Bulldogs Scorless By Buckaroos 20-0

CLYDE--Clyde High School Bulldogs lost a football game to the Breckenridge Buckaroos 20-0 last Friday night. The Bucks dominated the contest with 18 first downs and 325 yards of offense, holding Clyde to 6 first downs and 104 yards.

Breckenridge pushed their first T.D. across with one minute left in the half to take a 7-0 lead.

The Bulldogs threatened early in the second quarter when they dropped a touchdown pass and in the third quarter when they drove to the 13 yard line.

Quarterback Johnny Arms completed 5 of 10 passes for 62 yards with no interceptions. Marty Clifford and Billy Dugan made the receptions. Jimmy May, Mark Hogan, and Rick Newman recovered fumbles for the Bulldogs while Russell Bland, Wes Bennett and Chuck Swofford led tackling respectively. The Bulldogs fought hard but were outclassed by the

fired-up Buckaroos. Chuck Swofford blocked a Buck field goal attempt early in the second quarter and Jackie Brown blocked an extra point attempt.

The Bulldogs have an open date this coming weekend and have two weeks to improve their offense and defense to ready for battle on November 1st with undefeated state fourth-ranked Comanche at Clyde.

If Comanche can stop Breckenridge at Comanche this Friday, it will give Clyde one more shot at the District 9AA title. A win over Comanche here could insure a district tie and the right to represent in bi-district. Clyde has won 13 of their last 15 home games and are exceedingly tough at Bulldog Stadium.

The Breckenridge loss was Clyde's first shut-out in 30 games, dating back to Eastland in 1971.

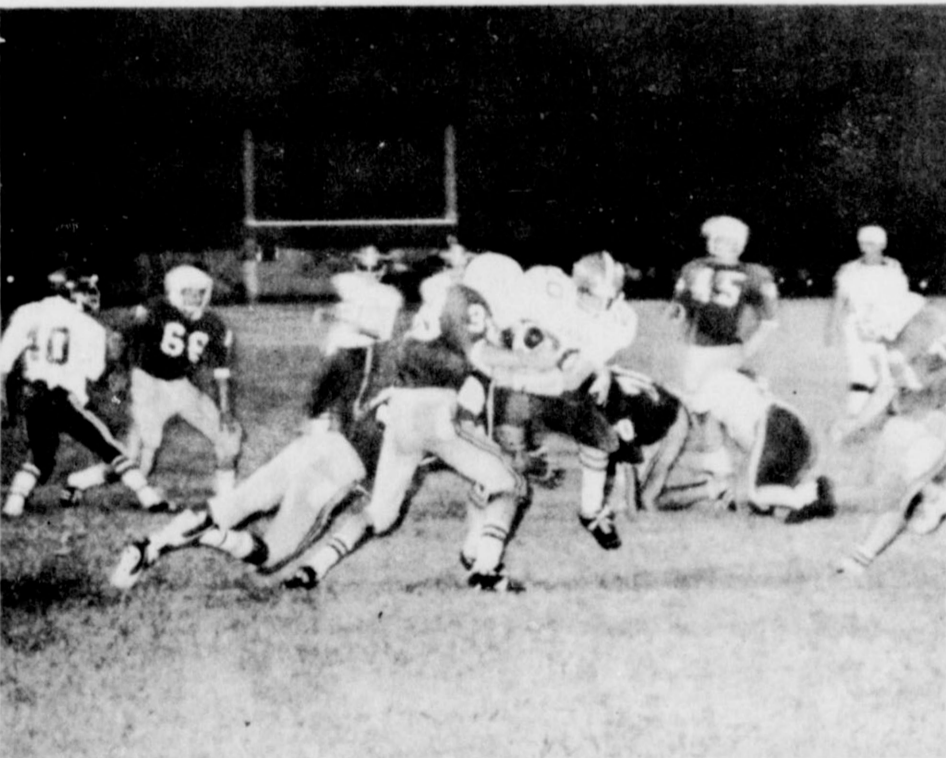

Mrs. Bob Couch Host Tuesday Tillers

Mrs. Bobby Carter, student flower show judge, gave the program on "Hand in Hand With Nature". Mrs. Carter has become well known for her methods of organic gardening and proves that it can be done in her own yard and green houses. Mrs. Carter suggested that "We should control not eliminate the insects in our yard, and gardens. Most of the DDT used in the 1940's is still in the environment. When we use the dangerous sprays one year, the next year the insects will be resistant to that spray, and this cycle will continue until it will not kill the insects." We have good insects and bad insects, even the much hated grub worms help to bring the nutrients of the soil to the surface and help to make the soil friable. Mrs. Carter listed the good bugs in our area as: the Twelve Spotted Lady Bug, Praying Mantis, Shield Bug, Lace Wing Larva, Ichneumon Fly. The bad bugs as: Japanese Beetle, control these by picking them off by hand and dropping them into a can of kerosene; Snails, control these with lids of beer placed in the flower beds, this attracts the snails and they drink until they become inebriated, fall to the bottom and drown; Cut Worms can be controlled by putting a cardboard collar around young plants, this will keep the worm from wrapping its body around the plant and cutting it off even with the ground; Cabbage Looper can be controlled with a small shake of table salt or dampen the cabbage with water then dust with flour, this keeps the insect from burrowing into the soil and the hot sun will kill them; Red Spider can be controlled by spraying with Crystal Brand dishwashing detergent before the leaf buds form in the spring. All detergents have an oily base, and this will provide a light oil spray. Put pest in their place, without poisoning us out of the world.

Mrs. Gaston Bell, president made the motion that the group would help with the Clyde United Fund, the motion carried. The By-laws were amended to allow more than 25 members into the club, since the club was at maximum membership. A meeting place to accommodate the growing needs of the Garden Club is being sought. It is the desire of the club to meet the needs of the new people moving into our community, not to shut them out. Everyone profits from good gardening habits, helping to keep our community free of litter, and our roadsides beautiful.

The litter barrel that is on the south end of the Edessa Kuykendall Garden on Hwy. 604 and Third Streets needs to be used for the beverage cans that are being tossed on the grounds. The barrel is placed so that you have easy access to drive right up and "Toss in".

The Bazaar will be Nov. 16, at West Texas Utilities. Plan your day so that you may have a chance at the baked goods, crafts and gift items.

The next program will be in the home of Mrs. Fred Newman Nov. 19. Mrs. Herb Roberts, life flower show judge, from Abilene, will bring the program on "Rocks in Our Landscape". Be sure to clean all dropped foliage under the rose bushes, so that you will not harbor black spot spores to contaminate next year's leaves.
