It was pointed out by Randy Foster, school board president, and Dr. Scot H. Edington, superintendent, that trustees and school administrators worked on the proposed budget Wednesday, Thursday and Friday nights of last week.

Computations on the proposed budget and other facts and figures are being checked this week by school administration personnel before being presented by the school trustees on August 16.

Tax rate for 1979 school taxes is currently being figured.

Dickson, school tax assessor-collector that unless a public meeting is called local school trustees must not exceed a tax rate of \$1.13 per 5100 assessed valuation by more than three per cent for 1979 taxes. When The Blind Lead The Blind

(Matt. 15:14)

On July 11, 1979, there appeared in the Cross Plains Review, page six column one, an article signed by Mr. & Mrs. R. L. Jackson, 235 W. 15th., Cross Plains, Texas. According to the article they are members of the Pentecostal Church. An account of the date and place of its beginning, according to two written accounts is given in the following, plus comments and observations.

On New Year's Eve, 1899, a group of people (Who apparently had concluded that the Bible was not enough to satisfy them about God and His Will for man - II Tim. 3:16, 17) assembled in Topeka, Kansas. According to the record, they emerged from that assembly claiming, "A great outpouring of the Holy Spirit that resulted in many of them speaking in tongues... The record goes on stating that, "In the year, 1914, a conference was called at Hot Springs, Ark., during which a general council of the Assemblies of God was formed. Then later because of what many believed to be additional new revelation of doctrine this group was divided and two or three other smaller groups soon formed, among them being what is known as The Pentecostal Church, Inc., was formed, composed of white brethren only." (Government report, volume II, pp. 1334, 1335.)

Another report states: (. . . In the year 1944 came the revelation on the name of the Lord Jesus Christ. The pivotal doctrines of the absolute deity of Jesus Christ and baptism in His name only became tenets of faith. God marvelously confirmed our message as the gospel was preached in its fulness. (If this claim be true the apostle Peter lied - II Pet. 1:3; Paul lied - Acts 20:27; John lied - II John 9; Jude lied — Jude 3.; God, according to them confirmed something later the apostles never knew about.) The report goes on -The power which was hidden in the name of Jesus began to be revealed. Literally thousands were rebaptized into the name of Jesus Christ, and multitudes received the baptism of the Holy Spirit while in the water. ... Two of the major bodies known as the -- Pentecostal Assemblies of Jesus Christ, Inc., and the Pentecostal Church, Inc., became so closely associated in doctrine and fellowship that in 1944 steps were taken to unite the two bodies into one organization known as the - United Pentecostal Church." (Pentecostal church manual, pp. 8-10, Foreword.)

Next week a look, under the light of God's holy Word, at one of the doctrines of this human devised religion. The first one will be the doctrine that there is only one person in the Godhead. "...I the Lord speak righteousness, I declare things that are right." (Isa. 45:19b) For I bear them record that they have a zeal of God, but not according to knowledge. For they being ignorant of God's righteousness, and going about to establish their own righteousness, have not submitted themselves unto the righeousness of God." (Rom. 10:2, 3).

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN BY CALLAHAN COUNTY OF ITS RENT ASSISTANCE' PROGRAM

Landlords and persons who live in rental property are urged to contact the Housing Authority of Callahan County concerning participation in a program designed to assist our citizens to secure decent, safe, and sanitary housing.

The program benefits landlords and owners by providing financial assistance during vacancy and certain depository and damage guarantees. The program aids eligible renters by providing financial assistance on the basis of need.

Persons that wish to apply for rent assistance must make application for eligibility and subsequently provide proof of income. Applicants must be a family or head of household. If an individual applies he or she must be 62 years of age or handicapped or disalbled.

Cost of housing occupied by the applicant must be within the limits set forth in a fair market rent schedule. Fair Market rents are based on standard mark et housing, however, any standard unit falling within the Fair Market schedule is eligible.

Participation in the rest assistance program is voluntary on the part of owners/landlords and renters.
