# Annual 3-Day Basketball Meet Set For Week End

Cross Plains High School's annual invitational basketball tournament is scheduled at Buffalo Gymnasium Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Sixteen teams, eight male and eight feminine units will be battling in the three-day affair.

Each team in the meet will play three games, and there will be two sessions daily. Eight games will be played each of the three days, divided into morning and afternoon sessions.

Admission to both sessions Thursday and Friday and morning session Saturday will be \$1 for adults and 50 cents for students. The afternoon or second session Saturday admission charged will be \$1.50 for adults and \$1 for students.

Goldthwaite girls and Jim Ned boys did not choose to return to defend championships this year. There are no clear cut favorites in either bracket.

Vying for championships in both brackets will be teams from Brooksmith, Cisco, Rising Star, Santa Anna, Sidney and host Cross Plains. Abilene Junior Varsity and Bangs fills the male division, and Coleman girls and Brownwood Junior Varsity complete the feminine bracket.

The Athletic Booster Club has advised that they will again be selling hamburgers at the night sessions of the tourney, and invite fans to come, eat supper at the tournament. The burgers may also be purchased for taking home, it was added.

Morning sessions begin at 9 o'clock. Thursday's pairings match Rising Star and Coleman girls in first game and Brooksmith and Brownwood JV at

noon. At 10:30 a.m. Rising Star boys take on Abilene JV, and Brooksmith and Bangs tangle at 1:30 p.m.

Thursday afternoon session begins at 3 p.m. with Santa Anna and Cisco girls followed at 4:30 with male contingents from the two schools. Cross Plains Buffettes test Sidney girls at 6 p.m., and Buffaloes and Sidney boys collide at 7:30 p.m.

Other playoff contests will follow the same schedule on Friday.

First two games Saturday morning will decide seventh place, followed by third place games at noon and 1:30 p.m. Girls consolidation game will

begin at 3 p.m. followed at 4:30 by the boys' game. Girls championship squabble will begin at 6 p.m. and boys crown contest starts at 7:30 p.m.

Host Cisco clipped the varsity Cross Plains Buffaloes 51-49 in the basketball season opener Tuesday night of last week.

The Buff Junior Varsity team also was defeated, falling 50-21.

Cross Plains varsity dropped six points behind during the initial quarter, 14-8, but cut that to four, 29-25 at halftime. The Lobos gained a point, 4-36, in the third canto, but a Bison rally sliced the deficit to 5-49 at the final buzzer.

Danny Lewis paced all scorers, bucketing 20 points for the Herd. Gary Robinson counted 11, and Duane Hutchins, Keith Lawrence and Tan Flippin had 6 each. Speegle had 19 for Cisco and Bacon added 12.

Coach Doyle Grubaugh said that the Bisons played real well, considering the limited number of practice sessions.

Cisco's JV coasted to victory over the Bisons on the strength of a 30-5 margin at halftime. Buffs rallied in the second half tallying 16 points, and holding Cisco to 20, two-thirds of first half total.

Randy Huffman led local scoring with 15 points. Dennis Koenig had 5 and Kirby Stephens 1. Owens and Garcia paced Cisco with 18 and 16 points respectively.

## Texas Tech Professorship Honors Local Lady's Son

Editor's Note: Following is an article recently published concerning a professorship being established at Texas Tech University in the name of Ray Butler of Alice. He is the son of Mrs. Carl (Hazel) Marsh of Cross Plains and a native of Rising Star.

A challenge grant of \$50,000 has been made to initiate a \$750,000 endowment establishing the Ray Butler Professorship in the Texas Tech University College of Engineering.

The professorship is to be within the Department of Petroleum Engineering, according to the donor, H. B. Harkins of Harkins & Co., driller, and producer of oil and gas. It honors Ray Butler, president of Harkins, who was named "Distinguished Engineer" by the college in 1975.

In providing the grant Harkins said he would add to the fund over the next five years, until his contributions reach a total of \$75,000 to be matched by other funds raised by the university.

"This professorship has been selected," Harkins said, "because of the course of instruction and the manner of teaching in Texas Tech's Department of Petroleum Engineering is in accord with principles endorsed by Harkins & Company."

Dean John R. Bradford said that funds will be invested and that the professorship will be activated in the early 1980s. He said that the college will be

The Ray Butler Professor will have responsibilities in both undergraduate and graduate teaching as well as in public service and research.

"We are particularly pleased," Bradford said, "that Mr. Harkins chose to name the professorship for one of Texas Tech's finest engineering graduates. The name should serve as a challenge to future students."

Both Ray Butler and his twin brother, Roy, have been named Distinguished Engineers by the college. Both were graduated with degrees in petroleum engineering in 1949.

Butler, a native of Rising Star, lives in Alice. He served in World War II as a naval officer and began his engineering career with Conoco Oil Company. He was a district engineer for Conoco for five years and then became superintendent of the H. R. Smith Company in Alice. He has been with Harkins about 25 years.

Butler has been a director of the American Institute of Mining, Metallurgical and Petroleum Engineers and the International Metallurgical and Petroleum Engineers and of the International Association of Drilling Contractors. He also served the latter organization as vice president of its Gulf Coast District. In civic affairs he has been a director of the Alice Boys' Club and a trustee of the Mary Dunn Reynolds Foundation.

## Notice Is Hereby Given By Callahan County Of Its Rent Assistance Program

Landlords and persons who live in rental property are urged to contact the Housing Authority of Callahan County concerning participation in a program designed to assist our citizens to secure decent, safe, and sanitary housing.

The program benefits landlords and owners by providing financial assistance during vacancy and certain depository and damage guarantees. The program aids eligible renters by providing financial assistance on the basis of need. 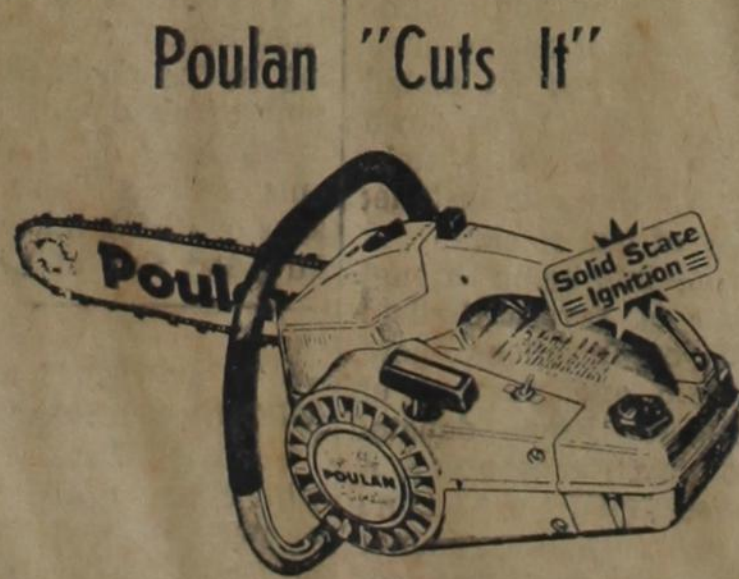

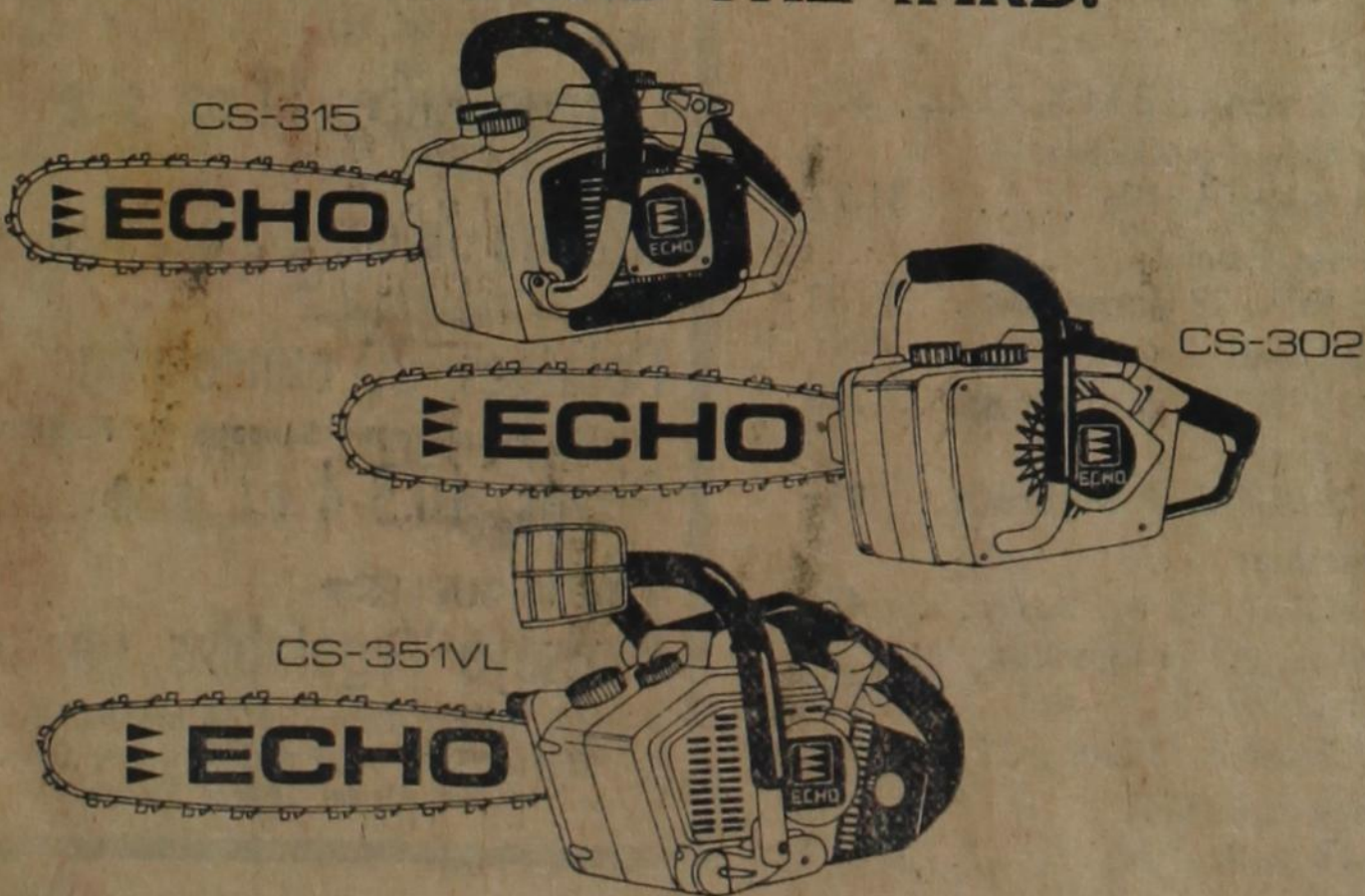

### Earnings Changes In S.S. Program Told

With the enactment of the 1977 Amendments to the Social Security Act, congress made several significant changes in the Social Security Program. One of the most important of these changes involved the amount people can earn while entitled to Social Security benefits.

Beginning in 1978 there are two separate earnings limits, one for people age 65 and over and one for those under age 65. For those 65 or older, the earnings limit in 1978 was \$4,000.00 and was increased by \$500.00 in 1979 to \$4,500.00. This limit will continue to be increased by \$500.00 per year through 1982, when the limit will be \$6,000.00.

The earnings for those under age 65 was \$3,240.00 in 1978 and \$3,480.00 in 1979. Increases in the limit for years after 1979 will be determined under the automatic cost-of-living adjustment provision of the law. These increases are usually announced toward the end of each calendar year.

Another significant change in the law was the elimination of the monthly earnings limitation. Prior to 1978, a person could be paid benefits for any month in which he did not earn more than one-twelfth of the yearly earnings limitation or did not render substantial services in self-employment. Under the 1977 amendments, this monthly earnings test was eliminated except for one year.

The first year a person receives monthly benefits, payments can be made for the months in which he does not earn over the monthly exempt amount and does not perform substantial services in self-employment. After that year, payments will be based only on the beneficiary's total yearly earnings.
