Arrest Made Tuesday For Monday Burglary

Deputy Sheriff Ed Duncan of Baird reported Tuesday that Sheriff Bill W. Skinner and Cross Plains Deputy Sheriff Frank Thumsuden were in Brownwood that day where they arrested two suspects in connection with the burglary of the L. A. Richardson house about three miles north of here.

Although a complete list of items taken from the home located just off the Cottonwood highway, Farm Road 880, was not immediately available, \$300 in silver coins and some guns were taken. It was believed that the burglary occurred between 2 and 6 p.m. Monday.

Deputy Duncan stated that he understood that most of the stolen articles were recovered.

Expect Light Turnout For Demo Primary Saturday

With only one countywide contest, a lighter than normal turnout is expected in the Democratic Primary Election to be held Saturday.

The only contest office concerning all of Callahan County is that of Sheriff. One-term incumbent Bill W. Skinner of Baird is facing challenger Adrian Huddleston of Clyde.

Actually there is only one other contested race confined to the bounds of Callahan County. That is in Commissioner's Precinct 2, Clyde, where Eugene Kitchens is trying to win the commissioner's seat now occupied by M. D. Ellis.

There are seven other races for statewide or regional posts in question Saturday. They are for Railroad Commissioner or judgeships of various courts. Those races usually fail to stir much voter emotion.

There is a non-binding presidential preference referendum which lists four choices: Jimmy Carter, Edward M. Kennedy, Jerry Brown and Uncommitted. Brown has withdrawn since the ballot was compiled.

Polls across Texas and in Callahan County will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Voting in Cross Plains will be held at the Cross Plains City Hall.

Other voting precincts will be held at the following sites: Baird Precinct 1, Community Center; Clyde Precinct 2, Lions Club Building; Putnam Precinct 4, Community Center; Eula Precinct 5, Eula School; Denton Valley Precinct 6, Denton Baptist Church; Oplin Precinct 7, Community Center, and Clyde Precinct 8, Clyde High School Cafeteria.

Two seats on the Texas Railroad Commission are up for grabs. Buddy Temple is trying to unseat John Poerner for full term, and appointee James E. (Jim) Nugent is trying to stay on the council while Jim Hightower is attempting to gain the seat for the unexpired term.

Two Associate Justice places on Supreme Court are contested while two others, Places 3 and 4, are not. Asking the bench for Place 1 are Wayne Scott, John C. Phillips and James P. (Jim) Wallace. Race for Place 2 pits Sears McGee and Lawrence E. Bergman.

Marvin O. Teague and Leon Douglas are vying for Court of Criminal Appeals Judge Place 1. Asking judge's post on same court from Place 2 are W. T. Phillips, John Humphreys and Mike McCormick. Place 3 in that court is being sought by Edith Roberts, Tom Davis and Walter Boyd.

Heading the long list of uncontested offices is that of U. S. Representative held by Charles W. Stenholm.

Lynn Nabers of Brownwood is also running without opposition for the State Representative post of the 55th District.

Local Baptist Evangelistic Team Serves In France

Editor's Note: Following is an article from the World Evangelism Foundation in Dallas describing the duties faced by the evangelistic team from Cross Plains First Baptist Church which went to France April 16. It was intended for the issue of April 23, but arrived here too late for that paper.

An evangelistic team from First Baptist Church, Cross Plains, Texas, left the states April 16th, in response to an invitation from the French Baptist Union in France. The invitation was issued through World Evangelism Foundation of Dallas which supervised the preparation of the teams.

Dr. Toby Irwin of Cross Plains will be leading the team. He will be assisted by team members Janelle and infant daughter, Joni Irwin, and Jerry and Sharon Lewis, all of Cross Plains. Their team will be serving in the ministry of the Grenoble Baptist Church and will be a part of 7 other partnership teams participating in this crusade.

Rev. Jerry B. Byrd, a staff member of WEF, is Team Coordinator.

The team members are composed of lay people and their pastors who pay their own expenses and give two weeks of their time to this effort purely because they love the Lord and want to share His message with the people of other lands.

Activities of the team members will include worship services, Bible studies, concerts and fellowships. Schools, hospitals, nursing homes, prisons and military installations will be visited by members of the team. They will also make home visits, share their testimony and extend invitations to attend church.

Dr. W. H. Jackson, Jr., President of WEF, said: "One thing we have learned in these partnership endeavors is that participants from the state receive more than they can possibly give." Jackson added: "We believe this church-to-church and people-to-people approach is in keeping with the New Testament."

The teams will return to the states on April 30th.

Thunder Showers Dump .60 Inch Rain In City

Spring thundershowers roamed parts of this section of Texas last Thursday, yielding small amounts of life-giving moisture to some parts while leaving others bone dry.

The need for moisture is rapidly approaching the critical stage for small grain crops in some sections. In most of this portion of the state water in earthen stock tanks is getting low, dangerously so reports indicate in some communities, and

in Rowden sector wells are reported to be weakening.

Cross Plains was one of the lucky sectors last Thursday when showers dumped .60 of an inch of rain here. Early morning shower yielded .10 and another .50 fell that afternoon. The latter was accompanied by light, small hail for a time.

The Sabanno community measured .80 of an inch of rain at the J. R. Rector place.

Reports of no rain were received in Rowden from N. V. Gibbs and from Cottonwood from the Blanton Childers place. Les Byrd at Cross Cut said that a very light sprinkle fell there along with a "little bit of hail."

Roy Tatom in the Atwell locality reported only a trace of moisture. "There was not enough to measure," he said.

The Pioneer community received a token rain with .20 of an inch falling at the Pioneer Co-Op.

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Local Library Active In Young Reader Program

The Cross Plains Public Library is among nearly 400 libraries throughout Texas participating this year in the Texas Reading Club. The program is sponsored by the Texas State Library and participating libraries.

Young readers will take part in activities built around "Sports Splash," the theme selected for 1980. The nearly universal interest in sports that range from solitary activities like jogging to team sports like baseball and football gives them appeal for most young readers. And libraries have books about sports that range from books on how to play the games through biographies of famous players to novels and stories with sports themes.

Most important of all, young Texans who participate will sample the fun of recreational reading. Today's public libraries include a wide range of books and other printed materials for young readers. Summertime is vacation time, but skills honed by vacation time reading will be sharp for the year ahead.

"One of the most serious

problems we face today is the deterioration of reading ability among young people," said Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, director of the Texas State Library. "We know, however, that people of all ages who develop the habit of reading for recreation become good readers. Reading is recreational activity with both immediate and long-term benefits."

In recent years school libraries and reading resource centers have undergone major improvements. As a result many youngsters have developed sophisticated skills in using libraries. The Reading Club encourages them to use these skills and the library materials they find for recreational purposes.

Special activities that encourage regular visits to the library have been planned by James L. and Carol H. Thomas of Denton. He teaches in the North Texas State University School of Library and Information Sciences, and she recently completed a doctorate in special education at the University of Virginia. They are the parents of two sons.

Census Folk Continue House Calls Locally

Census District Manager, Billy Yarbrough of Abilene, reports good progress in this area of the follow-up phase of the 1980 Census of Population and Housing. Census takers are following up on missing census questionnaires by visiting addresses from which householders have not yet mailed theirs back, as well as telephoning most households from which questionnaires were returned inadequately filled out.

The manager asks householders to welcome these census takers when they call and to give them full cooperation in supplying the required census information. But you should always ask to see their official credential before admitting them to your home. It is a red, white, and blue ID card bearing the U. S. Department of Commerce seal.

Yarbrough also stressed that, because the count of the nation's population was to be for one day, April 1, everyone who was in the household on that day should be listed on the questionnaire, but not anyone who has moved in since.

"The information given the Census Bureau cannot be used to identify anyone in any way at all," the manager said. "Facts about individuals are lumped together to arrive at statistical totals, averages, and percentages, figures in which no one can be identified. Information about a person cannot be given to any other agency of government, or to a public or private organization of any kind, or to any other individual."

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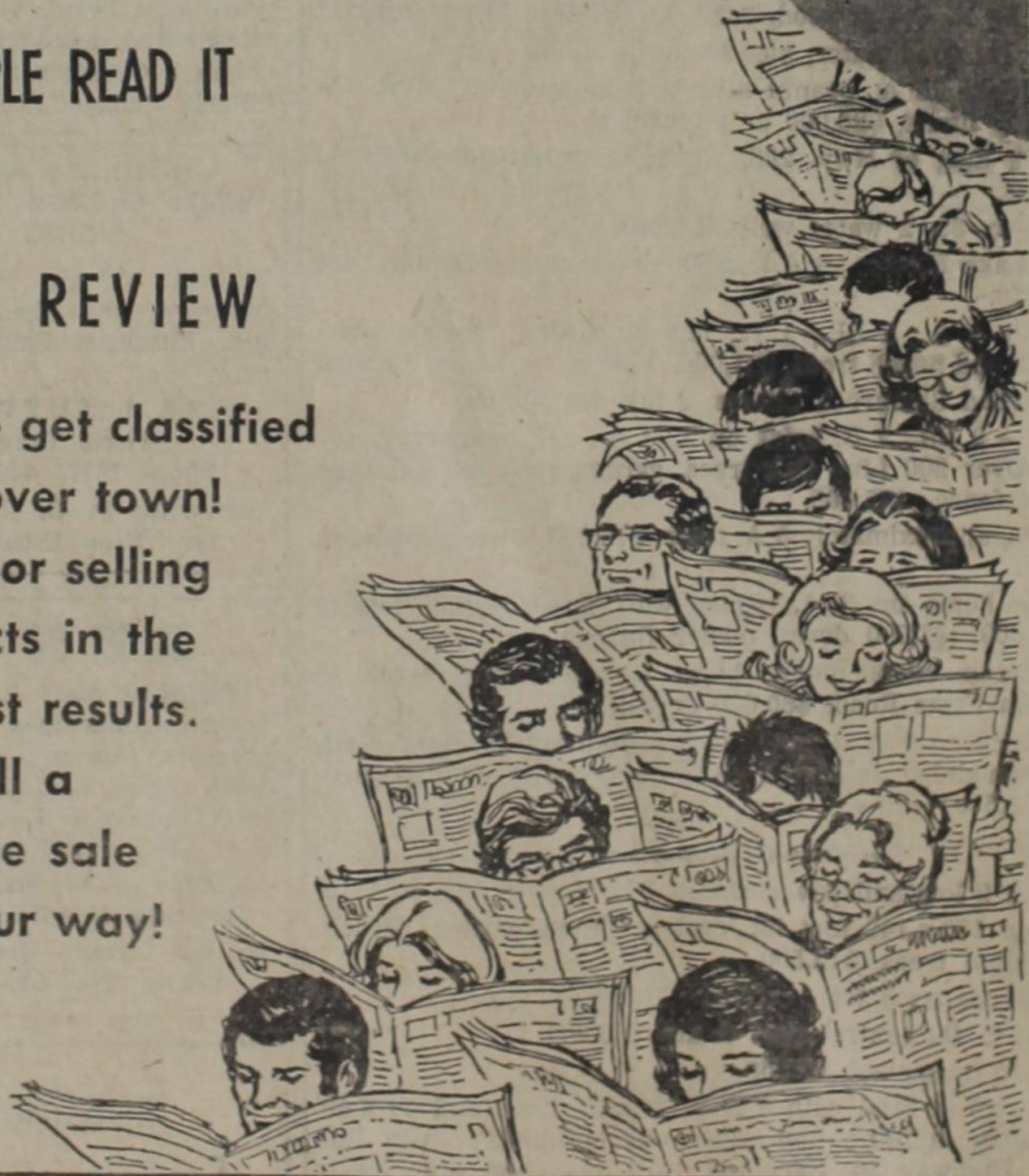

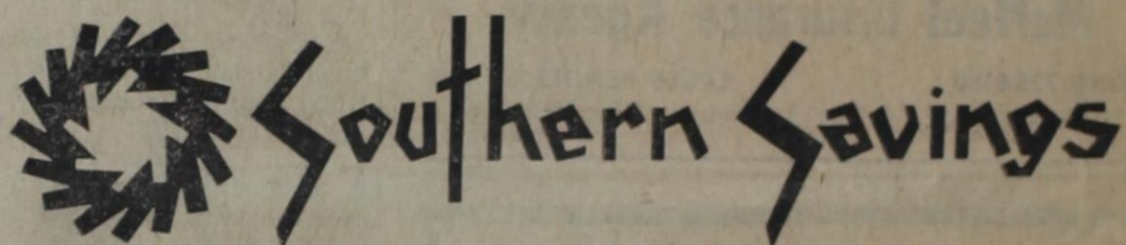
