United Fund Drive Inches Nearer Goal

Cross Plains Area United Fund is creeping slowly toward its assigned \$4,000 goal, but was still \$426.84 short of the quota Tuesday.

Officers at the Citizens State Bank who are keeping records on the drive stated Tuesday that

\$3,573.16 had been received thus far this year. That is \$275 more than had been collected on the first day of the drive Friday Oct. 5, when a door-to-door solicitation netted \$3,083.68 and another \$214.48 came in over the next three days.

Dale Bishop, United Fund president, stated that he still feels confident that the goal will be reached in the next few days. Mrs. Raymond DeBusk, campaign drive chairman, and Mrs. Frank Ferrell, Mrs. DeBusk's co-worker, also indicated that they still have faith that Cross Plains people will see that the charity drive is successfully completed. "There are still several pledges from local businesses not collected as payments must be made at the home office and mailed here," Mrs. DeBusk opined.

She continued that if there are persons who did not have a volunteer call upon them and need to be contacted, they may call her or Mrs. Ferrell. Persons who have not had a part in the drive may make a contribution at the Citizens State Bank when in town.

"We most sincerely appreciate the work of the more than 50 volunteer workers, and the generous support of the public in general during the drive," Bishop stated. "A charitable drive such as the Area United Fund could not be made without the worker volunteering to pick up the hundreds of gifts from the public," he added.

It was explained that the Area United Fund is the only such drive sanctioned in this community. The \$4,000 quota was apportioned as follows: West Texas Rehabilitation Center \$1,300, M. D. Cottonwood's Physician Wins Air Force Award

A physician who makes his home in Cottonwood and hopes to open an office there soon, has recently been named winner of the highest award of its kind in the U. S. Air Force.

Dr. J. O. Williams, who makes his home in the Cottonwood community now and who has practiced in Abilene for many years, has been named the Air Force's Outstanding Mobilization Augmentee for the year 1978. He received the Air Force award October 2 at a meeting of the Association of Military Surgeons being held in San Diego, Calif.

Dr. Williams had previously won a similar award, outstanding mobilization augmentee, as the Strategic Air Command's top reservist.

Following is a story, in part, which appeared in a recent issue of the Abilene Reporter-News about Dr. Williams.

A lieutenant colonel in the Air Force Reserve, Williams specializes in obstetrics and gynecology. He is a veteran of four years of active military duty, 1959-1963, and was chief of OB-GYN at Dyess during the period.

During that time he brought a large number of Air Force dependents into the world. A 1961 Dyess Peacemaker newspaper shows the doctor after he had delivered his 800th Dyess baby.

As a reservist he continues his association with Dyess. He spends two weeks each year on active duty plus one day per month working at the hospital.

During his one day periods he usually performs surgery in the mornings involving gynecology, but occasionally does general surgery.

Williams also keeps abreast of happenings at the Dyess hospital while maintaining his private practice.

"I consult with doctors over the phone about problems and I occasionally see a patient on a referral basis," he said.

Capt. (Dr.) George Ferre, Dyess hospital commander, says Williams excels "not only in the performance of his duties at our hospital, but also as a liaison between us and the civilian community." He added that Williams recently rearranged his civilian schedule to serve at the base hospital during a time of shortage of OB-GYN physicians.

Spook Garb Check Urged This Halloween

This Halloween, check safety features for children's "trick or treating" costumes, advises Claudia Kerbel, a consumer information specialist.

Mrs. Kerbel is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

She suggests these Halloween costume safety features:

(1) Consider using make-up to decorate the face rather than wearing a mask which may block vision. Apply cold cream before putting on make-up for easy removal.

(2) Sew or glue reflective tape to both front and back of the costume. Be creative and incorporate the tape into the costume design.

(3) When possible, choose light-colored costumes — they will be more visible to motorists.

(4) Check labels or packaging on bought costumes for flame retardant finishes. Children may be exposed to many direct sources of fire such as lighted pumpkins, colorful candles or open fires for toasting marshmallows.

(5) For home-sewn costumes, select fabrics with a flame-retardant finish.

(6) If costumes are too long, shorten them by hemming or cutting them off with pink shears. This will lessen the chance of a child tripping or falling.

(7) If possible, give each child a flashlight to use at night. If he/she wants to carry a jack-o-lantern, put a flashlight inside — never a candle.
