

## 4-H Livestock Workshop Set Here For Saturday

A special workshop will be held Saturday, Dec. 15, for all 4-H livestock feeders and 4-H leaders at the Callahan County Junior Livestock Show barn at Cross Plains at 9:30 a.m.

The program will be divided into three parts, beef cattle, swine and sheep. Ray Sims of the Dyer-Sims Limousin Ranch of Baird will present the program on beef cattle grooming and showmanship.

Roger Blackmon, Coleman County Extension Agent, will present the sheep portion of the program. Bill Scott, vocational agriculture instructor at Abilene High School, will be on hand to discuss grooming and showmanship of swine.

The primary purpose of the workshop will be to assist 4-Hers and adult leaders in preparation for future livestock shows. The workshop is open to all who are interested in learning more about fitting and showing all classes of livestock, says Greg Gerngross of Baird, Callahan County Agent.

## County Water Group Hires Engineer Firm

Directors of the Callahan County Water Supply Corporation have officially hired the engineering firm of Yeats & Decker to do a preliminary study of the feasibility of the proposed water project, according to word from Laura Brown of Baird, officer of the corporation.

She advises that Ken Martin, a representative of the firm, reported that there is more than one possibility of obtaining water for members. The firm is reportedly going to look into the possibility of obtaining water from an Abilene supply, possibility of wells located throughout the county or possibility of working with an already existing corporation.

The engineering firm will be doing the necessary paper work which the FHA requires in order to obtain a grant and loan, said Laura Brown.

She added that directors are optimistic that it will be possible to obtain water for every person in Callahan County who desires it.

At the present time there are 325 members in the Callahan County Water Supply Corporation. It was pointed out that new members are still being accepted for a membership fee of \$350.

Local varsity teams contested Gustine squads Thursday. Buffettes were slapped 46-17. Local scoring leaders were Bridgette Allen with 10 and Leesa Higginbottom with 6.

Bisons romped to an easy 57-19 victory with Danny Lewis bucketing 25 points, and Duane Hutchins adding 10.

On Friday Cross Plains girls dropped a 23-18 verdict to Mozelle. Bridgette Allen counted

8 points for Buffettes.

Buffaloes used a strong first half, outscoring Eula 35-26, and clipped the Pirates 60-59 as a Eula rally fell just short. Lewis again had a hot hand swishing the nets for 27 points. Hutchins added 14, and Tan Flippin contributed 10.

In the championship game Saturday night, Buffaloes dropped a 48-41 verdict to the host Mountaineers. After trailing 16-8 in the first quarter and 24-18 at halftime, Buffs gained a 35-34 advantage in the third period, but again dropped behind in the fourth, being outscored 14-6. Lewis had 17 points to pass the Herd while Hutchins added 10.

Lewis was named to all-tournament team.

Cross Plains will participate in the tournament at Rising Star this week end. Baird will furnish competition in first round. At 1 p.m. Thursday Buffettes and Bearettes tangle, and at 2:30 Bisons and Bears collide.

## Mrs. Kim Beggs Takes Baylor Law Degree

V. Sue Koenig Beggs of Cross Plains was among 17 Baylor University law students receiving doctor of jurisprudence degrees Saturday, Nov. 17, in full law commencement exercises.

Mrs. Beggs, the former Suzie Koenig, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert E. (Dick) Koenig of Route 2, Cross Plains. She formerly attended Cross Plains High School and Tarleton State University at Stephenville.

Her husband is Kim Beggs, formerly of Pioneer community. He is a Cross Plains High School graduate.

Keynote speaker David M. Guinn, Baylor law professor, told the graduates and visitors that one of the major problems facing America today is the proliferation of government regulations, citing several examples of excess regulations imposed by government agencies. Many such regulations could be handled on a state or local level, he said.

Baylor President Abner V. McCall also addressed the group, reminding them that "lawyers can do more than most other groups to improve the world around us."

Training in law was offered at Baylor as early as 1849, and the School of Law was formally organized in 1857 and currently carries an enrollment of about 390 students.

## Area Men's Pecans Winners At Eastland

Dan Childress of Cottonwood and James Alexander of Pioneer had champion pecans at the 27th Annual Eastland County Pecan Show held Friday and Saturday at Eastland.

Champion pecans were selected from 138 entries representing more than 40 different varieties.

Childress' Mohawk entry was named champion in Shell pecan while his Barton entry was named reserve champion in Shell. The winning Mohawk pecans also were the largest in the show, only 33 pecans per pound and shelled out 60.5 per cent kernels.

An entry of Sioux pecans owned by Childress was named shelling champion. The Sioux pecans shelled out 61.3 per cent kernels and contained 55.7 nuts per pound.

The reserve champion shelling pecans were another entry of Sioux shown by Southern Star Pecan Orchard of Rising Star.

James Alexander of Rising Star had the champion and reserve champion Native Pecans. The champion Native shelled out 61.5 per cent kernels and contained 64.6 nuts per pound.

## Notice Is Hereby Given By Callahan County Of Its Rent Assistance Program

Landlords and persons who live in rental property are urged to contact the Housing Authority of Callahan County concerning participation in a program designed to assist our citizens to secure decent, safe, and sanitary housing.

The program benefits landlords and owners by providing financial assistance during vacancy and certain depository and damage guarantees. The program aids eligible renters by providing financial assistance on the basis of need. Persons that wish to apply for rent assistance must make application for eligibility and subsequently provide proof of income. Applicants must be a family or head of household. If an individual applies he or she must be 62 years of age or handicapped or disabled or displaced of lower income.

Market rents are based on standard market housing, however, any standard unit falling within the Fair Market schedule is eligible.

Cost of housing occupied by the applicant must be within the limits set forth in a fair market rent schedule. Fair

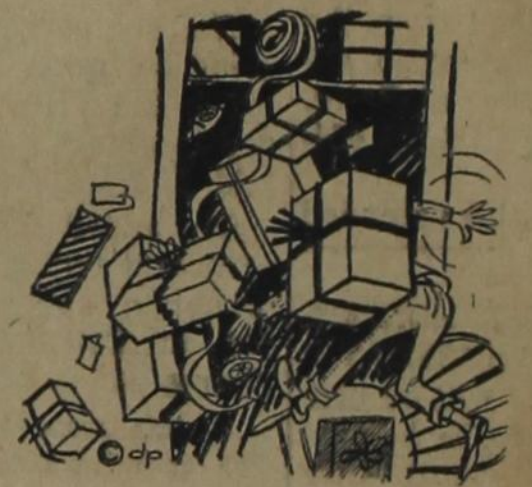

If a few of the deterrents to the solution of the energy crises were removed, the problem would have a workable solution. Scientific know-how has always met the challenge of economic and consumer needs. "Necessity is the mother of invention" in the case of many crises and is just as workable in the energy crises.

We wonder why the argument of environmental protection would supercede in importance, oil development in Alaska; Alaska, that great oil basin, that has barely been tapped for production. Only a few wells are being drilled, with little hopes for more. Many have been drilled and capped.

The scientific path of research has been blazed. But for the hindrance of the "perplexing mass of bureaucratic controls and pressure groups," even the announcement of a fuel shortage may not have come so soon.

Sasol, the gasoline from coal concept, was formed in 1950. South Africa capitalized on research done in the United States and Germany during World War II. Their leaders acquired rights to the U. S. Kellogg process and the German-Tropisch method and coal gasification became possible and feasible. A California based corporation holds the knowledge key to Sasol technology and licensing abroad. By 1971 Sasol was providing a significant share of South Africa's motorized fuel requirements and her gas needs. OPEC embargo and surging oil prices assured Sasol's economic viability. This is only one example of the many applications of scientific accomplishments that is filling a need.

Next year is an election year. Is it possible to diminish the power of bureaucracy in our government with our vote? To answer this question may require some research into the history of United States to learn what started the problem. It is worth thinking about.
