication, and, although many things have changed in that span of time, the publisher looks forward to the future with anticipation. Review began publication in April 1909.

As with all businesses in this inflationary period, prices must go up. Display advertising rates have been advanced 10 cents per column inch effective this issue. The 10 cent rise was for local and regional ads. National rates will be advanced 14 cents to take effect in 60 days. Classified advertising rates will temporarily remain at 7 cents per word for one week, and 5 cents per word for second week. Minimum charge is \$1.50. Resolutions and legal advertising also are charged at classified rates.

Subscriptions will remain at the current levels for the present.

Publisher regrets to increase advertising rates, but in order to keep abreast of inflation trends, it is necessary.

Ray Purvis is running unopposed for the one-year unexpired term. He was appointed to that post several months ago when duly elected councilman James Le May moved from the city.

Candidates asking one of two places on the school board in

order that names will appear on the ballot are Charles H. Payne, Benny N. Callaway, Jim Fleming, Rolan Jones and Joe E. Hanke, Jr. Asking to be re-elected are Payne and Hanke. Payne has served one year as a trustee, having won a one-year unexpired term in 1978. Hanke, presently school board president, has served three years, one full term, and is the senior member of the board in terms of years served.

Callaway, Fleming and Jones are seeking first terms on the directorate.

The Review learned Monday of a write-in campaign boosting Knox Waggoner of Cottonwood for a school trustee post.

Judge for the city election will be Mrs. W. F. (Katie) Kilgore, and judge for the school balloting will be Alton E. Hornsby.

Both judges urged that voters have certificates handy to facilitate voting procedures next Saturday.

Turnout is expected to be moderate to heavy in both elections. Six absentee votes had been cast in the city election, and 11 persons cast absentee ballots in the school balloting.

It was learned here Tuesday morning that the office of the Texas Secretary of State was seeking qualified persons here to serve as poll watchers in the school election. School board member Roberta Conlee had previously indicated that she would request poll watchers be assigned to the voting.

Holdover members of the Cross Plains City Council are Mayor O. B. Edmondson and Alderman W. G. (Wimpy) McCoy. Other school board members are Mrs. Conlee, Randy Foster, John D. Montgomery, Benny Glover and Reggy Stover.

Trustees are scheduled to meet Monday, April 9, at 7 p.m. to canvass election returns and re-organize the board. Board of Equalization members will also be sworn into office at that time. Callahan County attorney Don Wilson will be on hand to administer the oath of office.

Unless a special meeting is called, the city council will next meet on Tuesday, April 17. Another regular meeting was slated for April 3, at which time other plans could be made.

Federal Crop Insurance Available In This Area

Peanut producers in the southeast portion, Cross Plains area, can now get crop coverage through the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

The "All Risk Crop Insurance" protection became available for some 87 producers in this section of Callahan County recently when the F.C.I.C. program was extended to include the southeastern portion of Callahan. It was added to Eastland County program.

A representative of the F.C.I.C. is at the Citizens State Bank in Cross Plains daily through Wednesday of next week, April 11, to take applications and explain how the program works. A representative will also be at the First State Bank in Rising Star through April 13 for the same purpose.

Emory Holder, F.C.I.C. dis-

trict director, explained that Federal Crop Insurance Corporation is an agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. It provides protection against such disasters as wind, hail, insects, freeze, disease, excessive moisture and drought from the time the crop is planted till the peanuts are removed from the field.

"Since Federal Crop Insurance establishes a cash value on the crop when it is seeded, a producer is assured an amount of income no matter what nature does," Holder said.

Because crop investment is protected, F.C.I.C. policy can also be used as collateral when credit needs arise. Holder stated the premium is paid after the harvest of peanuts.

Federal Crop Insurance has been available on peanuts in Eastland, Comanche, Brown, Hood and Erath Counties for several years according to Holder.

Adult Homemakers To Meet On April 11

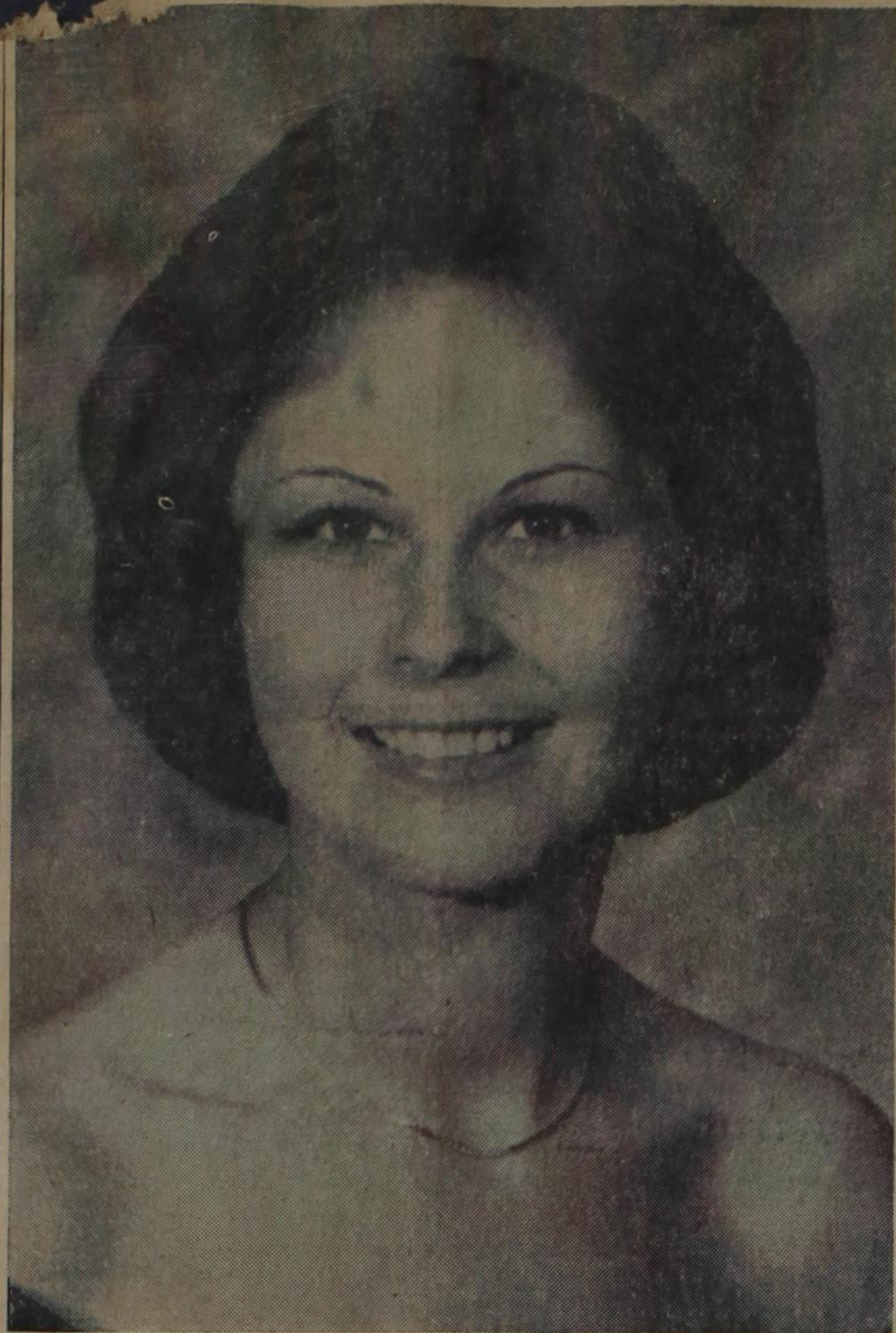
Cross Plains Homemaker
