

School Trustees Slate Budget Hearing Aug. 16

Notice has been given that the Board of Trustees for Cross Plains Independent School District will hold a hearing Thursday, Aug. 16, for the purpose of adopting a budget for the 1979-80 school year.

The session will be held starting at 8 p.m. in the Home Economics Laboratory in the elementary school building on the local campus.

It was pointed out by Randy Foster, school board president, and Dr. Scot H. Edington, superintendent, that trustees and school administrators worked on the proposed budget Wednesday, Thursday and Friday nights of last week.

Computations on the proposed budget and other facts and figures are being checked this week by school administration personnel before being presented by the school trustees on August 16.

Tax rate for 1979 school taxes is currently being figured.

It was recently announced by Peggy J. Dickson, school tax assessor-collector that unless a public meeting is called local school trustees must not exceed a tax rate of \$1.13 per \$100 assessed valuation by more than three per cent for 1979 taxes. That order and limitation was mandated by state law (Ver-non's Texas Civil Statutes).

The tax rate for the 1978 tax year was \$1.06 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

The statement by the school tax officer concerning the top levy follows.

"I, Peggy J. Dickson, Tax Assessor-Collector for the Cross Plains ISD, in accordance with the provisions of Article 7244c, V.T.C.S., have calculated the tax rate which may not be exceeded by more than three (3) per cent by the Board of Trustees of the

Cross Plains ISD without holding a public hearing as required by Article 7244c, V.T.C.S. That rate is as follows: \$1.13 per \$100 of assessed valuation."

Traffic Flow Change Due For Some Roads

The motoring public is being advised by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation of a change in Texas traffic laws which will become effective August 27.

Roger C. Welsch, district engineer at Abilene, states that the changes require a re-education of the traveling public, and although new highway signs will be erected, instructing the public to break old habits are oftentimes very difficult.

A release from the state highway department follows.

"Frontage road traffic on interstate and other multi-lane highways must yield to traffic leaving or entering the main lanes. That is the new law which becomes effective August 27, 1979.

"House Bill 1421, passed by the 66th Legislature and signed by the Governor on June 11, 1979, provides that frontage road traffic shall yield the right-of-way to traffic entering an on-ramp or leaving an off-ramp on controlled access highways. It also applies to rural areas where two-way frontage roads exist.

"The change may cause problems on two-way frontage roads for motorists who have grown accustomed to main lane traffic doing the yielding at exit ramps. A problem could be in store for other frontage road drivers who think vehicles about to enter the main lanes must yield.

"Although the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will have new YIELD signs in place by August 27, the habits already formed will be difficult to break. Careful observance of highway signs will continue to be very important during the re-development of frontage road driving habits."

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When The Blind Lead The Blind

(Matt. 15:14)

On July 11, 1979, there appeared in the Cross Plains Review, page six column one, an article signed by Mr. & Mrs. R. L. Jackson, 235 W. 15th., Cross Plains, Texas. According to the article they are members of the Pentecostal Church. An account of the date and place of its beginning, according to two written accounts is given in the following, plus comments and observations.

On New Year's Eve, 1899, a group of people (Who apparently had concluded that the Bible was not enough to satisfy them about God and His Will for man — II Tim. 3:16, 17) assembled in Topeka, Kansas. According to the record, they emerged from that assembly claiming, "A great outpouring of the Holy Spirit that resulted in many of them speaking in tongues..." The record goes on stating that, "In the year, 1914, a conference was called at Hot Springs, Ark., during which a general council of the Assemblies of God was formed. Then later because of what many believed to be additional new revelation of doctrine this group was divided and two or three other smaller groups soon formed, among them being what is known as The Pentecostal Church, Inc., was formed, composed of white brethren only." (Government report, volume II, pp. 1334, 1335.)

Another report states: "... In the year 1944 came the revelation on the name of the Lord Jesus Christ. The report goes on — The power which was hidden in the name of Jesus began to be revealed. Literally thousands were rebaptized into the name of Jesus Christ, and multitudes received the baptism of the Holy Spirit while in the water. ... Two of the major bodies known as the — Pentecostal Assemblies of Jesus Christ, Inc., and the Pentecostal Church, Inc., became so closely associated in doctrine and fellowship that in 1944 steps were taken to unite the two bodies into one organization known as the — United Pentecostal Church." (Pentecostal church manual, pp. 8-10, Foreword.)

Next week a look, under the light of God's holy Word, at one of the doctrines of this human devised religion. The first one will be the doctrine that there is only one person in the Godhead. "...I the Lord speak righteousness, I declare things that are right." (Isa. 45:19b) For I bear them record that they have a zeal of God, but not according to knowledge. For they being ignorant of God's righteousness, and going about to establish their own righteousness, have not submitted themselves unto the righteousness of God." (Rom. 10:2, 3).

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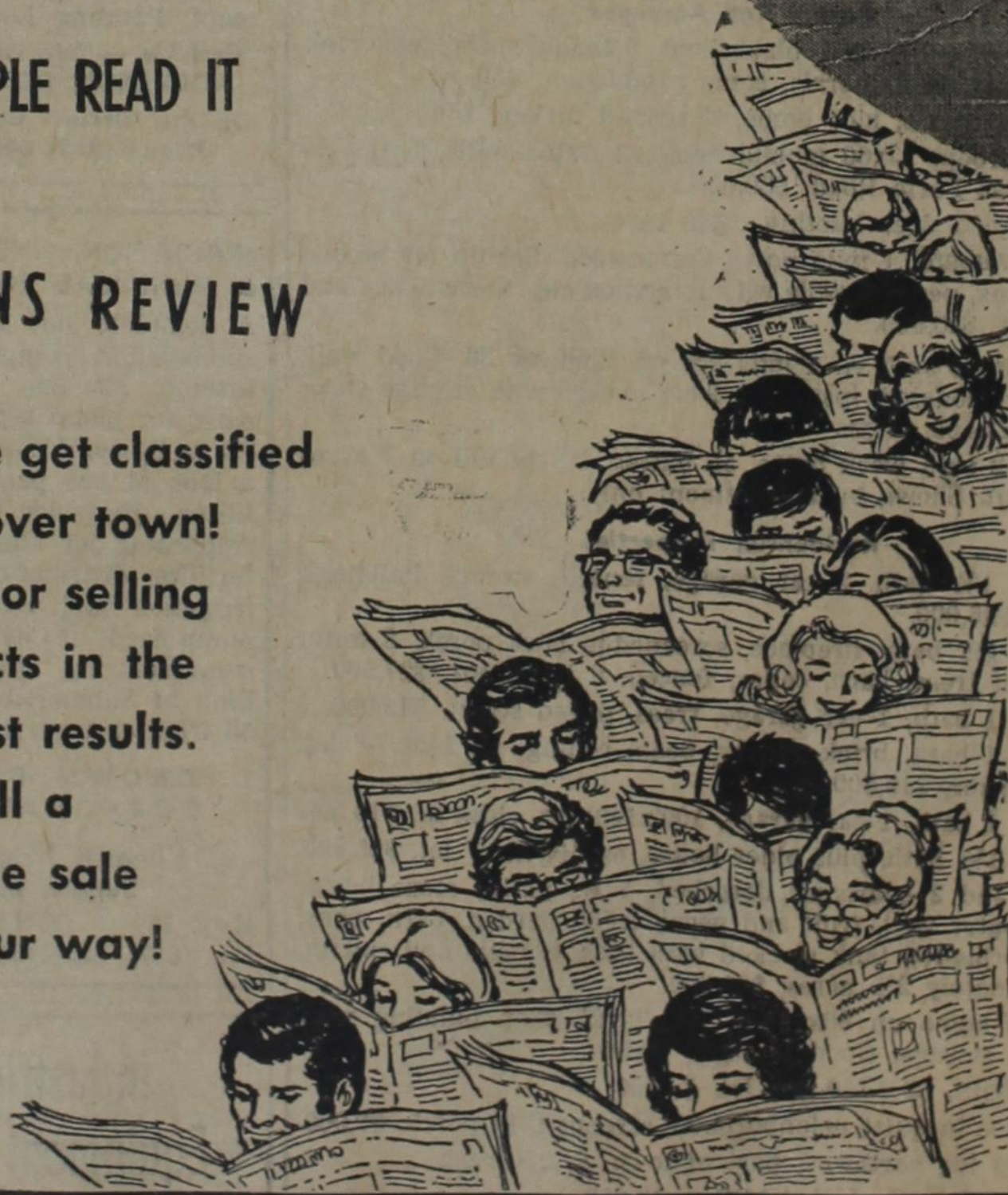

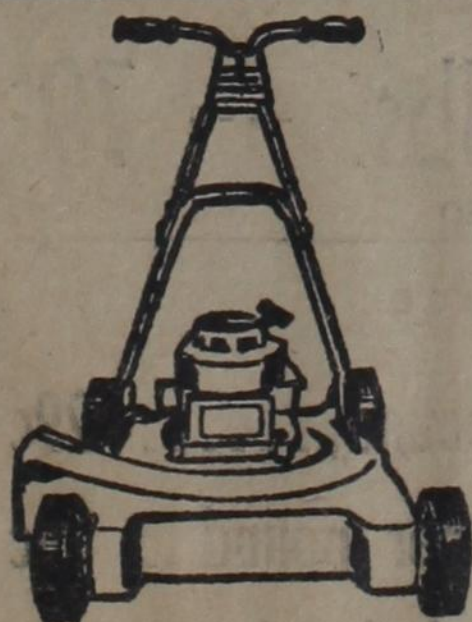
