In the varsity contest Ranger gradually pulled away from the Cross Plains quintet, leading 16-9 at halftime. The visitors stretched the advantage to 28-14 after three stanzas, then buried the Buffettes under a 21-point barrage in the last quarter for the final 49-21 verdict.

Bridgette Allen again led local scoring with 9 markers, and Paula Allen was runner-up with 5. Miss Higginbottom added 4. Glynn Robinson 4 and Dana Bains 1. Lola Battle paced Ranger scoring with 22 points.

Varsity and junior varsity Buffalo basketball teams at Cross Plains High School broke even in outings against District 10-A opponents last week.

Tuesday of last week at Bangs the Dragon junior varsity nipped interning Buffs 36-33, and Dragons claimed a 43-36 win over the Herd.

Friday on home hardwood Bison team claimed two victories, 68-51 in the JV contest and 48-40 in the varsity battle.

A bad fourth quarter allowed Bangs JV to take the 36-33 win Tuesday of last week. Buffs were out-scored 12-7 in last canto after entering the period down by two, 26-24. Cross Plains had trailed by six, 18-12 before gaining the upper hand briefly in the third. Randy Huffman led Cross Plains tallying with 15 points.

In the varsity tilt it was also the fourth quarter that did the Thundering Herd in. Bangs out-scored Cross Plains by two points in each of the first two quarters, and Bisons countered that with a 14-12 edge in the third stanza. Dragons put the game away with an 11-6 margin in the fourth quarter.

Danny Lewis was the leading scorer with 22 points. Duane Hutchins tallied 10 for the Herd and Gary Robinson got 1 and Tan Flippin 1. McCorkle and Culver each counted 9 for Bangs.

A hot Bison junior varsity squad sizzled the nets for 38 points in the first half and building a 20-point lead over visiting Ranger last Friday. Cooling only slightly Cross Plains coasted to a 68-51 triumph. Huffman was again the local top scorer with 26 points. Dennis Koenig added 16, and Richard Clark contributed 10.

Varsity Bisons squad evened its 10-A record at 2-2 with a 48-40 win over visiting Ranger Bulldogs. Herd zipped to a 12-6 first quarter advantage, but had that sliced to 20-18 by halftime. In the third quarter Bisons gained five points, 17-12, to lead 37-30 and picked up a single point in the last canto for the eight-point win.
